Many of us have been dependent on the 576-1201 phone number for all emergencies, but the firefighters will now be able to enjoy the freedom of leaving the station for training and area orientation with Drexel Heights Fire District now answering our emergency phone lines and dispatching calls to us via radio and paging systems. The 576-1201 phone number will still be your source for any non-emergency and public assist call or questions, but please remember that in an emergency the best way to call us is 9-1-1.

Speaking of emergency, the Mt. Lemmon Fire District will be hosting an **EMT** (Emergency Medical Technician) class beginning in **February 2002.** The class will be held each Friday from 9:00am to 5:00pm. Anyone interested in participating in this program, please contact DeAnna at 576-1201.

The Mt. Lemmon Fire District is happy to announce the return of Michael Stanley back to the department as a volunteer. With this, Michael coordinated a water operation class on October 19<sup>th</sup>. What timing for both water and fire departments working together again. It's hard to believe that Christmas C is just around the corner and that

the students of **Zimmerman School** are already working hard on this year's Christmas play, but it's true.

It has been a great semester! We started out the year with the usual warm, beautiful, outdoor type weather. We took advantage of the weather by studying the energy around us. We began with the plants and then branched up into the trees. We were even lucky enough to have a couple of visitors come from the dendrochronology department of the U of A. They brought some wonderful samples of tree rings and they

discussed what makes the Catalinas a great place for discovering the "stories" of the trees. The students were able to take some core samples of the trees in the playground.

We discovered that our playground had been cleared about 80 years ago since all the big trees are about that old. The

dendrochronologists also discussed how tree dating is used to date the ruins from previous cultures such as the Anasasi. This connected us to our studies about cultures. The students studied the many Native American tribes of Arizona. An archeologist from the Forest Service came up to show the students some artifacts and talked about

the science of studying ancient cultures. This unit was topped off with a trip to the Arizona State Museum..

As a connection back to the energy theme the students explored how electricity is produced. This made for some very enlightening experiments in the classroom. As a climax to this unit we were able to tour the Apache Power Plant near Wilcox. We were able to see the many impressive pieces of equipment that are used to generate power. This is the same power plant that supplies our mountain with electricity. After visiting the power plant we went to the Copper Queen Mine in Bisbee. After all, copper was made valuable by the demand for electricity. The students and the parents that attended had an experience they won't soon forget. In order to travel this distance we had to rent a bus and driver. Thanks to the tax money that you, the homeowners, have donated to Zimmerman, we were able to afford this great trip and travel in style!

In addition to energy and Native Americans we have also begun to learn about the ways mountains are formed. Of course we have a great example of this right under our feet, the Catalinas. The expert on how the Catalinas were formed and what minerals run through the rocks and boulders, is **Eric Force**. Eric graciously came to the school on a beautiful afternoon and took us to some wonderful examples of feldspar, quartz and garnet. We have much to learn about the Catalinas. Eric promised to come again when we have learned a little more and when the weather is a little warmer.

Another highlight was our community treasure hunt. Thanks to some creative clues and some wonderful volunteers the students were able to learn a little about the

history of Summerhaven while on an exciting adventure. They traveled all over the village gathering knowledge and treasures. Many thanks to the M.L.C.E.C.s for their help in organizing the helpers and gathering the treasures. ### The Water Line News

I know this sounds like a broke record but "we need precipitation on the mountain". Spring water flows are slowing and without some precipitation it's getting tougher and tougher to keep all the tanks filled. When you leave your cabin for any extended period of time be sure and turn the water off at the meter. One person recently left their cabin, had a toilet valve fail to set, didn't turn off the water at the meter and now gets to pay for 60,000 gallons of water. We love to sell water but when it's in short supply we'd rather not.

During the year your water co-op completed several projects. The new 212,000 gallon tank in Sabino Canyon is in operation in spite of the spotted owl delays. A well was drilled and completed in town just south of the Alpine

and it's working fine. We hope to have it tested, certified and in service by spring. Several new fire plugs were installed and numerous infrastructure improvement were completed.

Your co-op also applied to the state corporation commission for the rate increase that was approved at the annual meeting. It is also working on a low interest rate loan from WIFA to continue further infrastructure improvements. The loan will be paid for with the funds generated by the rate increase. We have also started the preliminary work on changing from a water cooperative to a water improvement district. The work still in the beginning stages and I'll be keeping you updated as we move into the new year.


On behalf of everyone at the water cooperative I sincerely hope that each and everyone of you have a safe and happy holiday season and a new year filled with well being, peace and prosperity.

#### Mt Lemmon Past Remembered:

**Buster Bailey** Buster Bailey was my mentor during the late 40's and early 50's. He was a crusty old curmudgeon-forgive the redundancy. He was raised on a ranch near where Catalina is now. The famous **Steam Pump Ranch** was nearby. He was a hellion as a young man according to enthralling stories told this youngling when I visited his cabin near the sawmill.

The Shoot Out: One story was about his activities during prohibition. Buster would sell horsemeat in Tucson to raise a little Saturday night drinking money. He hauled the meat in the trunk of a Chevy sedan in which he had drilled holes to let the blood drain. One particular night, he and a compadre got "three sheets to the wind" or "poco barracho" courtesy of a few Meyers Street honkytonks. With Buster's friend driving Buster was in no condition to drive – Buster decided to test his six-shooter. He remembered seeing his bullets ricochet off the Southern Arizona Bank on Broadway and Stone. As they sped north, now under hot pursuit by a local squad car, Buster attempted to put out as many streetlights as possible. He claimed a certain degree of success despite his fuzzy More amazing, somehow, they managed to elude their pursuer.

Buster often spoke bitterly about a several topics from his early days. One was an alleged i mplication in the kidnaping of Carlos Robles young daughter. I believe she was found hidden under some boards in the vicinity of where Wilmot and Broadway now cross. He claimed he had nothing to do with the caper. Another topic was a failed marriage to a Margaret. He never talked about it much, but 30 years later, he was still quite angry.

The Bum Gut. Another lament arose from another money raising activity – rum running. In the days Arizona was

dry, Buster took to smuggling booze across the border. To be able to attest to the quality of his product, Buster found it necessary to sample his wares regularly. The poor quality of the "rot gut," he claimed, was his undoing, or at least, his stomach's undoing. Buster often told me that prohibition ruined his stomach. The Jack Daniels he drank with regularity during my acquaintance was necessary to cure his ailing stomach.

When WWII came along, Buster volunteered into the army as a mechanic. He served in the Pacific Theater. In the late forties, he found his way to Mt. Lemmon and worked for my father, Tony Zimmerman, taking care of his horses and vehicles. With Buster, Tony's logging equipment progressed from a mule named Rhoda, to two Clydesdales named Charley and Redbud to a succession of WWII army surplus "six by six's" an amazing three axle, automatic all wheel drive 2 ½ ton vehicle.




The Alpine will be closed Christmas Day.


## MLCECS to have a FLEA MARKET in Tucson in February

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


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

LSHO Association has completed phases 1, 2 and 3 and with substantial assistance of the ML Fire Department, phase 4 of our "Special Fire Prevention/ Healthy Forest Project", and there is Fire Wood available if you need it. Area # 4 is where most of the wood, cut into 2 foot lenghts, is located. This area borders off the Extension Road/ Middle Sabino (up from the water tanker) and the back side of cabins located on Ajo Ave. Finding this wood make take a little effort to walk up the "hills", so please be careful of your footing. There is some dead/dry, but most of this wood will take a year to season. The L.S. board and the membership of Loma Sabino hope this can be a help to the community.
