

BUILDING A FIREWISE COMMUNITY

A way to improve forest health and reduce chance of devastating fire damage

Look for the following: (These will be marked for removal)

√ Downed, dead or dying trees
Branches with mistletoe

✓ Trees with bark beetle infestation ✓ Deformed or damaged trees (broken tops, crooks, or excessive leans)

✓ Ladder fuels (branches, especially dead ones, extending down to the forest floor from 10-15 ft. above)

Identify the following: (These will be marked for thinning)

√ Thickets of smaller, thinner trees growing close together

✓ An abundance of large trees with overlapping canopies

Instructions:

Preview your own lot using this checklist and mark the above items using ½ wide green stretch tie/garden tie. (This will blend in with the forest and prevent an eyesore for you and your neighbors, as well as eliminate the chance of accidental removal by work crews in the area.) Judy Epstein, 760-2802, is available to assist anyone who wants or needs help.

Later a qualified and experienced person will review your lot, clarifying whether something was missed or unnecessarily marked.

REMEMBER: No one is required to act on any of these recommendations and for Loma-Sabino Homeowners, the LSHO Board must APPROVE every tree before it can be removed.

Mt. Lemmon homeowners are becoming involved with FireWISE (Will It Survive Embers) activities. About 50 people have watched the 20 minute version of "A Matter of

Time" (available for free checkout at the Mt. Lemmon General Store or the Fire Station). This video serves as an excellent catalyst for understanding the predicament of our community and motivates people to look more closely at the forest around them and their own property. Since last publication, 30 people have signed up to be on the list to have their lot assessed by a qualified person. The list continues to grow and you may add your name by contacting Judy Epstein, 760-2802 or nRichLife@aol.com and provide the following information:

your Mt. Lemmon address, your Tucson phone number, and if available your Mt. Lemmon phone number and e-mail address. This year's climatic conditions on the mountain have been very favorable for warding off devastating wildfires, yet none of us know what next year will bring or the years to follow. NOW is the best time to become educated and carry out plans that improve your cabin's chance of surviving embers, either from a neighbor's cabin fire or a wildland (forest or wilderness) fire. Last summer when conditions were extreme, our concerns were heightened by the loss of homes in the Los Alamos fire. I remember reading that they were 4 years into their firewise educational program. On Monday, August 6, I visited Los Alamos and spoke with the Deputy Fire Chief, Doug Tucker, and the Fire Marshall. Robert "Robbie" Stibbard. understand what happened there, specifically what had been done "firewise" and if it made any real difference, I asked bold questions and got honest answers.

Although firewise educational efforts had been provided for 4 years, many Los Alamos homeowners ignored the information -- they either dismissed it as unimportant and not worth the change required or thought a critical situation would never arise or that they could take action later.

Although firewise educational efforts had been provided for 4 years, many Los Alamos homeowners ignored the information -- they either dismissed it as unimportant and not worth the change required or thought a critical situation would never arise or that they could take action later.

Needless to say, most of the residents did nothing or very little. A firewise program is only as effective as the actions homeowners take. However, had they taken the firewise action, Fire Marshal Robbie Stibbard estimates that losses would have been reduced by 40-50%, if not more. Robbie explained that as the forest fire reached homes bordering the forest, the dynamics of the fire changed and the fire "laid down" (lowered from the crowns to the ground). Unfortunately. preventative actions were not taken and embers began to catch the homes on fire. One home's fire spread to the next and a chain reaction began to occur especially in the direction of the wind current. which in most cases is uphill. One home amongst all the homes that did burn down survived. It survived the embers from the forest and the embers from surrounding homes because on this property, trees were thinned and the homeowner had followed firewise preventative measures. This more than anything illustrates that YOU can make a difference! Please review the FireWISE flyer attached to last

month's Echoes or go to our website **www.mtlemmonfire.com** and click on the link for the FireWISE flyer in the body of text.

Other valuable information gained from this visit to Los Alamos was learning about products that shield a home from catching on fire. The most practical means for our community (other than replacing siding and roofing) is the use of fire retardant on structures. fighting foam, soap, and gel products are not recommended for our community because they need to be applied as the fire is fast approaching (it protects for as little as 4 hours after application) and these products require water from a garden hose to apply. Fire retardant products, on the other hand, are applied via a sprayer and protect for a minimum of 5 to 10 years. The products are applied directly and dry with a clear finish, or are mixed in with latex exterior paint. A rough estimate for an individual to purchase enough fire retardant for 1000 sq. ft. cabin would cost about \$320, however the firewise committee is researching these costs and the fire district may purchase larger quantities for a much lower price per gallon, passing on the savings to homeowners.

Robbie also explained fire ratings to me. He said concrete has a rating of 1 whereas wood has a rating of 100 and Trex (a new material made of recycled plastic grocery bags and sawdust) a rating of 80. A new Wildland-Interface Building code ordinance passed this February for the Los Alamos County requiring stricter fire ratings. For example all new decks must have a rating of 70 or lower, also referred to as a Class II Flame Spread Classification. Applying a qualified fire retardant brings a wood deck's rating to acceptable levels, below 70. The Mt. Lemmon Fire District, 576-1201, will soon have pertinent information on many of these products, providing an economical means for better safeguarding our cabins and community.



Measure carefully, keep the bags upright, make sure all the ingredients get into the bag. Everybody gets a chance to measure and pour.

Dissolve 1 package of Rapid Rise yeast in one cup warm (125 degree) water. Let stand. Watch the yeast bubble. Smell the yeast. Talk about what yeast is and what it does. Remember: yeast is fungi ("fun guy!") Add the yeast mix and 3Tbs. vegetable oil to the bag.

Close the bag tightly and begin to mix. Have a good time mushing and squishing the ingredients until everything is well mixed. Pass the bags and squish, squish, squish. Wash and dry all 22 hands. Put the dough on a clean, floured surface and knead for 3 to 4 minutes. Cover with plastic wrap and let rest for 10 minutes.

Little hands need to knead for more than 4 minutes. Knead, knead, knead. Whew! Time to play tag outside while the dough sits.

Roll the dough out to a 12 by 17 inch rectangle. Roll the rectangle up from the narrow end, lightly oil loaf, and fit into a greased loaf pan. If the loaf pan is small, divide the dough. Cover the pan(s) and let the dough rise in a warm place for 20 minutes. Time to learn about the history of bread and to sample different kinds of bread. Cracker bread cracks and pita bread has a pocket.

Bake at 375 degrees for 25 minutes 'til lightly browned. At last, the bread is baked and samples are passed around with nutrition books and flyers from KUAT-Channel 6. A big MLWC thanks to all the parents and helpers who kept the morning safe, fun, and moving along. See photo on back cover compliments of Carol Niehoff.

STROLLING THROUGH THE PARK

We weren't really in the Lemmon Park but we were close. In June, eight of the Sunday strollers headed for the Lemmon Rock Lookout cabin and we learned so many things along the way. As we were walking the road we began to smell smoke, and as we rounded the next curve there was a huge "bonfire" blazing about 20 feet in the air. There were several smaller fires at various sites nearby. After some discussion over who brought the marshmallows, we saw some firefighters standing guard over each of the fires.

If you hiked up in that area last year I'm sure you noticed all the dead trees piled in the form of a teepee. We had guessed they were beetle infested trees that had to be cut down.

Of course, we stopped and talked to the firefighters and learned that these were controlled burns.

The trees were cut last year and allowed to dry, a large circle was cleared around each of the "teepees" and one fire at a time was lit. As it died down the next one was started: One firefighter stayed with the dying fire and several were close to the newly lit fire. These particular firefighters were from Northern Arizona.

We continued our walk up to the lookout cabin thinking we would see the smoke from the fires. To our surprise there was no smoke to be seen even though the fires were less than 1/4 mile away. So back we went to the firefighters for more questions. They told us in a very hot fire there is very little smoke. They let the fires burn down until there are only ashes and they are completely out. Further up the trail there was a truck with more men and we hoped they were bringing some water for the heavily dressed men, but they were there to determine if the outside temperature was getting too warm to continue with the burns. I think all of us came back with greater respect for these men and women who carefully are tending our forests.

Footnote: There have been rumors of crocodiles or alligators on the mountain. However from the description of the animal, (two black lines under the chin) this must be a Cayman. Alligators have long snouts and Crocodiles have broader noses and the eves are in line with the nostrils. The Cayman is the one with two black stripes under its chin. All three are reptiles, and as such are cold blooded and are unable to live on our mountain.

The Co-op continues to work on the Sabino Spring Source. We have scheduled the completion of the new 212,000-gallon storage tank for September and October. Work is limited due to the spotted owls in the canyon. Soon we will be pumping from the new tank and removing the old 30,000-gallon storage that was installed in 1945 and is beyond repair. We have several projects that will be completed before the snow flies. If time permits; the line along the creek, across from the school, the line on upper Loma Linda and the line at Yuma and Upper Loma Linda will be repaired and lowered to help prevent freezing. We will also be working with the Fire District to replace the four Fire Hydrants along Sabino Canyon Park Road. These existing hydrants are low pressure and will be replaced with new high pressure ones. We hope all of you have had a great summer. Remember to shut off your water meter when you leave.

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
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
