Burglaries are on the rise again

There have been a number of burglaries and attempted break-ins discovered and reported to the PC Sheriff's Dept. They ranged from nothing being taken or disturbed to severe vandalism and theft.

In early April four people broke into a cabin in the Soldiers Camp area looking to drink beer and spend the night. They were discovered by Deputy Jess Hartman who arrested two men. A woman and baby who were with the men was allowed to return home. There was no serious damage done to the cabin.

Another cabin in Soldiers Camp was broken into and totally trashed. According to Deputy Hartman it was the most extensive damage he has seen. Obscenities were painted on the walls,

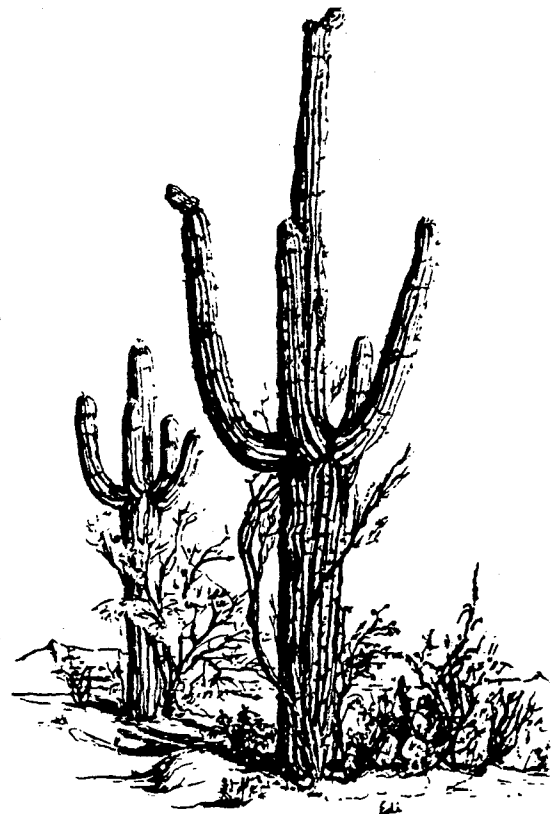
carpet burned, pictures broken, bathroom mirror shattered, just to name a few. The intruders ate cans of food that were in the cabin and through the rest around on everything. There was so much devastation and debris it was difficult to walk through the cabin.

In the Loma Linda area there was an attempted burglary on Bisbee. The intruder tried to take windows out of a door, but was either scared away or unsuccessful in getting the glass out.

However, a cabin on Upper Loma Linda wasn't as lucky. A burglar broke in by breaking out casement windows and took a television set. The same method was used on a cabin on Yuma where a VCR and CD player was stolen.

The Sheriff's Department suggests that we all keep an eye out for our neighbors'

cabins on either side of our own cabin. If something looks out of place or not quite right, report it.

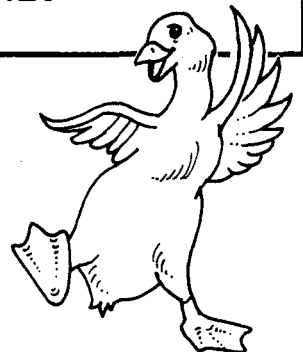
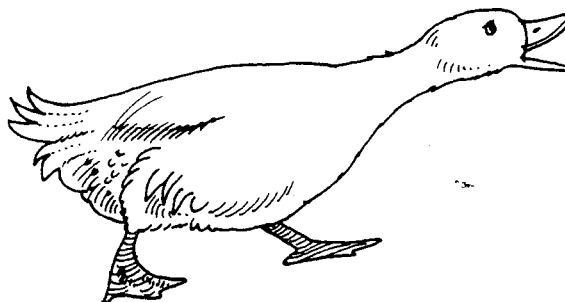

The 5th Annual Rural Arts Traveling Exhibition began January 12 and will continue through June, 1992.

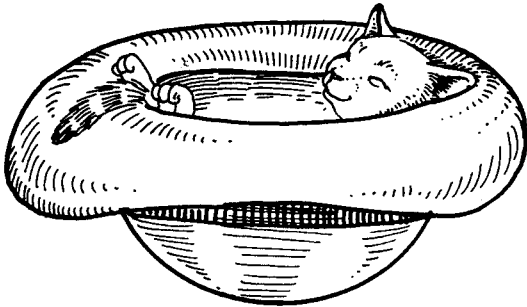
We are very pleased to announce that this year the show will be held at ...and Other Treats Gallery May 11 - May 27 located in Summerhaven Suites & Sweets.

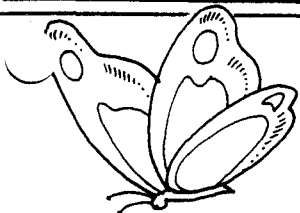
Accidents keep Fire Dept. busy

The Mt. Lemmon Fire Department has found themselves busy as usual with two vehicle accidents, four medical emergencies and one public assist.

In early March they were called to MP 24 when a Suzuki Samurai with four people in it rolled over. The victims were all transported to TMC, but there were no serious injuries reported.

A vehicle traveling down the mountain with two men spun out of control and hit a tree around MP 21. Fortunately, there were no serious injuries sustained although the men were transported to TMC for observation.

The Fire Dept. received a call that a rock climber had fallen around MP 9, but once on the scene they discovered it was actually at 7 Cataracts which is across the canyon from the road. The climber had fallen about 25' and broken an ankle. They stayed on the scene and assisted until Search and Rescue was able to arrive with equipment and rescue the man.

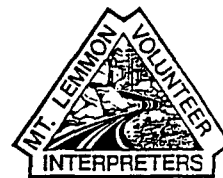

Islands in the Sky meetings interesting

Last month there was a series of 5 meetings around the southeastern part of the state so the public could voice its concerns about the proposed Islands in the Sky NRA. The meeting I attended was at the Innsuites on Oracle Rd. There were well over a hundred people there so we were divided up into small discussion groups of 10 or so, so everyone would have a chance to speak, and that part worked out well.

But, guess who showed up. It wasn't many of us homeowners, well maybe there were 10 or so, but there were over a hundred conservation and wilderness advocates from as far away as Oregon and New Hampshire. They were well organized and vocal. They are very opposed to anything that has the name "recreation" attached

to it, however, they might approve something that has their favorite buzzword, "bio-diverse", in the name.

Although it has never been fully explained by our Forest Service just what this whole NRA idea is about, I have been given the impression it is mostly a designation to enable the F.S. to get a little more funding to add to, fix up and maintain the present facilities in the campgrounds and picnic areas and the like. I never had the impression there would be power boats on Rose Lake or dune buggies on the back trails.

As Ranger Tom Quinn told us, the Catalinas aren't what they were 50, or even 25, years ago and they will continue to change, whether we want them to or not. Tucson will continue to grow and the use of the Catalinas will continue to rise. Money is needed to keep up with future demands; for

instance, more picnic tables, campsites and public toilets need to be built. Without more of them we will notice more folks camping in our driveways, dining on our decks and urinating in our streams.

I can't say as I am in favor of giving the Catalinas a name or designation that will attract even more people to them, but I am in favor of more maintenance and facilities for those who will be coming anyway.

No Red Food Coloring, Please

Once again the first reports of hummer sightings came around March 9. Since then they have survived blizzards and plenty of freezing nights. Tough little guys, aren't they? But apparently they can't survive red food color too well.

At a lecture by the Desert Museum we were told DO NOT ADD RED FOOD COLOR. It is a suspected culprit in tongue and liver lesions not really good for the birds. They can find the feeder with just the slightest bit of red on it.

If you are new to the mountain, or this is your first attempt at feeding hummers the recipe is as follows:

5 parts water

1 part sugar

Boil six minutes to kill the bacteria and retard spoilage.

Always clean the feeder before filling. The slightest bit of black mold will contaminate the whole bottle of syrup and keep the birds from using your feeder. The syrup needs to be

changed at least every 3 days. If it smells like alcohol, it needs to be changed more often because it has fermented and will make the bird sick.

If you only come up on weekends, you might try boiling up a batch of syrup and bringing it up in a gallon milk container so you can fill your feeder immediately upon arrival. Keep any extra syrup in the refrigerator.

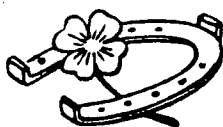

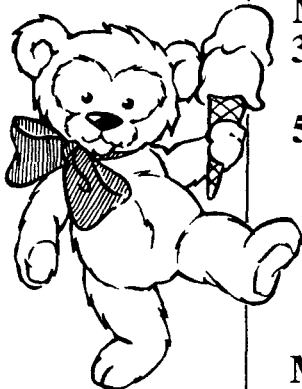
