Fire Season is Back !!!!!

Fuel moisture are drying and fire is happening. Last weekend, October 9th, there were two-tourist caused forest fires. One was the result of an illegal off-road activity - the vehicle caught fire and spread to the forest. Drinkers caused the second fire. They built an unsafe campfire that spread to the forest

near Rose Lake.

In addition to the drying trends, the cooler weather will bring additional fire hazards campfires for warmth, furnaces, and fireplace ashes. We can't let guard down. Improper disposal of ashes and unattended campfires are the leading causes of fires on the mountain. Insure that all ashes are properly stored in metal containers, away from combustible materials. Remember that both cabins and pine needles are considered combustible materials.

Any cabin firebox or furnace

receive

proper

should

maintenance before use this winter. In addition to being a fire hazard, improperly serviced units also be deadly carbon-monoxide producers. The odorless, colorless gas causes death by slow asphyxiation. To protect your cabin and the occupants within, insure that smoke and carbon monoxide detectors are in working order. Conditions are improving for prescription burns. The forest service is currently checkin conditions for possibly conducting the second half of the Loma Linda burn late in October. The first half was conducted last January. Signs will be posted if the burn is initiated. The Loma Linda burn area starts at the fire station and goes down the back road approximately 3 miles. It also includes the sewer treatment building area part of Crystal Springs Trail. Prescription burns are conducted to both improve the forest health and

reduce the fire hazard to the

village.

Another large burn is planned for early November in the Happy Valley area just behind the Rincon Mountains.

Conditions are also good to continue pile fires within the village. If you have raked piles of pine needles, call the fire station (576-1201) for a burn appointment.

The Fire District is currently working on the purchase of a newer 4-wheel drive ambulance. The newer unit will replace the two, high maintenance vans currently in use today. The 4-wheel drive will provide us the capability of continuing emergency transport of critical patients and inclement weather transport of all patients. The unit delivery is expected during the week of October 18th.

Just a reminder - The Annual Halloween party is scheduled for Saturday, October 23rd at 5:00 PM at the Fire Station. Hope to see you there.

The weather has been unusually

warm for mid October. The leaves are starting to turn to their beautiful shades of orange, rust and red. Bear Wallow has plenty of color while some warmer protected areas still have green leaves. If you haven't had a chance to enjoy the fall colors you still have a couple of weeks. The sunny fall days are great for a nice hike or just sitting and

enjoying the colors. It is hard to

believe that in only a month we could be having freezing nights and cold blustery days.

The Mt. Lemmon Cooperative

Water Company has had a busy year. The new transmission line to Loma Linda is operational. Our new storage tank should be completed by the end of October. To view the new 212,000 gallon tank, hike up Turkey Run road (past Mt. Lemmon Realty) to the end of the pavement. It is about a 2 miles from the Forest Service gate to the tank. The Columbia tank has approximately 17,000 bolts. It is located on the old Rugg cabin site. This tank will eventually provide a raw water supply to our future filtration system. The water from the filter

will then be stored for delivery in

a future 1 million-gallon tank on

the same site. A water reminder to all cabin owners. It is time to winterize vour cabin. Every year we experience large water losses and cabin damage due to frozen water lines. Lets make this year a first and not have to send large water bills to customers for water losses. or have the disappointment of finding your cabin damaged by thousands of gallons of water seeping through the floors. Suggestions for names have included Summerhaven Enlightenment or celebration of the Summer Solstice. We'll start with a LIGHTING CONTEST. WE WANT TO MAKE IT AN EVENT! Save out your Christmas lights, or buy lights on sale after Christmas for this event. It's hard to find lights in May. Just let your neighbors know to save out the lights, or some decorations from your Christmas supplies to use on Mt Lemmon or to buy Christmas lights on sale in Dec with concept of theme decorating of your cabins. We're working on categories. Here are a few suggestions to date: red/white/blue lights for 4th of July, white lights white Knights, Fire Flies Parade, Starry starry nights, Moon over Mt Lemmon, etc. We could have a contest for the participating cabins to be judged (possibility by Trico) in June.

When I presented this to the Mt Lemmon Woman's club for support at the October meeting, they offered to support & sponsor this as a Group.

How to help make 4th of July which falls on a a Tuesday - special for Y2K - since we can't have fireworks, we can have a different kind of light show. We can light up cabins!

Some early feedback:

Dear Dani, I shared with Chet your ideas about decorative lights next summer on the mountain for people up here and from Tucson to enjoy at night. He brought up a concern which I think was validity. At least in our area (LSHA), we wouldn't want to attract or invite the public onto our roads because they are signed as "private property" and we discourage unauthorized travel on them because of liability concerns. Perhaps for Summerhaven, it might work, but you might want to make that distinction. Hope this is helpful info/feedback.

Judy - this is a valid point and I'm glad you mentioned it- Here is my initial response:

Why have a Summerhaven Summer Festival of Lights?

#1. This is a celebration of the year 2000 by our small community.

#2. Because we know from past experience. how the reconstruction has negatively affected the businesses. Hopefully, we can create another reason for folks to weather the bumpy dirt & gravel detours, pilot cars and delays. Even those in Loma Sabino enjoy the conveniences the local businesses offer. And, we're talking about 3 months out of the year 2000 - but these can be the prime \$\$ months for most businesses. The businesses could have "uptown Saturday nights" similar to what downtown Tucson does to promote revenue to the ailing downtown Tucson area.

This will draw property owners & their guests out in the early evenings throughout the summer to enjoy a stroll around the village. And, a draw from the Tucson valley as an attraction during the summer months couldn't hurt the village businesses either. The concept of twinkling lights on the cabins throughout the summer on weekends would keep the tourist pressure off of a one or 2 week display. Winterhaven does Christmas lights over a condensed 2 week period - and while I doubt seriously that we could become the reverse twin of Winterhaven/ /Summerhaven in visual appeal, having lights displayed during the summer (with an emphasis on the 4th of July - when we can't use fireworks - using "light" works) may be an added incentive to keep visitors returning to the mountain during the construction phase of the highway with all it's pitfalls and I checked, and early reports regarding light pollution form strings of Christmas lights in nominal.

One thing I have noticed, cars will drive these roads whether posted private or not, lights or no lights. Some people just want to look at the architecture and flavor the small community atmosphere. If our few remaining businesses don't bring in

enough revenue during this construction period, we'll all lose out - it's nice to have a gift shop, or a place to have a drink & eat & stay overnight.

Again, I'm looking for feedback - let me know what you think - this won't work without YOU!


