Annual Tea adds weight to mountain

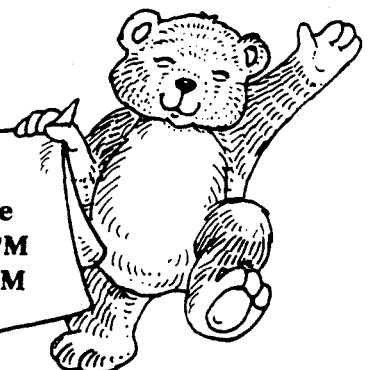

ACC decision strikes down Water Co-op's long standing policy

Cost for new service effected

As you can readily see our new main-line is well under way, and all construction is expected to be finished on schedule this fall. We will also be constructing a new 6" main approximately 1200 feet down Sabino Parkway and adding at least three full-size fire hydrants on this line. This will be a tremendous boost to fire-fighting capabilities in Summerhaven as well as reduce insurance costs for many people in the village.

On a less cheerful note, I must inform you that an old and popular policy of the Co-op can no longer be adhered to. In past years we have allowed customers who wanted water, but were not adjacent to our water lines, to install a new line themselves and split the cost equally among all the new customers to be served by the line. This line would then be dedicated to the Water Co-op and become a part of our system. This saved a tremendous cost to any single customer and allowed the very basis of our company, cooperation, to help these folks afford a water supply. NOW due to a new member of our community not wishing to cooperate, the Arizona Corporation Commission has informed us we can no longer allow anyone to install a line and dedicate it to the Co-op. All new lines must be 6" lines paid for in advance by the customer requesting service. The only means that the customer has of recouping any portion of his/her cost is by a rebate of 10% of the water sales generated by that line on a monthly basis over a ten (10) year period. As you may have guessed, a 6" line is far more expensive than a 2" line. (The Co-op has recently received a bid of \$40/ft if no paving or repaving is needed for a 6" line.) We will all have to be very aware of these increased costs as we attempt to sell or develop our lots.

It never ceases to amaze me how so few people can cost so many so much!!!

The days are feeling more fall-like, and I do believe a few tree tops are yellowing along the highway. The Grosbeaks have already gone south and the hummers will gradually follow.

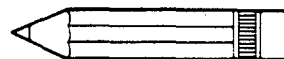
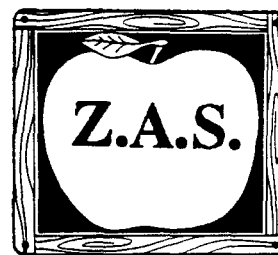
Several years ago I wrote that it was accepted practice to take in your hummer feeders on Labor Day to encourage the birds to migrate.

Each fall it had made me sad to see my feathery friends humming around where their feeders had been all summer and finding nothing to drink. They'd look in the window at me, and I'd ask, "Don't you understand? It's time to go." But it was me who didn't understand that their little biological clocks hadn't signaled that vacation was over.

Last year I attended a meeting organized by the Desert Museum where we were told that whether or not we remove our feeders, the birds will leave when they are ready, and not sooner. I had to test that theory for myself before I told you readers about it.

Last fall some friends and I left our feeders out until we had gone a week without seeing a hummer. Gradually the Broadtails disappeared through October, but it was November 15 that the last of the Blue-throats left, and I must admit that I was getting a little worried by then. Now I am curious to see if they leave the same day this fall.

You may also recall, the Blue-throats will be the first to return on March 9. They will have to survive several blizzards up here before spring arrives, and somehow these tough little guys can do it.'

News from Mt. Lemmon Community Church

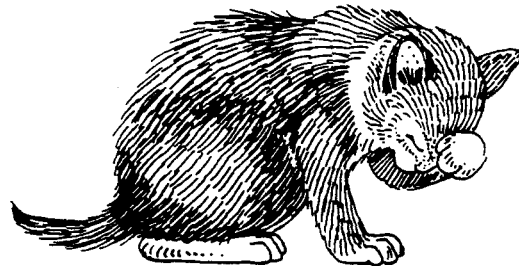

- Tires and car parts

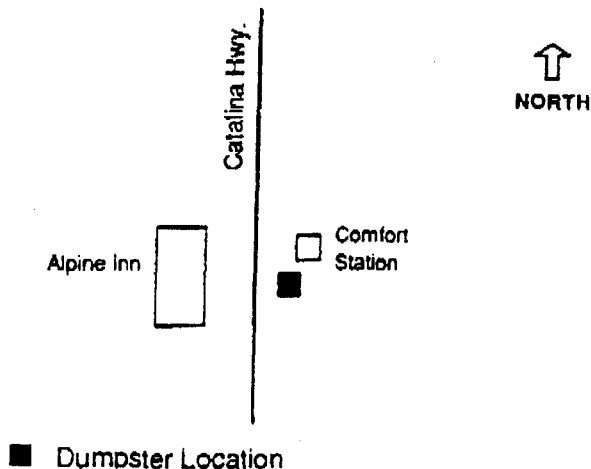



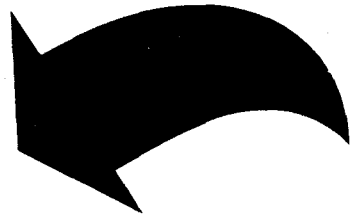

Travel Time: drive approx. 15 mph thru project, which equals 1/4 mile in a minute, therefore, 2.5 miles = 10 minutes

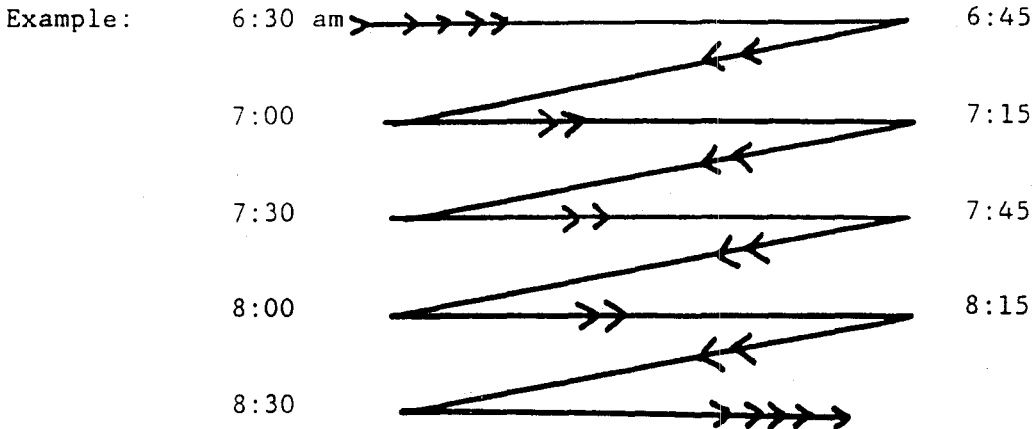
BOTTOM OF PROJECT

Leave on the 1/2 hour & hour

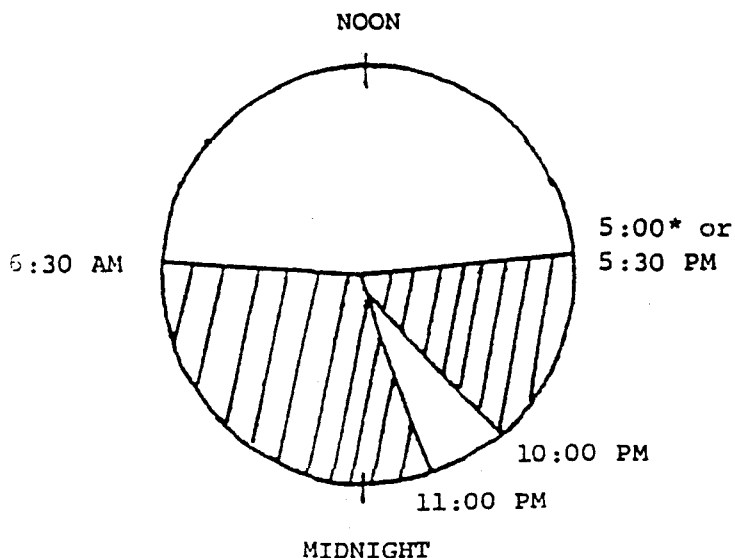
Leave on 1/4 hour before

PROPOSED ROAD SCHEDULE FOR THE MT. LEMMON HIGHWAY

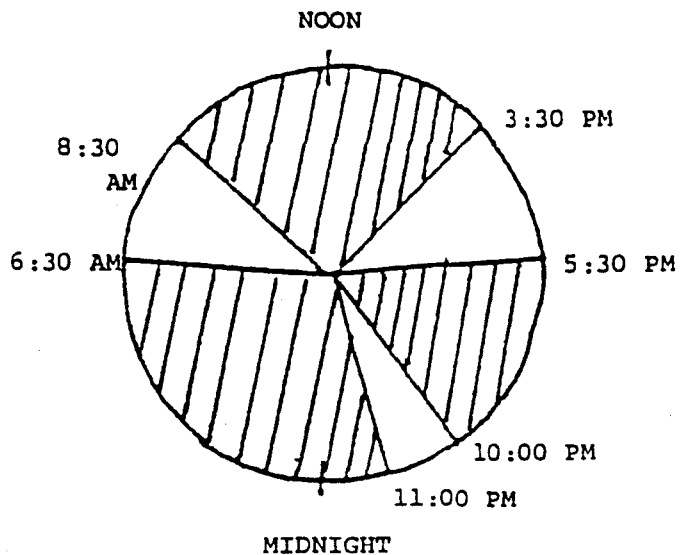

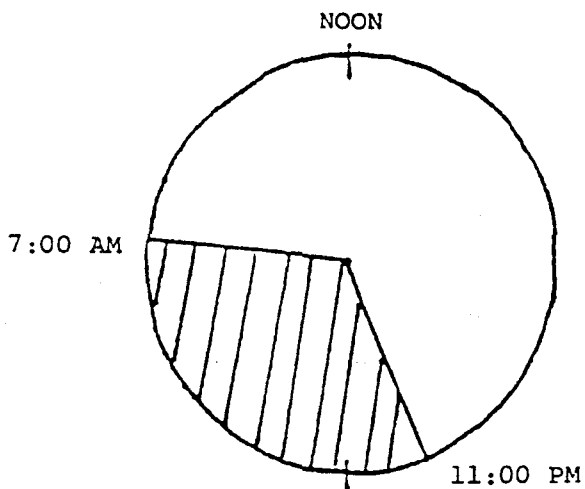

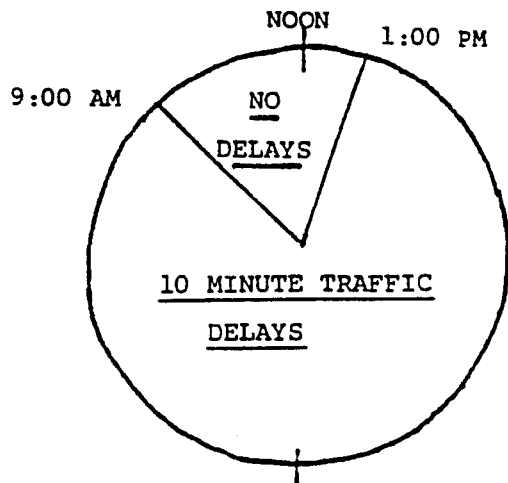
