Water Co-op Board explains need for Water District at Annual Meeting

The Annual "State of the Water" meeting on the mountain was a productive one. Those present at the Mt. Lemmon Water Co-op meeting held Saturday, May 28, 1994 at the fire station heard from its Board of Directors about the Co-operative's current financial concerns and plans for the future.

John Mulay, Co-op Maintenance Chairman, reported on the recent collapse of the floor of the Carter Canyon storage tank and other system needs and problems. The money to repair the Carter Canyon tank will need to be diverted from \$10,000 which the Board had only just two weeks prior approved spending on a critical development of a main distribution line to the Loma Linda side of the system. Although the Loma Linda line will likely cost over \$200,000 to complete, the start of the line was viewed by the Board as an important beginning on the project. That will have to wait again while the immediate needs of the system are attended to, a pattern which has become frustratingly too familiar for the Cooperative in recent

Board President Alex Carrillo updated the membership about the progress achieved in the recent past on the Water Management Plan for the mountain with the U.S. Forest Service. Formal signing of the agreement reached awaits new replacements for key local officials of the Forest Service who retired recently.

What followed was a productive and open discussion about the future of the Co-operative. The Board gave its consensus opinion that the maintenance of the Co-op's water delivery system will only be able to be accomplished if the Co-op moves to become a Water District. This quasi-governmental organization will allow for a substantial increase in the number of property owners who will contribute to the annual budget. A

water district would assess a reasonable fee from all mountain property owners in the same way that all property owners now pay assessments to run the Mt. Lemmon Fire District. This increase in revenue will give the District a newfound ability to meet its needs, something the Co-op can't presently do.

Other benefits a direct savings of the approximate \$8500 per year in property taxes the Co-op presently pays. A water district would be exempt from payment of these property taxes. The District would also be free of the Arizona Corporation Commission with its myriad rules, regulations and apparent lack of interest with Co-op problems. And, forming a Water District will dramatically raise the credibility of our water delivery system. This will likely help in the competition for development grants and loans which would help meet some of the capital improvements which lay ahead.

Following the open meeting the newly elected Board members, Chuck Autrey and Ross Quigley, joined the previous members for a Board meeting. Office elections were held for the upcoming year. The new

officers are:

Maint - John Mulay The new Board will soon be asked to formally approve the filing of the necessary papers to form a Water District. Since the assurance of a water delivery system on the mountain rides on the outcome, all property owners are encouraged to approve the Water District Petition when the signature documents are circulated. You will be voting to protect your investment on the mountain and helping to maintain everyone's water service. In the meantime, as always conserve water while enjoying your mountain property.

Bisbee Avenue cabin fire possible arson

Pima County Sheriff's Dept is investigating a cabin fire on Bisbee Avenue May 22. The fire department received the call at 5:43 p.m. and was out of the station within two minutes.

They responded with two engines, two tenders and the pumper. The fast response of our volunteer fire fighters and local residents was a great help to the fire crew.

The cabin, owned by William White, sustained moderate structural damage with the highest loss to the cabin contents. The cabin was unoccupied at the time of the fire, but after investigation it appears to have been arson.

The fire could have turned disastrous had there been strong winds that day. Within the immediate vicinity there are five other cabins and the usual carpet of pine needles nestled around all providing great fuel to the flames. Fortunately, the weather was calm averting major loss, but underscoring the importance of following the department's requests to clear pine needles and fire hazards from around our cabins.

Fire fighters Jeff Bird and Dean Barnella, Fire Chief Phil Anselmi and the volunteers had the fire out by 6:56 p.m.. A special thanks to the following volunteers for their efforts: Leroy and Tony Day, Will Jester, Ed and Anna Motzkin, John Robinson, Dave Ross, Mike Stanley and Sonja VonEhrenstein. Mt. Lemmon highway project receives ASLA design award

The Federal Highway
Administration's Phase I of the
improvement project on the Mt.
Lemmon Highway from the base of
the mountain to milepost 3 has
received an American Society of
Landscape Architects (ASLA) Design
Merit Award.

The award recognized the success of the landscape team in repairing the landscape to appear natural within three years. The project was completed in 1989. Joanne Gallaher, ASLA, project landscape architect and Sarah Davis, forest landscape architect both of the U.S. Department of Agriculture -Forest Service, Coronado National Forest designed cut and fill slopes that fit into the natural terrain and helped develop special blasting techniques to create craggy rock faces. The award also cited the salvaging and replanting of hundreds of saguaro, barrel cactus and ocotillo on the project.

Other professionals who were commended for their work on the project included Mark Taylor, design engineer and Ben Torres, construction engineer, both of the Federal Highway Administration, Central Federal District Division; Bob Cummings geotechnical engineer, Engineers International; John Yenter, Yenter & Sons Blasting, Inc; Mountain Gravel Construction Company; and Jeff Franklin, Franklin Drilling and Blasting.

Aggressive javelinas & water conservation topics at Annual Homeowners potluck

Cadie Pruss, Wildlife Manager from Arizona Game and Fish spoke about the problems developing with our little band of javelinas. While they have been fun to watch, they have adjusted to being fed by several residents and are now becoming a problem. In addition to being somewhat destructive, they have now turned aggressive charging both people and pets.

While Game & Fish did not commit to removing them from the mountain, Pruss did indicate they are studying that option. In the meantime, she stressed the importance of not feeding wild animals as they can become a problem. The end result being that we humans are turning good wildlife into problem wildlife.

On the water conservation side, Glenn Phillips, owner of The Ecology Store in Tucson, provided us with a table top show displaying the many items available to conserve water. From shower reducing heads to water collection and filtration systems, his store is an excellent source for the mountain cabin owner. Glenn has worked with a number of Willow Canyon residents installing solar toilets, cisterns and other water collection devices. He is a licensed general contractor and available to work on the mountain. You can reach Glenn at 327-3235.

There has been an excellent response to the cabin security profile sheets included in the last Echoes. Deputy Ed Hardesty announced at the annual potluck, that he has received over a 30% return. He also announced a change from the original plans to keep these profiles filed at the Fire Station. They will instead be kept by Deputy Hardesty for the Sheriff's Department. While he will maintain these files, blank sheets will be available at the fire station for any changes or updates that you might need to make. If you haven't filled one out, please take the time to do so and drop by or send to the Fire Station.

Ed also reported that the security placards will be available soon for distribution. In an effort to make the laminated placards harder to duplicate or steal, they will have the P.C. Sheriff's decal, a registration number coded to your security profile, the last three digits of your address and finally, color coded to your area on the mountain.

It is recommended that these cards be placed in an easily visible window when you or guests/renters are in residence. Do not put them in cars. A suggestion for property rentals was for the card to be returned with the cabin key before security deposit is refunded. With all these precautions, the security placard will make it easier for both the sheriff's department and your neighbors to determine if the people in your cabin should be there.

As you have already heard, we have low water reserves, and this could be a very dry summer. Continue to promote water conservation and fire safety. Heavy usage, open faucets and leaks in water lines and tanks left a few cabins without water over the Memorial Day weekend.

Remember this is a <u>co-op</u> - and that means you and I are also responsible to see that the system works. Look for water leaks where lines might be buried and report this

info to the Water Co-op. Use low flow devices whenever possible. Finally, be supportive of the Water Board in their efforts to keep our water system afloat this summer.

Don't forget the 4th of July Parade! Anyone can participate. Look for the registration form in this issue and be sure to enter before June 28. See you at the Parade!



Fire department call load picks up

The department responded to a total of 13 calls in April. Again the majority were for medical assistance, three were motor vehicle and one a false alarm.

With the greater need for medical service, we will begin class work on our I,EMT class on June 10. We have also applied for a grant from the Department of Health and have passed the first level of eligibility. The next level is a meeting on June 15 to explain our needs for a new four wheel drive ambulance. With a new ambulance and our advanced training, we will be able to provide Advanced Life Support as well as transport a patient to Tucson.

Over the past year, we have unfortunately been victim to several thefts. Over \$4000 worth of equipment, including donations from Fred Pace and the Homeowner's Association as well as a complete firefighter's outfit and other equipment have been stolen from the station. Insurance has replaced a portion and we have taken steps to beef up our security at the station. We feel at this time that the problem has been solved.

We still have numbers available at the station for anyone who has not yet put up their cabin numbers. Please stop by at your earliest convenience to pick up yours' and get them posted.

We are continuing to do our home inspections for fire safety. Contact the fire department to set up your appointment.

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Birds & Bees Flowers & Trees ...and Hermit Thrush

You may never have seen this robin-size bird, but you probably have heard the Hermit Thrush sing...it sounds like someone is playing a flute off in the distance.

Mostly I see it bobbing along on the ground as it eats ants, spiders and worms. It is a brownish-grayish bird with a very speckled breast and whitish eye ring. Found in conifers and mixed woodlands, it is fairly common, but shy. The Hermit is our only thrush with the habit of slowly raising its tail several times a minute. In birding terms, it also "twinkles" which means it habitually flips its wings.

The song is a single high flute-like note followed by a rapid series of rising and falling notes. I like Audubon's description which is, "Loud, slow repetitive phrases spiralling down the scale carry and echo in the still of the evening forest; it also sings at dawn. Many consider this the most beautiful bird song in America." Roger T. Peterson describes it as "perhaps the most ethereal, varied song of all." Once you have really listened, you will always notice it thereafter.

Its nest is usually on the ground or low in a conifer and near a moist area and made of weeds, rotted wood, twigs, grass, moss, maybe some mud and a lining of fine materials. The eggs are plain greenish-blue and about 3/4 inch long.

I usually can find this bird in the picnic area that's off to the side and across the bridge in Marshall Gulch. Another place I see it is at the intersection of Middle Sabino Road and Lane where the little creek runs under the road on Middle Sabino Lane.

The Hermit Thrush is one of the songbirds that has been observed "anting". Whatzat you ask? Two ways have been observed, but neither ever by me. The Hermit, and the other songbirds too, picks up ants in its bill and rubs them on its feathers. Or less commonly, the songbird sits upon an anthill and spreads it wings and trys to disturb the ants so they will swarm up among the feathers.

The purpose of all this is not understood, but the best guess is the ants' defensive secretions are used as an insecticide, fungicide, miticide and bactericide. If you ever see such behavior, stop and watch because you are seeing something that most folks never will.

It was named Hermit because it spends the winters alone. I have seen it in the lower Chiricahaus in the winter; it winters anywhere in southern North America all the way to Guatemala and El Salvador.
