



ROSE LAKE PROJECT

UNDERWAY - perspective & photo by Mike Stanley On 9/20/2001 Steve Hensel asked Ross Quigley and I if we would like to see Rose Canyon Lake since it was drained. We went down and met Steve at the entrance. He took us down to the lower parking lot next to the lake. The area looked like a full blown military camp. The draining and the excavation of the upper end of the lake is being done by the Marines and the Seabees. They first thought they would have to pump the water out of the lake, so big pumps were moved in. However the lakes' old drain valve still operated. With this valve opened the draining took 2 days. At the lake there were 3 big loaders, a big dozer and a track backhoe working in the 4 to 5 feet of mud above the lakes rock bottom. Most of the sediment is at the upper end of the lake. Steve had said one of the D-7 dozers had been stuck in the mud for a few days and took another dozer to help remove it. The lower part of the lake looked Erie as if it was on the moon all dried and cracked. We were able to get Ross almost to the dam via a wheelchair path the Forest Service has been installing over the last year or so. This path is excellent and will enable access to areas of the lake that before were very difficult to get to. Steve and I walked down to the dam and through the bottom of the lake. It is much deeper and the little island next to the dam is much bigger and goes into the lake much farther than I thought. This area is where I usually fish. Something that was pretty strange was all of the little oak twigs that had grown as the lake was filling were covered with fishing stuff. Things like lures, sinkers, leaders, spinners and fishing line were bunched on almost every twig below the water line. Steve even pulled out a rather large salt water rod and reel. The bottom of the lake was less littered than it was thought to be. A rod, a shoe, a can, a bottle and some other items were seen but overall the bottom was in pretty good shape. As Steve and I walked the bottom there

was evidence of the access roadway where equipment was moved in and out during construction. We also saw several

plastic buckets spaced along the bottom. Steve thought these were use during depth soundings in the mid to late 60's. I had heard that this was a time the lake was drained and cleaned. The Marines and Seabees will be working till the end of September on this project. They are using this as training on equipment and field support. Besides the removal of the sediment they are also building retainer walls, removing obstructions and when an operator gets a piece of equipment stuck then they have to cut cattails from the edges. This work was long needed and will provide us with a nice, healthy, little lake once again.

THE FIRE DANGER WITHIN

We had a little excitement at our cabin this Spring and I thought I'd tell you about it. We managed not to burn the whole place down, and maybe you can avoid this scenario if you learn from our little story.

We've been trying to find someone to sweep our chimney for several years now. We even went so far as to call several places in Tucson a couple of years ago, and see if they'd come up. We had no luck.

We have lots of fires in our airtight stove as we spend a lot of the winter on the mountain, and we burn some pine. Anyhow, I started up a fire one chilly morning last spring and pretty soon it was burning briskly along. I tossed in a shoebox we needed to get rid of, and it too burned briskly along. Out the window we noticed a fair amount of smoke, more than seemed altogether reasonable. It was kind of wafting among the trees. It looked pretty thick. "That's odd," I said to my husband. All of a sudden there was a rather subdued "whoosh". "Amazing," I said, "just like folks describe when a chimney fire takes off." But it was such a gentle "whoosh" that I dismissed it. I know such back drafts are supposed to be pretty impressive. Then some flames backed out the air vents, "Wow," I thought, "just like a chimney fire. But of course that's not what THIS is." Eric decided it was time to go outside and look at the chimney. He called in, "It's probably a good idea to phone the fire department." He came in to say flames were indeed spouting out of the top of the chimney. I called the fire department, and Eric closed down all the intake vents in the airtight stove, and that quelled the enthusiasm of the fire so that by the time the fire truck arrived the show was over. The chimney continued to smolder for 24 hours, but the danger was over. Also we got some great looking chunks of frothy black, crystallized pine tar, kind of like pumice, that came out through the melted spark arrestor. If our gutters had been full of pine needles, these could have caught our roof on fire.

That afternoon our friend John Eaton stopped by to give us a "howdy". We told him about the drama of the morning, and he said he cleaned chimneys. Since his full name at our house is John Eaton, The Man Who Fixes Everything, I guess we shouldn't have been so surprised, but we'd never thought to ask John if he cleaned chimneys. So he showed up the next morning and he and Eric took the stove out and lowered the chimney pipe and he cleaned that chimney and stove until they were nearly shiny. Then they replaced the spark arrestor and put everything back together again. Just in time for a snowfall to start.

So if you're intending to use your fireplace, insert, or wood burning stove, get the darned thing cleaned, especially if you burn pine. John is at 576-1620 or 795-2632. It's a lot

cheaper than replacing the whole cabin.

CHIMNEY FIRES

Snuggling in front of your cozy fire or basking in the warmth of your wood stove is a common cold weather ritual on Mt. Lemmon. When doing so the last thing you are likely to think about, especially if you are a native Tucsonan such as myself, is the condition of your chimney. However, a dirty chimney can cause a chimney fire that can cause structural damage, burn down your cabin, catch the surrounding forest on fire, and injure or kill someone.

Chimney fires can shoot flames, dense smoke and/or hot residue particles from the top of the chimney and can be noisy and dramatic or quite subtle. Noises from a chimney fire can range from a low rumbling sound that some say reminds them of a freight train or a low flying airplane or they can make a subdued "whoosh" as Jane Force described hers. Worse yet, such sounds can occur when no one is around to witness or hear them. With proper chimney system care, chimney fires are entirely preventable.

CREOSOTE & CHIMNEY FIRES: WHAT YOU MUST KNOW Fireplaces and wood stoves are designed to safely contain wood-fueled fires, while providing heat for your cabin. The chimney expels the by-products of combustion - the substances given off when wood burns. As these substances exit your fireplace or wood stove, and flow up into the relatively cooler chimney, condensation occurs. (Because condensation occurs when these substances come in contact with the cooler environment of your chimney, chimneys located along an exterior wall of a cabin will have more condensation - they have more exposure to the outside cold than a chimney located in the center of a cabin.) The resulting residue of by-products from your fire that sticks to the inner walls of the chimney is called creosote. Creosote is black or brown in appearance. It can be crusty and flaky, tar-like, drippy and sticky, or shiny and hardened. Often, all forms will occur in one chimney system.

Whatever form it takes, creosote is highly combustible. When it builds up in sufficient quantities, it catches fire inside the chimney flue. This is called a chimney fire. Although any amount of creosote can burn, concern is when creosote builds up in sufficient quantities to sustain a long, hot, destructive chimney fire. Creosote buildup is enhanced by the following conditions:

Restricted air supply:

Fireplaces: closed glass doors or by failure to open the damper wide enough to move heated smoke up the chimney rapidly in fireplaces

Wood Stoves: closing down the stove damper or air inlets too soon and too much, and improperly using the stovepipe damper to restrict air movement in a wood stove Unseasoned or green wood:

Unseasoned or green wood results in cooler smoke because most of the fire's energy and heat is used to drive off the water trapped in the cells of the unseasoned, moist

Cooler-than-normal chimney temperatures:

Fireplaces: starting up a fire in a cold chimney, especially one located on the outside wall of a cabin on a particularly cold day

Wood stoves: fully-packed loads of wood that give large cool fires burning for 8 or 10 hours.

Ponderosa Pine produces large amounts of creosote so some suggest burning a Ponderosa Pine fire "hot" to help with this. No matter what you burn, regular sweeping of your chimney is critical to preventing chimney fires, but especially if you are burning Ponderosa Pine. Long time resident John Eaton is aware of and concerned about the danger chimney fires pose so he is generously offering free chimney sweeping on the mountain. (Donations are acceptable.) He can be reached at 795-2632 or 576-1620. Also remember that fire ashes must be stored in a covered metal container. These ashes may still have hot embers that can easily spark fires even when snow is present. Committee for Building a Firewise Community of Mt. Lemmon and the Mt. Lemmon Fire District has plans to make Ash Buckets available for sale on the mountain. A discount coupon for these Ash Buckets will probably be located inside important Firewise reading material that they distribute. So be on the lookout!

The leaves are changing as I sit writing this. Winter is just around the corner. Frost on the pine needles and snow on the mountain seems to be in store. Every year we at the CO-OP continue to ask all of the customers to Please, shut off the

> water meter. Generally, every one does this. When you shut off the meter off, you have saved everyone a major problem with the supply of water to their house. I hope this year we are able to have the least outages than any other year. Thank You for this consideration.

I would like to bring you up to date on some of the CO-OP projects. We have almost completed the 4" line from the Sabino Spring to you new 212,000 gallon raw water storage tank. The area we are working in is within the SPOTTED OWL HABITAT. We can only work from September to March. We are hoping to get the pumping system moved by the middle of November.

At this time we are also in the process of applying for the member approved \$540,000 loan to complete our storage and filtration requirements. Most of you saw how we were able to keep the water supply up with the demand. This is all due to Mother Nature. The snow last winter and the 16+

inches of Monsoon rain made all of this possible. Remember to keep doing you rain and snow dances.

One of the other projects we are working on is the replacement of the FIRE HYDRANTS on the main road in the village. The Fire District bought new high pressure hydrants with the understanding the CO-OP would install them. As of today, we have 2 new hydrants that will serve the community, with 2 more to be installed before Winter. Please give them a notice as you drive or walk by.

Now one last thing. I was able to go visit my Mother, Sister and Niece in Seattle recently. As a matter of fact I traveled on September 10th. My mother came and woke me in time for me to see the Trade Centers come down. Even though I was with Family, I felt so FAR from my home. This has made me a much better person. Our families and communities are so much a part of the lives we live. The reason I bring this up now is a small effort the community has put forth by having a Banner for all of as to see and sign. This Banner is next to our Post Office. Please, If you get the chance sign it.

Thanks again to the Hensel's.


Monthly Meeting:

THE NATURE OF THINGS

THERE IS A NEW GAME IN TOWN

There is a new game that involves hiking, gadgets, and a treasure hunt plus fun for the whole family. It exists in all fifty states and 30 countries. The age range that this game is suitable for, is all ages from 3 or 4 years until? It can be as simple or as complicated as you choose.

These are the rules.

- 1. Find the cache. (a cache is a hiding place)
- 2. Take something.
- 3. Leave something.
- 4. Write in the logbook that you were there.

Are you curious about this new sport? It is called "geocaching" and involves using a G.P.S, (Global Positioning System) and your computer. Using the computer at home you get the co-ordinates for the cache and the G.P.S. tells you where in the world you are (usually within two to twenty feet) and where the cache is hidden. This is definitely a family type of game and for less than the price of a "Playstation" you can get started in this activity involving everyone. Just remember, if you

take something away, you leave something in its place. The website is www.geocaching.com From there you are on your own. Just as a side note, when we were in Glacier National Park I asked the guide if they were concerned about fires, as the trees seemed to be so close together. The answer was that they were not because they had never had one. This was the week before that terrible fire occurred in the same area we were visiting. I guess the lesson is "never say never".

a poem by Rebecca Lieberman


