## ANNUAL HOMEOWNERS'S MEETING

Our annual meeting was held April 25, 1989 at the Savoy Opera House. We had the best turn out in recent history when 144 hungry people enjoyed the Mesquite broiled steak or chicken prepared by the Pinnacle Peak Steak House.

Mayor Michael Stanley introduced the guest speakers during the evening. Many subjects were discussed. Some of the highlights include the next construction phase of the highway which is scheduled to begin September 1990 and cover 5-1/2 miles at a cost of a million dollars a mile.

John Stufflebean from Solid Waste Management held a discussion on where to locate the County provided dumpster from Memorial Day to Labor Day. A task force was formed with Women's Club past president Cathie Brown as chairman.

District Ranger Steve Plevel spoke about the partial rejection of the new Forest Service lease by the Assistant Secretary of Agriculture. He feels we in the Catalina District have little to worry about and that a final decision on the paragraphs in question would quite likely be favorable to the permitees.

Supervisor Greg Lunn spoke on the importance of community unity. He encouraged that communication be kept open.

Co-chairman Ross Quigley advised us that at least one individual on the mountain has admitted to auditing and taping our cordless telephone calls. We are not certain that this is the full extent of his activities. Seems that there may be no anticipation of privacy on cordless phones.

Co-chairman Ross Quigley let us know that the Consent Decree is officially dead. Using money from the legal fund we hired attorney Sandy Forbes to fight and win this battle with the Sierra Club for us.

Steve Coppock, owner of the Pine Cone Suites formerly Mt. Lemmon Accommodations talked about the Merchants Association advertising and promotion of Summerhaven businesses.

Roy Garcia of the Water Cooperative warned of possible water outages. We must be very conservative of our water and keep containers filled for emergency use. The Co-op will be installing an 8" main from Miners Ridge Tank to the pump house and from there down Sabino Canyon Parkway to Forest Service property boundary this summer.

Fire Chief Chuck Hammel emphasized the extremely high fire danger this summer. Rake up those pine needles and check chimneys for soot and debris buildup. Make sure your spark arresting screen is in place before ever lighting your first fire.

No MLHO board member terms expired so no elections were held at the meeting. (However, later our retired postmaster, Luke Boerger, resigned from the Board stating that he could not be on the mountain this summer. Coppock was appointed to a one year position.) Mary Moran (Summerhaven) was elected chairman; Rick Small (Bear Wallow) vice-chair; Sheri Lee (Middle Sabino) secretary; and Florence Wilhoite. (Upper Loma Linda) as Treasurer. Your other board members are Chris Coppock. Bob Evison. Susan Garcia, Red Greth. Paul Hawkins, Dannie Hayhurst, John Mulay, Fred Pace, Ross Quigley and Fran Zimmerman.

# FIRE RESTRICTIONS IN EFFECT ON THE CORONADO NATIONAL FOREST

The following is a quote from the USDA Forest Service news release dated May 12, 1989:

"Fire restrictions on the Coronado National Forest are in effect as of 0800 a.m. Friday, May 12, 1989 due to the extreme dry conditions of forest fuels.

Current fire restrictions prohibit building, maintaining, attending or using any open fire, except in forest service developed campgrounds or picnic grounds using the provided grills or rings."

## SARA PLUMMER LEMMON (Last in a series of five)

The Lemmons had climbed the Catalinas via the north side. Sara was the first woman to reach the top.

Several years later when George J. Roskruge constructed a map of Pima County, he placed Sara Lemmon's name on the map so that the peak became officially known as "Mount Lemmon". While several mountain peaks are named for women, Mt. Lemmon appears to be the only peak in the United States named after the first woman to climb to its top.

After the Catalinas the Lemmons visited the Chiricahua Mountains and the Fort Huachuca, Arizona. In September 1882 John wrote to friends in California. "This botanizing in the land of the Apaches and cowboys is a very risky business to be sure, but most satisfactory".

According to her grandnephew, Dr. Harold St. John, Sara Plummer Lemmon was enthusiastic, sincere, intense, a driver, and an organizer, cultured, literary, and scientific. She devoted her life to "doing something"

One of the most amazing facts about Sara and John Lemmon is that on their twenty-fifth wedding anniversary they again returned to Tucson. And with Mr. Stratton again as guide, the Lemmons once more climbed the highest peak in the Santa Catalinas. At this time she was 70 and her husband was a spry 74.

In addition to having the mountain peak named for her, Sara Plummer Lemmon had an entire group of plants named for her by the outstanding U.S. botanist of the 19th century, Harvard's Asa Gray. The plants, plumera, yellow wildflowers in the daisy family, somewhat resemble the goldenrod and bloom each summer from July through September in southeastern Arizona.

In 1890 Sara Lemmon undertook to get the golden poppy adopted as the California State Flower. She was the author of the bill which was passed in the California State Senate on March 7.

1891. The eagle quill with which Governor Pardee signed the bill was presented to her by the governor.

In addition Sara Lemmon served as Artist for the California State Board of Forestry from 1887 to 1891. She also wrote and published "Marine Algae of the West", and "Western Ferns". She continued to travel with her husband and collect specimens. During the World Exposition in New Orleans in 1884-5, the Lemmons took six first place botany awards. Apparently Sara Lemmon was active in club work. In 1900 she published a pamphlet for the California Federation of Women's Clubs entitled, "Some Hints Upon Forestry". She did this in her capacity as first Chairman of the Committee on Forestry for the California Federation. In 1902 she served as Chairman of the Executive Board of the California State Red Cross. As a warm, personal friend of Miss Clara Barton, Sara was very active in the organization and edited, "The Record of Red Cross Work on the Pacific Slope".

Sara Lemmon lived a full and remarkable life. She was 93 when she died on January 16, 1929. But the monuments to this woman live on.

BIRDS AND BEES, FLOWERS AND

TREES

The first report of the return of the hummingbirds was on March 9. Since then they have survived snowstorms and freezing temperatures.

Hummers do not have the fluffy downy feathers that our other birds have. They cannot fluff and have a layer of insulation to protect themselves from the cold. Instead they become "torpid", that is, they lapse into a

Their body heat hypothermic state. drops and their heart rate slows. Breathing can actually stop for short periods of time. During this time they

are susceptible to predators because

they cannot fly. The hummers survive the cold temperatures better if they have a good dinner at dusk. This is why you have so many more birds at your feeders just then.

When the weather warms the birds begin to "awaken" as their body heat rises nearly a degree a minute until it gets to about 105 degrees and the heart rate returns to around 500 beats per minute.

But how well will they survive the lack of blossoms due to our drought? Feeder operators report that they have a constant "swarm" of birds this year, and it is hard to keep enough sugar water prepared to refill the feeders. One permanent resident reports using more then 10 pounds of sugar a week during this dry season.


The recommended syrup for hummers is:

5 parts water

1 part sugar

Boil six minutes to kill bacteria and retard spoilage. At a lecture by the Desert Museum we were told DO NOT ADD RED FOOD COLOR. It is not really good for the birds. They can find the feeder with just the slightest bit of red on it.

If you only come up on weekends, you might try boiling up a batch of syrup and bringing it up in a gallon milk container so you can fill your feeder immediately upon arrival. Keep any extra syrup in the refrigerator.


