FIRE DEPARTMENT NEWS

We are ever so greatful to Jimmy Newell and men for using their equipment for putting the Fire Siren on top of the Fire Station for us. It was so easy with their big equipment. So now to get Trico to get the wiring to it. If you haven't seen it, you have to be blind or haven't been through the Village.

The Fire Dept. Auxillary elected new officers, they are Steve Palmer as President and Jonelle Palmer as Sec. & Treas. They are planning on several fund raising projects to buy necessary equipment that the Dept. may not have funds available to buy with. So all of you summer people PLEASE contact some of these people that will be working with this

group and help with these projects.

FIRE DEPT. CONT.

The Fire Dept. has certain responsibilities to obtain and maintain an Emergency Vehicle and George Sheldon took it upon himself to enroll in Pima College to obtain this training, so that he might be able to operate an Emergency Vehicle and preform First Aid Services on the mountain. He attended classes from Feb. until Mid May 2 nights a week and 3 hours a night and past his finals on May 13, 1980.

The training consisted of Anatomy, Medical Emergency, Food Poisoning, Tramy Emergency, Child Birth, Pedeatric Care, C.P.R., Emergency Vehicle, Driving Equipment and Maintenance, 6 hours. Ambulance Training, and 12 hours Hospital Training. We are very appreciative of George for this and now ALL WE NEED IS AN EMERGENCY VEHICLE. Anyone got any IDEAS???? to obtaining it.

Donald Miller has also been certified in Fire Prevention.

WATER DEPT. NEWS

It pays to advertise! A lot of folks were kind enough to send in donations for office equipment. It won't be long before we have enough to buy

a telephone answering system. Keep em coming.

The Farm Home Project is nearly complete. I attended the shake down cruise this Saturday. Mike Storms, the contractor, and I watched the pressure meter rise as the pump moved the water uphill through the 4 inch pipe line to Miners Ridge where it will be stored in the 500,000 gallon tank. He kept one eye on the master meter because he had computed that it would take about 2,000 gallons of water just to fill the line up to Miners Ridge Tank. It was at the 2,000 gallon mark that the trench in front of the Sabino Tank erupted like Mt. St. Helens spewing mud and dirt when a connection failed. My excellent reflexes got me to safety while Mike scrambled to turn off the pump. The ruptured pipe has been repaired and the system checks out - 0.K. Next, Mike will install the chlorinators.

The 220 meters originally contracted for have been installed. In the process Gary Mitchell, our maintenance man, discovered some 20 new customers. Welcome aboard! Paid for water isn't quite so sweet, but you can get it down. Gary reports that tank levels are satisfactory in spite of a couple of water losses. In one case there was some vandalism to a meter resulting in over 40,000 gallons of water wasted. With an undetected open pipe it doesn't take long. Gary has had a lot of fun trying to figure out in a few cases who belongs to which meter. There are a lot of old lines which don't match up. It will take a few months to straighten things out. Have patience.

If your water bill is still unmetered, your bill will be marked accordingly and your bill will be for \$12.25 (\$10.00 for the minimum and \$2.25 for the first 1,000 gallons). An average usage for a full time user is 3,000 to 4,000 gallons per month. Fred Keers noticed that when he reduced the pressure to his house (by using the required pressure regulator) he saved over 1,000 gallons per month. If you want to save even more water contact Pima County Waste Water Management and make arrangements for a free water saver kit. A few meters read unusually high but in some cases Gary figures that the green gardens was the reason.

Speaking of money, Fran Zimmerman hasn't received the invoices from the printers. They seem to be delayed in the mail, so it will be a few days before she can send out bills. In the meantime, Gary Mitchell and a few creditors would be ever in your debt if you would whip out the old check book and send in \$10.00 to be applied against your water bill.

I was contacted by a Mr. Brian Kirby, Adjudication Section of the Arizona Water Commission, State of Arizona, in his efforts to investigate a rather old claim made by the Forest Service, as I understand it, to terminate the Co-ep's interest in two spring rights located in Upper Sabino Canyon. As you can imagine, this one knocked over the old coffee cup!!

No one on the board seems to remember what this is all about, but a joint meeting is being set up with the Forest Service and the Water Commission and yours truly in attendance. It may be nothing to worry about, but one never knows. More on this next month.

Now, I would like everyone to do three things:

1. Send in a check marked "water" to be applied against your water bill (if you are feeling frisky throw in a separate check marked "donation" for the telephone answering system).

2. Get a pressure regulator installed this month (it's required) and operate on reduced pressure to help the Co-op get through the summer

with water for everyone, and

3. Get water saving devices installed which are available at every hardware store in Pima County. They are easy to install if you are a do it yourselfer.
