Notes from the Water Co-op President...

Will monsoons bring relief soon?

As I sit at my desk in Tucson and write this report on Sunday morning, July 17th, I am watching rain wet down the patio tile and moisten the browned leaves of patio plants that just a few weeks ago were green and lush. The desert is in desperate need of monsoon relief. Everywhere there is talk of a water shortage.

The City of Tucson recently announced a summer-use surcharge plan. The Metro Water District and Avra Valley both were reported as having water shortages lately in newspaper reports. Both of those water systems were appealing to their customers to conserve water. The Metropolitan Water District even installed a dedicated line to tap into City of Tucson water if their own reserves run out.

The Mt. Lemmon Cooperative Water Company does not have the luxury of looking to the City of Tucson for help. As a spring-fed system on the mountain "Island of Catalina", the Water Co-op is very much a captive of mother nature's

whims at this time.

Our spring flows, which run at or above 50 gallons per minute in good times but were down to 10 gallons per minute in early June, are now below 6 gallons per minute. You can watch the streams dry up in their beds as the summer drags on.

We still have some water in our storage tanks. But, if we fall below 350,000 gallons, we'll send out notice that we will be in Phase 3 of our Water Curtailment Plan which will mean mandatory water-use restrictions, as opposed to our present voluntary conservation Phase 2 status.

In the meantime, recent reports of the mountain being "out of water" are both unfortunate and inaccurate. Such reports interfere with Mt. Lemmon businesses and unnecessarily scare people from

using the mountain. Clearly, water is a real concern, and the Board of the Water Co-op wants all customers to conserve water. Visitors to the mountain should be encouraged to also conserve and perhaps, bring their own water and ice when coming up to the mountain for a

The Board will also take steps to insure that future statements to the news media from or by Co-op representatives are either preapproved by the Board or are given out by a Board-approved spokesperson to help insure accurate news reporting of the problems.

With the cooperation of everyone, including Mother Nature, we'll see the stream flows steadily rising again soon.

Echoes from the past

There are at least two legends of how the CATALINAS got their name. Both say that Father Kino named them and they were originally the Santa Catarinas.

One story is that he named them after his sister. The other is that he first came to them in 1697 on St. Catherine's Day, and that it was a custom to name places for the Saint's Day upon which they were first visited.

Over the years the name has evolved to SANTA CATALINAS.

MT. BIGELOW - In the early 1870's a young Lt. John Bigelow, Jr. of the 10th Cavalry was a scout in the Santa Rita's. His father was the Ambassador to France from 1864 to 1867.

In 1974 the Mt. Lemmon Accommodation School was renamed the T.H. ZIMMERMAN ACCOMMODATION SCHOOL.. Tony is recognized as one of Pima County's outstanding retired teachers. However, Tony never taught at this school and Bob was never a student there.

SABINO CANYON: In the 1870's Sabino Otera had a cattle ranch near the mouth of the canyon.



Pigs in paradise

While the top of Mt. Lemmon may never have been home to a herd of javelina before, they do inhabit areas between 5,500 and 7,500 feet in elevation. Herds at these elevations were studied around the Mogollon Rim. This was considered marginal habitat because of the lack of adequate food and severe winters. The Summerhaven herd has combatted the adverse winter weather and lack of food by smuggling up against a warm house, covered by a porch and then going out for dinner.

The average homerange size is only one square mile (not much bigger than Summerhaven and surrounding homes). Within the homerange is a network of regularly used trails linking feeding areas to bedding and water areas. Javelina are territorial and will actively defend their homerange by raising the hair on their backs and making tooth and jaw popping to intimidate a potential threat. A vocalization called "woofing" alerts other herd members to possible dangers.

It is generally recognized that a herd of 7 or more javelina can adequately defend themselves, groups smaller than that are more susceptible to predation. Their sense of smell is very keen, while their hearing is only a little better than that of humans. They have very poor eyesight with studies showing that a javelina has difficulty seeing a moving man beyond 75 yards.

Their diet consists of roots, tubers and bulbs, cacti and other succulent plants, mesquite beans and they especially enjoy bird seed.

Many of you recognize that feeding the group on the mountain has created a people-dependant herd, one that has become more demanding. At the Memorial Day dinner I was invited to attend, we discussed ways to convince people who feed them that it is not only hazardous to other homeowners, but also potentially deadly to the animals.

As a rule of thumb, wildlife will stay wild and away from people when there are no enticements. All wildlife need food, water, shelter and space to survive. When people provide one of these elements, they are inviting the animal into "our" space and creating a dependency. More often than not this relationship goes bad. Wild animals do not respect property and, sooner or later, become a nuisance rather than a unique experience.

(The Mt. Lemmon "herd" has been spotted off and on all summer. At this time, there has been no attempt to move them. If you have any questions or comments, you may contact Cadie Pruss at 628-5376.)


The Water Dude
