

August 12, 1977. Friday evening at 8 p.m. has been tentatively set for a Community Meeting to elect a Mount Lemmon Community Board of Directors or Executive Committee for the specific purpose of working out Community related problems from within the Community. The meeting will be held at the Mount Lemmon Accomodation School at the end of Summerhaven Road near Marshall Gulch. Should there be a necessary change in the date, notices will e posted at the Post Office Bulletin Board, and at The Emporium and The Vine. Nominations should be made officially at that time for Members of the Mt. Lemmon Board of Directors or Executive C ommittee.

61 homeowners and environmentalists attended the July 21st meeting at the Pima County Board of Supervisor's Hearing Room which was sponsored by Pima Association of Governments, (which deals with water pollution and water quality). This meeting was in addition to the previous meeting held by P.A.G. at the Mt. Lemmon Schoolhouse on July 7th relating to Sabino Creek waters.

It has been determined that there are two major sources of pollution to the Upper Sabino Creek Watershed:

- 1: Mt. Lemmon Wastewater Treatment Plant and sewer system.
- 2: Horse and animal corrals near the creek.
- P.A.G. recommends the following: (see Page -7- for P.A.G. Tables):
- 1. Amend existing 201 plans for a community sewage treatment facility and to place the existing 45 connections on an appropriate onite disposal system.
- 2. Establish survey procedures to locate improperly functioning septic tanks on private and Forest Service land. Deficient systems must be improved or replaced.

The July 15th edition, which contained numerous photographs by Mt. Lemmon's noted photographer, Leslie May, which was to be an enlarged Pictorial edition for the July 4th Women's Club Annual Arts & Crafts Festival was unable to be printed due to excessive vandalism at the printers in Tucson, in which the photographic equipment was severely damaged. This necessitated pulling the entire edition, which will be published at a later date, and will include the photos.

Subscribers will be credited accordingly. The News apologizes to our buying public for this excessive delay in getting to press, and can only fall back on the old platitude 'better late than never.'

The Women's Club was formed in August 1973. Officers serve from May to May of each year. The first President was Francie Morse, (our present Post-Mistress), until 1976 when Chriss Sheldon took office. Our present President is Florence Wilhoite.

In 1973 the Forest Service put land aside for use as a church building under Mrs. Royal B. Irving, (Ruth), and Catholic services were held at The Ponderosa. Money was hard to raise at that time so the land was eventually lost. After The Ponderosa burned, The Inn became a general meeting place, where school activities, PTA meetings, etc., were held.

Dr. Conrad Joiner, who headed the Board of Supervisors, Tucson; and Anita Lohr, Superintendant of Schools, Tucson and other officials met with the Mt. Lemmon Women's Club ---Continued to Pa -2-

Cont'd from Pg. -1 - : members who wished to obtain these leader's ideas for creating constructive activities in Summerhaven under the auspices of the Woman's Club.

Without the backing of the Zimmerman's, Ms. Sheldon said,

nothing could have occurred on our mountain.

Mary Bender, a 20 year resident and Chriss Sheldon got the idea for The Woman's Club during a conversation in July 1973, and began immediately to persue the possibilities. Gloria Bell, when contacted, said that it was a great idea, but that it would never happen. Original members were Linda Baker, Joan Choate, Chriss Sheldon, Francie Morse and Mary Bender. Membership in the General Federation of Women's Clubs was obtained and chartered in November 1973 with the first election of officers held in August. Membership was also obtained in the Arizona Federation of Women's Clubs.

We are proud of being members of the largest Women's Organization in the world, which has, in Arizona alone, 5,000 members. Worldwide there are 10,000,000 members, who have been responsible for many national firsts:

- 3. Preview and develop new standards for the construction of new on-site waste disposal systems.
- 4. Construct and maintain no discharge public restroom facilities in Summerhaven for solid waste residuals reduction and prevention.
- 1). Establish an educational program to reduce littering by recreationists using Upper Sabino Creek Watershed.
- 2). To arrange for animal waste disposal and prevention through possible removal of horses/livestock from Upper Sabino Creek Watershed.
- 3). Establish routine programs to round up stray dogs on the Upper Sabino Creek Watershed.
- 4). Establish an education program to encourage water conservation by Summerhaven and Forest Service residents.
- 5). Establish a land use planning program in which development on Sabino Creek reflects water quality goals.
- 6). A continuing water quality monitoring program should be established to assure the recommended program is achieving water quality goals.
- 7). The continuing water quality program will evaluate the Mt. Lemmon pollution abatement program.

The costs of cleaning up Sabino Creek will depend upon which choices are acceptable to our residents. The only way your preferences can be considered is if you SPEAK UP!

Rather than to see this environmental situation as a negative one, or defeating one, we, as residents can choose to see it as a means of accomplishing more realistic Community involvement autonomously.

It is quite apparent from what officials of P.A.G. have stated at the previous meetings, that *something* will be done, either with or in spite of our desires for the Sabino Creek area.

How much better to organize, as residents, to work with, and handle decisions relating directly to our community? Through our banding together, empowering a Board of Directors or an Executive Committee - chosen by our residents to act and/or speak for ourselves as a Community is a major step forward.

We need ideas, relating to an educational program for the visitors relating to dog-care, litter, and general Land-Use. Regarding the existing animals, as a beginning suggestion,

perhaps all horse owners of the Mt. Lemmon area could have a joint corral area.

In what has been variously estimated at 6 - 10,000 people for the entire weekend, the Mt. Lemmon Women's Club's Annual Arts & Crafts Festival was very well attended.

A major draw was the Blue-Grass Jam Session on Sunday afternoon. Young people sat on the ground throughout the area in front of the Post Office - listening as numerous performers gave out with their best. Among them was Kathy Sweeney and the Guitar Work-Shop of Tucson. Ms. Sweeney has recently joined the Swing Shift group as lead singer and will be performing at The Alamo, The Oxbow and the Stumble Inn - all in Tucson.

The event had its beginning several weeks prior to the holiday, when a group of about a dozen Women's Club members and interested husbands and friends gathered to cut down trees which the Forest Service had donated to The Woman's Club for the Festival. Many of the trees had been in a fire previously, so the participants wound up black and sooty. Loaded into a pick-up truck for the trek in to Summerhaven, the booths were built the following week-end by volunteers in the Community. After working all day - logging - the tired but happy and enthusiastic loggers joined in a drink at The Vine.

Ronald McDonald was a frequent visitor to all areas of the Festival and was sponsored by the Tanque Verde McDonalds in Tucson, through the auspices of Al and Bud Roberson.

Politics reared its head throughout the Festival, (the results of the Mayoral Race are on Page -10-), with more Candidates this year than there has been in previous years. Billy (The Wonderful) Clark, Incumbent, won by a slight, although protested, margin.

HOW TO INTERPRET



YOUR HOROSCOPE by Da

Hopefully, those of you who read the last column, practiced writing the glyphs, (the symbols) for the various planets and astrological signs and are more familiar with them now. So we shall continue, as if that were true. In looking at a chart, remember that planets move clockwise, Houses counter-clockwise. The First House deals with self; 2nd with finances; 3rd with communication, short distance travel; 4th with work; 5th with creative projects and children; 6th with adventures; 7th with marriage, partnerships, unions; 8th with endings and beginnings; 9th with Higher Mind, intuition and spirituality; 10th with career/profession; 1lth with elders, friends, dreams; and 12th with the unconscious, prisons, and confinement. Depending upon how planets line up within these houses determines how you interpret their meaning relating directly to what the Houses mean. For instance, very basically - Mars in the First House would relate to an aggressive individual, rather masculine in manner of approach to situations.

Now there are 30 degrees to any one House. To obtain the degrees of any planet on any particular day, one needs to turn to an Ephemeris for the specific date of birth. Each planet and the degrees of placement in the heavens are listed in columns. For Sun, Moon, often Venus, Mars and Mercury (these are all the faster moving planets) it is necessary to use logarithmic tables to work out their precise degree while for Saturn, Neptune, Pluto, Uranus, Y & Z and Jupiter (slower moving planets) one can usually use the degrees shown in the Ephemeris. In interpretation, one also needs to know that there are 3 separate Decanates to each 30 degrees for any House. Also, that the zodiac is divided up into Triplicities, ie., Fire, Earth, Air and Water, and Quadruplicities which are called Cardinal, Fixed and Mutable Signs. Those which are Fire are: Aries, Leo and Sagittarius; Water: Cancer, Scorpio and Pisces; Earth: Taurus, Virgo and Capricorn; and Air: Gemini, Libra and Aquarius. The Cardinal are: Aries, Libra, Cancer and Capricorn; the Fixed are Taurus, Scorpio, Leo and Aquarius; while the Mutalare: Gemini, Sagittarius, Virgo and Pisces. Memorizing these factors can be of a greater additional help in future lessons. While it seems at first to be very confusing, once you know these basics it gets to be a lot easier. Happy memorizing! Bird Watching - Part I

HUMMINGBIRDS

A jewel flashing in the sun, dancing, hovering, winging here and there - our friends - the hummingbirds. John James Audubon, one of the greatest naturalists, referred to the hummingbirds as "glittering fragments of the rainbow." *

They were named by the English Colonists of North America, when hearing the sounds of their wings.

We are very privileged to live in that part of the world where the smallest member of the bird family resides. They can be a real source of enjoyment to young and old alike, watching their aerial acrobatics and flashing colors.

The hummer lives only in North, Central and South America and neighboring islands. They have never been seen by Europeans unless viewed by them on travels to our part of the world. The only eastern hummingbird is the Ruby-throated, the division being the Rockie Mountains. All hummers dine very frequently, one might say continually, on flower nectar (real or artificial) aphids, spiders and other small insects.

At my home on Mt. Lemmon, over the past 7 summers, I have watched and enjoyed the antics of 8 different species. There are 600 in all, mostly living in South America around the equator.

Hummingbirds to watch for on our mountain are:

Black-Chinned -- Black chin, blue-violet throat.
Calliope -- Gorget (throat feathers), with purplered rays on a white ground. The smallest hummer
normally found in the U.S. usually on the high
mountains.

Riboli -- Large, black, bright green throat and purple crown.

Blue-throated -- Large, black and white eye streaks, light blue throat with large white tail streaks.

Anna's -- Rose-red throat and crown. Male sings.

Broadtailed -- Rose-red throat, green crown and

back wings trill in flight. Most common hummer in the Summerhaven area.

Rufous -- Orange-red throat, rufous back. Allen's -- Like Rufous but upper back is green.

Only the males have been described as some females are extremely difficult to distinguish in the field.

JULY 4th WEEKEND - SHERIFF'S REPORT

From the 2nd through the 4th, approximately 20,000 individuals visited our mountain, from its base to Summerhaven, drawn mostly by the rains, which opened the campgrounds to picnics and sharing the out-of-doors - so important to Tucsonians trapped in the heat of the desert summers. The following report was taken from a conversation with the three Sheriffs assigned to the Mt. Lemmon area: (does not include Monday July 4th which drew smaller amounts of traffic): 6 auto accidents in which 3 cars totaled; numerous fender-benders; 1 motorcycle totaled. All accidents had been drinking and while no arrests were made, citations were handed out. A separate accident occurred in Summerhaven in which a small boy's leg was fractured. 12 public assists when cars were broken down; 2 burglaries of cabins, 1 non-accident illness requiring ambulance, 3 assaults, I serious. No dog incidents were reported. 2 vehicles backed over mountainside prox 30 feet and were towed back onto roadway. 1-13 year old boy fell off a cabin roof.

Considering the numbers of people drawn to our Annual Arts & Crafts Festival and while this does not reflect the entire weekend, it does present a reasonable indication of the extent of situations occurring when we have an event drawing large numbers of people to our mountain, to be considered for staging future events.

Consideration is being given to staging a Winter Festival, similar to that held years ago in which winter games will be available, including Arts & Crafts booths, although no dates have as yet been set.




