-- NO we are not rationing water as yet. But our tanks are dangerously low and the flow rates on our springs are as slow as we have seen them in 20 vears. As I write this article and plea the last meaningful precipitation we had was the night of January 1st (6"- 8" of snow) and before that it the middle was September. When you consider the lack of precipitation. causing slow spring flows and add a couple of serious water leaks in December and January it adds up to a very low water reserve. We have fixed all known leaks and are pumping from all available sources in an effort to get our tanks back to a safe supply level, but without your help

suggest that you do such things as not water outdoor plants and trees, do laundry downtown, use paper plates/cups as much as possible, bring up drinking water, don't let the water run until it gets hot -- heat it on the stove/hot plate, don't flush your

toilets until absolutely necessary (if it's yellow let it mellow, if it's brown send it down) and turn off your water at the meter before you leave the mountain. If you can think of any other ways to conserve our water please pass it on to your friends and neighbors and together we will get through the crisis.

- As I write this article, we anxiously await possible snow. Pine needles are dry. Trees are thirsty. Unless we get a lot of snow, Fire conditions will continue to get worse as summer approaches. With the current dry conditions,

extreme precautions must be taken to avoid fireplace and fire box ash pile fires. Insure that all ashes are cold before disposing of them. A new project is in the works to assist with the reduction of fuels within the village. We will again this year have a dumpster available near the station to haul pine needles and tree slash. The Fire District is also constructing a slash The burner is burner. mounted trailer. on а Instead of burning pine needle piles on the ground (messy and slow), the piles can be placed in the forced air furnace for faster and safer consumption. The burner will also allow for faster pile re-ignitions incase firefighters have to respond to emergencies. The burner should be ready for operation later this spring.

VILLAGE EVACUATION HORNS - Thanks to the Mt. Lemmon Home Owners' Association and the Mt. Lemmon Women's Club. funding has been provided to purchase two evacuation horns. The portable compressed air horns will be strategically placed in the village. In case of a serious and immediate threat from fire in the village area, the horns will sound for an evacuation. Since the horns are portable, they will be stored in the off seasons, and can easily be tested away from the village. This eliminates the aggravating noises of regular siren testing. Also, since the horns or operated by compressed air, the horns only require general electricity for battery

charging. They will operate in a power outage. The horns are radio activated, making it possible for the fire department to easily

activate the horns without leaving the fire area. The horns are on order and should be in place later this spring. When the horns arrive, details of evacuation procedures will be made available.

SMOKEY THE BEAR RETURNS -

For the last several years, the MLFD station displayed a Smokey the Bear flag. The flag, which had been provided in 1999 by the State Land Department, was apparently a one of a kind. No replacement was available. The State Land Department reclaimed the flag to have a local flag maker generate new flags. We now have a new version (on the flag pole) and the




