THE NATURE OF THINGS


THERE IS A NEW GAME IN TOWN by Barbara Welsh

No one really knew if the valve controlling the Rose Lake Dam would be rusted shut or not, so when AZ Game & Fish workers cut the lock and began turning the valve last Tuesday, they were happy to find out that it did indeed work. took just 46 hours for the water to drain out of Rose through the gate built into the dam in 1958.

Lake through the gate built into the dam in 1958. Fortunately, those forward thinking engineers back then used brass, which doesn't rust. The only downside of draining so quickly was that the Marine Reserve unit did not get to practice using their giant pumps they had hauled up the mountain. No problem, the water is still flowing down the stream into the lake, so the pumps are getting a workout after all. A temporary dam is keeping the water back so that it can be pumped around the dredging site and out the dam gateway. The upside of the quick drain is that it gave them a head start on the dredging of the over 11,000 cubic yards of silt at has settled into the lake over the past 50 years.

The dredging project is scheduled until the end of September. It is a joint project between the Forest Service and AZ Game & Fish to bring the lake back to its original depth and size. AZ Game & Fish will also eliminate the nonnative sunfish, crayfish and bullfrogs, thereby enhancing the Lake as a trout fishery. The project will also include improvements that will result in safe, unrestricted Lake access for all Forest users, including the physically challenged.

The Marine Reserve unit is providing the man (and woman) power to do the dredging, trail repairs and other improvements as part of their training. A field camp has been set up in the Rose Lake parking lot to house and feed the Marines. The entire Rose Lake campground and recreation area is closed to the public during this operation and the Marines are keeping a tight perimeter guard to keep the public out of danger from the heavy equipment being used. Signs have been posted at Rose Lake entrance and at Willow Canyon trailheads to warn the public of the temporary closure.

If you are hoping to catch a glimpse of the now empty Rose Lake, don't worry: the plan is to allow it to fill up naturally. So, until we get some rain or snow, you will probably be able to check out the big hole after the heavy machines are gone in October. Meanwhile, the Lake is getting much

needed repair and the Forest Service assures us that with a possible El Nino looming, we should get plenty of moisture to fill it up within a year.

In case you were wondering, nothing interesting was found at the bottom of the Lake...only some old coke bottles and a few fishing rods from frustrated fishermen.

FireWise Updates

The next meeting of the Committee for Building a Firewise Community on Mt. Lemmon is scheduled for Saturday, October 20, 2001 at 8:00 a.m. at the Fire Station. This is a planning meeting and anyone interested in helping or learning is welcomed to attend.

FIREWISE THININNING AND PRUNING NEWS:

On Tuesday, September 4, 2001, State Forester Tom Warfield, Fire Chief Dean Barnella and Judy Epstein, Chairperson for Building a Firewise Community on Mt. Lemmon reviewed trees marked for possible thinning. This endeavor included 8.6 acres of private land, or the equivalent of 70 standard Mt. Lemmon lots of 50 ft. x 100 ft. Many of these properties are close to the outer borders of our community and if properly thinned would serve as potential buffer zones from a forest fire approaching those borders. A special thanks goes to the individual property owners who are taking initiatives to lead the way in helping to restore forest healthy and to prevent forest fire devastation. They include the neighborly effort of many residents on Carter Canyon Road and Miner's Ridge Road and other property owners throughout our community. Thinning and pruning trees on private properties is critical to building a Firewise community, actions which ultimately may spare our community from a catastrophic forest fire.

Applause also goes to the **Loma Sabino Homeowners Association.** Using their own state grant with matching private funds, several acres, possibly up to 11 acres, of Common Areas will be pruned and thinned. This project is scheduled to begin this week and may take 2 and ½ weeks to complete. Several homeowners within this group also took initiative by participating in marking trees on their individual lots as mentioned above.

And thanks also goes to the Mt. Lemmon Fire District. This fall they have plans to thin and prune strategic areas to safeguard our community. Please refer to the article by Chief Dean Barnella for additional information.

The responsibility of pruning and felling of trees on private property is currently up to each individual homeowner. They can hire someone skilled in these matters and/or find friends or neighbors who are skilled and able to help. Please note that any use of a chainsaw can be



FIREWOOD STORAGE:

Upon walking around the community, State Forester Tom Warfield pointed out a few recurring problems with firewood storage. All to often, firewood is stored underneath an open deck on the downhill side – exactly where a fire approaching will throw its first embers. Once catching the firewood on fire, the deck and cabin are sure to follow.

Another common problem is firewood stacked between two or more living trees. Unfortunately the firewood often contains or develops bark beetle activity and then passes this infestation onto the living tree. Storing firewood between living trees puts the trees at greater risk for becoming infested and dying.

Ideal firewood storage involves stacking the



Often propane tanks sit wherever they were initially placed. In many cases, these sites remain fine – they are clear of all flammable materials, including vegetation. However, some sites now have vegetation growing in very close proximity. The danger is that should the vegetation catch fire from embers, the ventilation to the tank will automatically cause the tank to catch fire, exploding as flammable liquid gas does. Needless to say, this dangerously puts the cabin, neighboring cabins and the forest at risk for an intense fire.

Occasionally a tank is located beneath a tree or in one case, against the cabin. This too is a fire danger. An exploding LPG tank will ignite an intense and devastating fire very quickly.




