Help save our cold, clear water

Co-op struggles to keep up with costly flood and construction repairs

Drinking water on Mt. Lemmon is a precious resource. Most of us take the water at the tap for granted, that it will always be there and will always taste pure, cold and sweet. It is the job of the Mt. Lemmon Water Cooperative to get the water from the upper Sabino water basin into storage tanks and through lines into the homes and businesses on Mt. Lemmon. All of this costs money and those costs are going up. And one thing is clear to me as a new Board member, the constant monthly bill charged to our customers is not enough to cover these expenses.

New laws, federal and state, impose new expensive requirements on the Co-op. The Co-op has been forced to hire an attorney to protect all of our water rights from some conflictual claims brought by the U.S. Forest Service. Storage of enough water to serve the community during the high use period of the summer requires costly repair to existing tanks and lines, plus purchase of new storage tanks. We were dangerously low in our water supply during July of this year.

The Co-op currently serves 356 metered sites, home and business. Yet, only about 190

of those customers have paid their one-time membership fee of \$200 and joined the Water Co-op. If the other 166 or so present users paid their membership fee, the Co-op would have enough money to repair a main storage tank the Co-op has not been able to fix due to lack of money.

Membership in the Water Co-op will insure that you have part ownership in the system and you will have a vote in important decisions to be made in the coming months, such as the need for rate increases, formation of a water district.

If you are not already a member, we urge you to take a moment now and send in your checkfor \$200.00. Or if you prefer, sign the authorization below and the modest cost of \$10.00 will be added to your monthly water bill for 20 months. If you just want to make a contribution, we certainly would appreciate your generosity.

Remember the benefit of the Water Co-op every time you use that pure, cold mountain water.

Fire Dept. victim of theft after receiving false call

The Mt. Lemmon Fire Dept. responded to a total of 19 calls of emergency during the month of July. Of these calls, 11 were for medical emergencies, four were wild land fires, two were motor vehicle accidents and two were camp fire related calls.

We have been receiving a large number of false calls lately. These calls seem to be coming from the Windy Point area for "cars over the side" or "persons injured". When we arrive at the scene, no one is injured or we can't find the vehicle. It was during one of these calls, we had an electric generator stolen from the fire station.

One interesting call was for a man that came to the station with a very large laceration to the top of his head. He had been "caving" in some old abandoned mines on the back side when he fell. He sustained a four inch laceration on top of his head. We transported him to Tucson. This brings up the dangers of some of these old mines and several reasons not to climb into them without proper equipment or permission. Several persons are killed each year because of this type of activity. If you are hiking and come across an

old mine shaft, do not enter because of cave-ins or other potential hazards involved.

We have been investigating the possibility of enrolling in a I,EMT class here at Mt. Lemmon. This certification will allow us to become more involved with patient care. We must rely on a unit from Tucson for more advanced procedures and intervention. We have been advised to conduct advanced patient care from our base hospital on several occasions and could not because of our basic life support status.

We hosted a dance on July 24th here at the fire station. This dance was a great success. We had live music, backed up with tapes and CD's. Tom Carpenter played the guitar, with a little help from the Chief, and John Robinson did a superb job as the D.J.. We want to thank all involved for all the work in making this a wonderful outing. I most want to thank my wonderful wife for all of her hard work and organization, along with the Fire Board members for the money for the dance. We will be hosting another dance in the very near future. I will keep you posted for the date and time of the next Mt. Lemmon "Dance Under the Stars".



Birds and Bees Flowers and Trees ...and Pine Siskins

Never heard of Pine Siskins you say? Well, be advised, they are coming to a feeder near you. They're not new to the mountain, but they are either becoming more numerous or maybe just learning of the goodies they can find in your feeder.

Pine Siskins are an ordinary looking little brown bird, rather like a sparrow, but of the finch family. When you observe closely you will notice a finely streaked brown on beige breast, some yellow streaks in the wings and at the base of the tail. They have a sharp slender bill and a deeply notched tail. (Sparrows tail have no notch.) They can hang upside down like chickadees to pluck seeds out of cones.



Siskins habitat is conifer-aspen forests from Alaska to northern Mexico. They nest in conifers about 10 feet from the ground and since they are very social birds sometimes their nests are only a few feet apart. The male feeds the female frequently during the courtship thus insuring many healthy eggs and strong chicks. Ms. Siskin lays 3-6 bluish eggs, spotted with brown, in a grasslined, cupped nest. The young siskin is quite yellowish at first, but by the end of the summer looks like all the other adults.

During breeding season siskins move about in small flocks, but after the young mature the flocks become big, usually 50-200 and occasionally up to 1000 ...now wouldn't you hate to have a bunch like that discover your feeders! So far

I've not seen any huge flocks on Mt. Lemmon, but in the winter siskins join up with juncos, titmice and red crossbills and roam about the mountain hoping for sunflower seeds and suet concoctions.

Be watching for Pine Siskins at your feeders. They are fairly tame and you can get quite close to them. Like our chickadees and nuthatches, they are friendly little fellows and nice to have around.



Hummingbird Alert

Due to the large numbers of hummingbirds this year it is recommended that you leave your feeders up through mid-October. Hummingbirds do not simply leave when the feeders are removed. By leaving your feeder up, you will help stop starvation.


The last show of the season will include two very different artists and will open Saturday, Sept 4 at the 6:30 p.m. artists' reception.

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
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
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
