Homeowner Board's donation helps Water Co-op

The MLHA Board recently voted to contribute \$2000 toward the legal expenses of the Water Co-op for perfecting the water rights and the in-stream flow issues. The Memorial Day Potluck brought in another \$312.50 earmarked for the Water Co-op's legal expenses. The importance of the water rights for this community cannot be understated. The issues facing the Water Board and the Water Co-op have no quick fixes.

District 4 Supervisor Paul Marsh ASKED to be part of our 4th of July Parade this year. He was willing just to walk as an entrant. This was the first time in our Parade's history that an elected official came to us! Fran Zimmerman, who has organized the parade for most of the 19 years of its existence, immediately deemed him Grand Marshall. Carl Gremmler, whose 1928 Model A roadster pick-up we've all admired in past parades, hosted the Grand Marshall and his wife Barbara. The Gremmler grandchildren and Bill Rhind filled in as volunteer fireman on the bright red roadster.

Patriarch leaves Mt. Lemmon

June 25, 1993 closed the door on an era; that was the day Max Klinger told his wife, Joan, that he had lived long enough and wanted to leave. By 11:00 p.m. that night his spirit had left his body, but will always be on Mt. Lemmon, the place he had chosen to live and die.

During the 47 years that Max Klinger lived in Summerhaven, his way of life set an example for many of us. He was a man of few words, but how he did things told us how much he cared for humanity, life and nature. He was a man of principle and displayed a true social conscience. He had great respect for others and demonstrated this belief in all of his human contacts.

Max was one of the fortunate people who took time to reminisce and enjoy living while pondering the past. During frequent short conversations with Max over recent years, he shared many thoughts with me. He often stated that Mt. Lemmon is the best place in the world to live. He said that during his working years it was a place that helped him rejuvenate so that he could function in an efficient manner in his work in Tucson. After retiring 40 years ago, he had more time to enjoy the mountain. He had a special way of saying that the sounds of nature filled the quiet in such a way that human life seemed almost insignificant. He expressed the thought that in his mountain retreat he was pervaded by a tranquillity that gave him a peace of mind that most people have forgotten can even exist.

Many of you have spent time at the Klinger residence where Max greeted you with a handshake, saying "Welcome to the mountain". He and his wife, Joan, gave graciousness and dignity to the mountain; working together they made people comfortable and their house was a warm haven for all who came to their home.

My last visit with my 100 year old friend, Max Klinger, was late afternoon, June 24, 1993. As I left his presence, Max waved and said, "Take it easy, Phil". I feel that a true Patriarch has left us.



Fire Department stays busy with calls for medical help

During the month of June, the Mt. Lemmon Fire Department responded to a total of 21 calls of emergency. Of these calls, 18 were medical calls.

We responded to a call at the Max Klinger residence. Max had passed away and will be dearly missed on the mountain. He was over 100 years old and his pleasant smile and piano recitals will be missed by all. Max was one of the corner stones on the mountain.

Earlier in the month we had a call to Turkey Run Road for Joan Klinger who had rolled her car off the road. She was somewhat shaken, but sustained minor injuries.

We received a call for a dehydrated person in the village and a possible miscarriage on Ajo. We had our usual number of calls to Windy Point for auto accidents and fallen persons.

June 6 we had a close call within 500 feet of the fire station. We received a call for a "smoke showing" on the back side down Oracle Road. The fire was started by a careless camper. We were on this call for about 10 hours and with the cooperation of the Forest Service, we had it under control with minor damage to about 4.5 acres.

We have been training in the areas of Hose Practices and Pumping Operations. We now have about eight active volunteers and reserves. Most are E.M.T.'s so we can use them on medical calls also. We have been exploring the possibility of enrolling in an I.E.M.T. program. With this certification, we will be able to perform more services and thus be more functional on the mountain. This class will begin in January

if we can obtain the proper funding. We will be attending class here on the mountain by tele-communication. It is an exciting concept and we look forward to this experience.

We will be sponsoring a dance on Saturday, July 24 here at the fire station. This dance will benefit the Mt. Lemmon Fire Department. It will be a dance to remember so don't be left out on this one!



CONSTRUCTION ALERT

Phase III Mt. Lemmon Highway Reconstruction
July 12 - July 25

The third phase of reconstruction on the Mount Lemmon Highway is underway. The lower section of the highway from milepost 5.9 to milepost 7.5 has been completed. The widening and safety improvement project from milepost 20.8 to milepost 25.0 continues and will necessitate some short traffic delays. It will be important that the public comply with all construction signing and be alert for construction vehicles in these areas.

The following restrictions will affect traffic during July 12 - July 25.

1. The highway reconstruction between milepost 5.9, in the area of Molino Basin Campground, to milepost 7.5, the Old Prison Camp Road, is now **COMPLETED**. Landscaping, lane striping and some clean-up is still underway in this area. Flagpersons will direct motorists safely through the area.
3. The highway is **OPEN** between milepost 20.8, just north of the Palisades Ranger Station to milepost 25, at Summerhaven, with short delays Monday through Thursday. During these times traffic may travel behind a pilot car on a maintained and scenic detour route and may experience delays up to 15 minutes.

Recreation facilities and businesses at Ski Valley and Summerhaven are open during the reconstruction project.

The series of artists' receptions and shows sponsored by ...and Other Treats Gallery located in Summerhaven Suites and Sweets has been a great success this summer. The participating artists have brought unusual and unique talent to the mountain so far and there is more to come. Sonni Wendt and Kathy Haun are showing their work now through Monday, July 26.

Sonni, one of our local artists, is an expert in handweaving and handspinning. Her original, one-of-a-kind creations include garments as well as wearable tapestries. During her worldwide travels she has studied ethnic weaving, fibers and art. She has also given and taught handweaving workshops. In 1986 Sonni was juried into the Tucson Museum of Art and is now represented there. She is the recipient of numerous awards since she first entered juried shows in 1985.

Kathy Haun, a resident of Tucson and part time resident of Mt. Lemmon, creates designs in wood. She was educated in China, Canada and the United States, and is listed in Who's Who - American Women and recipient of numerous awards. She has received architectural commissions from many Tucson business and residences for her carved doors. Kathy's work is part of a permanent collection of the Tucson Museum of Art and the College of Wooster in Ohio.

Beginning July 31, Karen Dziengel's Lacota sculpture and masks will be at the Gallery. An artist's reception will be held Saturday evening, July 31, from 6:30 to 8:00 p.m. and her art will be displayed through August 9.

Handmade porcelain dolls by Joyce Motzkin and Nancy Eveland will be on display and available from Saturday, August 7 through August 13. Joyce is a full-time resident of the mountain. The artist's reception will be August 7 from 6:30 to 8:00 p.m..

Jamela is the work of two artists, Jan Nell and Pamela Howe. Their multi-media sculptures are a study in form, texture and light. As a visual statement, they express the balance of the human spirit with nature. Their work will be on display from Saturday, August 14 - 26 with the artist reception August 14 from 6:30 to 8:00 p.m. at the Gallery.




