This little creature comes direct to you from the bottom of your wood pile or from a dark corner in your attic or closet - the brown spider, also known as the fiddleback spider. According to the Poison Control Center this spider, common to Mt. Lemmon, is often referred to as the brown recluse spider, which traditionally resides in the Midwest.

The fiddleback brown spider is a nonagressive spider commonly found in dry areas. Bites from this spider most often occur when a person puts on clothing in which the spider is hiding. The initial pain from the bite may be minimal but then localized pain may become insidious within an hour or so. A skin lesion may develop into a bullseye. Flu-like symptoms may then occur within several hours. The lesion can spread, ulcerate and, within a six week period, there may be noticeable deterioration of the skin near the site of the bite. Poison Control stresses that a victim should seek medical attention if bitten by a fiddleback spider.

The best defense from this reclusive spider is to be able to identify it and to check your firewood before handling it. The spider is light tan to brown with a violin-shaped marking on the back of the head-chest region. With its legs extended, it is the size of a nickel to a quarter.

Photographs of the spider are difficult to come by, and the one I insert here is not of the best quality, but perhaps it can give you some idea of the likeness of this spider. Once again, caution is the best prevention from being bitten by this extremely venomous spider.

WATER CO-OP.


A problem that concerns all water users is the regulating of the extreme pressures off from the main line. All cabins should have a regulator and it should be operating properly. All cabins should also have a pressure relief valve (P.R.V.) on their hot water heater — all for your own protection.

The Co-op requires all members to have these. This is especially important for the sewer users. All the cabins on the sewer system need to have working pressure regulators. When the meters were installed, some of the regulators were already in service, and some were installed with the regulator on the Co-op side of the meter. Rules of the Co-op put the responsibility of water pressure regulation on the customer, according to Arizona State Health Dept. Bulletin #12. Also be sure the regulator is protected from winter freezing.

With the Miners Ridge System working, we use water pumped from Sabino Canyon Sprir to the 500,000 gallon Miners Ridge tank. It is then gravity fed to the pumphouse and distributed. Miners Ridge also fills and supplies Loma Linda tank, the smallest on the water system, and it requires nearly constant filling. At filling times, the pumphouse pressure can exceed 250 psi. If you do not have a regulator, you may have a leak, a high water bill and often damage.

When the new sewer system is completed, people connected will have more problems. If they have a water leak or if the regulator sticks, the sewer bill will go up. The county has tried to educate us on a low flow water system, and they will be using Water Co-op meter readings for a basis on sewer billings. If you, for example, should have your pressure regulator stick, the toile sticks and you use 19,000 gallons in one month, you will have a water bill of \$55, and your sewer bill could be about \$102.00 Water conservation is now more important to you, the consumer, than ever before!!!

This month's recipe is direct to you from the desert and one of its native daughters recently transplanted to a permanent resident atop Mt. Lemmon. Helen Quigley. Helen and Ross Quigley decided to brave the Carter Canyon winter so that their two children could benefit from the wonders of Mr. Art. skiing and all that Mt. Lemmon has to offer in the winter. Apparently, their experiment was so successful that they have decided to try another year. But even winter's snows cannot erase the memories of Helen's favorite traditional desert recipes. One unique one is called "Nopales" a delicacy derived from the new, tender pads of the prickly pear cactus. What follows is Helen's explanation of how to prepare this interesting plant into a delectable:

- 1. Select the new pads as the stickers are softer. Break them off and holding with tongs, scrape off the stickers with a knife. Also, break off the tip as it is loaded with stickers.
- 2. Dice, then rinse in a colander until most of the slime, much like okra, has been rinsed off.
- 3. Boil, until just tender about 15 minutes.
 4. Then, they may be pan fried in oil or butter, mixed with onion, garlic or eggs and then served on or wrapped in a tortilla.

Helen stresses that "Nopales" can be used in a variety of ways as a vegetable ingredient. Sounds good to me - can't wait to try it!!





Sunset Trail

Have you ventured out on your first hike of the season yet? If not, then you may wish to start gradually with short hikes and slowly progress to some advanced hiking such as a trip down to Lemmon Creek and the pools or up and down the Butterfly Trail. For a first, warm-up hike, I strongly recommend the Sunset Trail, a trail just over a mile originating in Marshall's Gulch and ending in Soldier Camp summer home area. As you reach the bottom of the gulch, follow the trail marker to the left for the Sunset Trail. It crosses the stream and winds up through some rocks (really the only difficult part of the hike). The rest of the trail meanders on gradually with some spectacular vistas of Tucson, huge rock formations and waterfalls. You might want to bring your camera along as it is a very picturesque walk. As I mentioned earlier, the trail ends up in Soldier Camp, and the walk back to the village along the highway or through Inspiration Rock and Loma Linda is approximately another mile and a half. When hiking, always wear good sturdy shoes with ample gripping tread and carry water, if possible. Even on Mt. Lemmon, you can overheat in the summer after a good workout. Hope to see many of you on the trails this summer!!!

HIGHWAY HISTORY

Most of us are not of the stamina of John and Sara Lemmon and would never make the trek to the mountain were it not for the presence of the Catalina Highway. I have heard many stories about the highway and how it was built but the most succint report I found I would like to share with you all. It was published in a report by the Catalina Savings Bank in February 1978 in a leaflet entitled "The Catalina View", an interesting piece all about the pioneer days of Mt. Lemmon... "Tucson needed a "summer-haven"... a cool place in the mountains to escape the summertime heat of the valley. This obvious solution brought with it one obvious problem: How do the people get up there?

Surely the trip would need to be more enjoyable than the one described by early climbers.

There had been in existence for some time a road on the north side of the Catalinas. The road, or more accurately, the trail, had been built by the Stratton Copper Co. for hauling lumber on burros. The road was hazardous and with even the best car of the day it was at least a four hour drive from Tucson to the tops of the mountains. "Why not build a highway up the south side?" was the next thought. It sounded logical, but this issue plunged Tucson into one of its hottest political debates ever.

The cost of such an undertaking would be around a million dollars ..a staggering figure in those days.

The opponents argued that only about 2% of Tucson's population had ever visited the Catalinas. Hardly enough people to warrant spending such a huge sum of money.

Those in favor retaliated with the fact that the reason so few had visited the mountains was because the current route was in such poor repair, and took so long that the trip was more of an expedition than an outing.

The debate raged. With each side unwilling to concede, the issue was finally tabled. That is until an enterprising Tucsonan named Frank Hitchcock struck upon an idea. In an article that appeared in the "Star" on March 31, 1936, we see how the plan unfolded:

The Catalina highway now under construction to the summit of the Catalina mountains is a project of such value to the community that

those responsible for it deserve to be remembered and honored. Without the cost of a dime to Tucson or the state, the federa government is building this road, and givithe community quick and safe access to the cool pine clad crests of the Catalinas.

How did it come about that the federal government should make this valuable improvement of a distinctly local character in Tucson? There is just one answer: Frank Hitchcock.

When Frank Hitchcock originated the idea, prohibition was in effect, and the federal prisons were overflowing with convicted bootleggers. Either the federal government had to build more prisons or find some other way of caring for their prisoners. What could be more simple and what could be better than to put these men to building roads! Frank Hitchcock put the idea before Mr. Hoover. Mr. Hoover investigated and secured the approval of the federal prison authorities One of Mr. Hoover's last acts as President was to sign the order providing for the establishment of the prison camp whose members are now building the Catalina Highway.

And Tucson will have this road presented to it without any debt or other form of expens. How fortunate it was that the voters turn down the bond issues that were sponsored a few years ago! And where is there another community that has been given a similar present?

The person responsible for this fine piece of work has conferred a lasting benefit upon the community. The community by all means should at least show its appreciation by naming the road after its sponsor, Mr. Frank H. Hitchcock, late publisher of the Citizen.


With the safe, paved Hitchcock Highway winding its way to the top, access to the Catalinas was now simple. The little village in the Mount Lemmon area, appropriately named Summerhaven, was now receiving plenty of visitors."

Tay Tambalaya

Raw beef suet
1/4 Cup meat scraps
1 Cup cornmeal



1/2 Cup bread crumbs 1 Cup peanut hearts

1 Ten sand

1 Tsp. sand

Save your meat scraps, do not remove fat. Put these through meat grinder and set aside in a medium size bowl. To this add 1 cup cornmeal, 1/2 cup bread crumbs, 1 cup peanut hearts and 1 tsp sand for grit. Cut up suet and put through meat grinder. Place in double boiler, melt, set aside to cool and harden. Reheat and while in liquid form pour 1 cup over dry ingredients. Spoon into suet container and refrigerate until firm.
