Fire District Update....

Let's talk FireWISE!! Will It Survive Embers? The Mt. Lemmon Fire District sponsored a 4 hour Seminar at the Fire Station on Saturday, April 20th. We would like to thank the Arizona State Land Department and the U.S. Forest Service for all of their assistance. The turnout was much greater than expected and very appreciated. Thank you again to all who took the time to attend.

The District wants to remind everyone of the importance of being **FireWise**. As we have all seen this year, fire danger is effecting our mountain. We cannot encourage you enough to assist the firefighters with the prevention of fire to your home and our community. What can I do? One big task that has been taken on by many residents, is the removal of ladder fuels and pine needles surrounding their home. What do the firefighters do? The Mt. Lemmon Fire District provides a 40 yard dumpster at or around the fire station for the convenience of the residents. There has been

such a response with the current fire activity that we are now asking everyone to bag up the pine needles so we can assist in the removal as quickly as possible. When making piles of slash, make two; pine needles (bagged) and branches/limbs from trees. This will make a difference in the equipment we will need when coming to your home. When you are ready for us to come by for pick-up, please call **DeAnna at 576-1202**. We will add you to our list and get by as soon as possible. If you have any questions on what you can do, if you need any assistance, or need any lawn & leaf bags, please do not hesitate to call.

Fire Activity... special thanks to all who assisted in the suppression of the Tucson Avenue fire. We are grateful that the Herde family were on the mountain that weekend. They spotted the fire and jumped right on it with garden hose and received additional help from Vic Zimmerman, "Bones" and Otto. (I apologize if I left anyone out) Thanks also to the local businesses who brought water and support. The Fire District received information that there was a timely delay before we were notified of the fire. Since January, we have been fortunate to have outside dispatching. This means we no longer have someone in the station answering our phones. We are out in the District training, learning the area and providing public assistance. Please remember to dial 9-1-1 first. This will activate the Fire District's emergency response system..

Thirty Acres! Wow! As I am typing this now, we still have one more day on this fire. The Soldiers Pond area had mutual-aid at its finest. The Forest Service, Hot Shot crews from out of state, Northwest Fire District, Golder Ranch, Big Piney from Wyoming, Rural Metro, Corona de Tucson, the Mt. Lemmon Fire District and thousands of feet of hoselines working for hours. Again, I'd like to thank everyone for their support and patience. With this fire came questions of evacuation. Summerhaven has evacuation air horns strategically located in the village. The Fire District has arranged to sound the horns at the top of the 4th of July parade. This will be a test so that if the time may arise, the residents will be familiar with their sound.



"Fire on the Mountain"

It is amazing how fast your heart beats, how hard it is to breathe, and how dry your mouth is when you discover a small forest fire burning two cabins away from yours.

*Fortunately, it was day time on a day when people were there to find the fire and sound the alarm from more than one source.

*Fortunately, Mike Stanley's nose told him this smoke held danger and started him mentally and soon physically routing water to where it would be needed.

*Fortunately, people from the businesses in town came and began cutting the South fire line, finished by the firefighters, that prevented spread to the adjacent cabins. By planned (but not yet fully tested) good fortune, the fire hydrant in town performed as well if not better than expected. Also, currently, the MLFD is well staffed, especially on weekends, and responded with equipment, skill, and enthusiasm. 9-1-1 works.

Because of the potentially severe fire season this summer the Board of Directors of Loma Sabino Homeowner's Association has voted to keep all gates temporarily open until the current extreme fire danger has subsided. Soon many people from the community were there bringing water to drink (boy, did that taste good!), food to eat, tools, help with hoses, and perhaps most importantly, a clear sense of community. A fire allows you to meet a lot of people but it isn't a suggested social event! Many thanks to **Vic, Bones, and Otto** for racing up the hill to lend a hand.

Some observations:

Dry needles burn pretty fast and are hot enough to ignite downed branches and bases of trees living and dead. Those short dog hair thickets make a good crackling sound as they burn in about 30 seconds flat. Branches hanging near the ground, tree trunks, and other ladder fuels really do bring the fire up from the floor of the forest. When the emergency settled about a quarter of an acre burned (most of one lot and part of a second), several trees burned to 4 - 8 ft. above the ground and the edge of the fire was 10 measured feet from the closest cabin. Having watched the needles burning we would estimate that there was probably less than ten minutes before the fire would have reached the cabin.

After seeing first hand what we've all been hearing about, we think those "fire-wise" guys are right. The importance of keeping our properties cleaned up and trees thinned was clearly demonstrated that day. We had a close call and, this time, we were lucky.

Rake and Bag Pine Needles! It May Just Save Your Cabin!

Have you heard about the fire in the village started from buried ashes? Here's what happened...

On Saturday, April 20th, we had our first Firewise Workshop thanks to the MLFD with help from Bill Hart, Fuels & Prevention Manager, US Forest Service, State Land "Beetle Expert" Bob Celaya and other knowledgeable leaders. Info from that workshop could fill the Echoes!

Those of us that attended were awarded free ash buckets! Ironically an attendee forgot to pass on this new acquisition and wisdom to another family member and the other member <u>buried</u> their fireplace ashes, probably as they have done for years. But this time...Ta-Da! FIRE! PINE NEEDLES ignited and the flames quickly followed the path of pine needles! (Please refer to story about this.) If pine needles near your cabin become ignited, would the path of burning needles lead directly to your cabin?! BE SURE TO RAKE YOUR PINE NEEDLES AWAY FROM ALL FLAMMABLE STRUCTURES! BAG THEM and dispose of them in the dumpster provided by MLFD, or if needed, let them know that your bagged needles are conveniently placed for pick up! ...IT MAY JUST SAVE YOUR CABIN!

- 1. Are your needles raked away from your cabin and disposed of properly?
- 2. Have you removed all pine needles from your roof and gutters?
- 3. Have you removed all "Ladder Fuels" (low hanging dead branches) around your cabin?
- 4. Is your FIREWOOD stored safely away from flammable structures and plants?
- 5. Is your address clearly visible from the road? (Reflective numbers are available for FREE at MLFD!)
- 6. Is your address clearly posted by your phone or known by all that use your cabin?

These videos were personally sent to me from Judith Leraas Cook, National Firewise Home Page Manager, after we had a lengthy conversation stemming from my interest in using the Firewise Logo. When Judith heard all that we were doing

on Mt. Lemmon, she decided to send me these brand new videos that have not yet been officially distributed: "Wildfire! Preventing Home Ignition" and "Protecting your Home from Wildfire."

An attempt to get this information out to you was made at the Homeowner's Dinner. I learned later that those of you who took home a videotape from the meeting, there was no label letting you know that 2 videos were on it and instructions to return it to MLFD or the General Store was not clear. One person shared with me that after watching "A Matter of Time" the screen went to blue so she turned it off and rewound it. She did not know that one of the newer videos, "Protecting Your Home from Wildfire" followed on the tape a minute later! If you were not asked to return them at the

dinner meeting, we would appreciate circulating them for other homeowners to see through the General Store checkout process. Several new copies have been made with labels, this time showing all 3 short (~20 minutes each) Firewise informational videos starting with the 2 new videos and "A Matter of Time" last for those who have yet to see it. These are available for free checkout at the Mount Lemmon General Store. THE NEW ONES ARE EXCELLENT! BE SURE TO SEE THEM!

SURVIVAL FOR THE ANIMALS

Human beings can go seven to ten days without water but what about the animals during a drought? Animals have many ways of coping with drought conditions. Many of them live underground which helps maintain a more constant temperature for their homes. They do not have to use energy to either keep warm or cool their homes. Moisture is obtained

from the plants, leaves, berries and seeds they can find to eat. When there is a drought the plants are not as abundant so food is in short supply. The predators find moisture from the other animals that are their prey. An owl that catches a rabbit can get most of the water it needs from its kill. Some animals have the ability to have fewer babies (lay fewer eggs) when food is scarce, so they are able to feed their young. Because nature is not kind many of the weakest will not make it through the drought period. This keeps the ""balance of nature"" because less animals need less food. When food and water are again available this balance reverses itself. More food, more water and mare animals. Some animals can get along on very little water. The roadrunner does not need water at all, but will drink it if it is available. There is a special little rodent that never drinks water even if it is there for it to drink. This is the kangaroo rat. He is the most efficient water conserving animal of all. He lives under ground only on dry seeds. The water he exhales is absorbed by the seeds he stores in his burrow. His metabolism breaks down starch from the seeds into carbon dioxide, energy and water.

The larger animals are going to be searching for water where ever they can find it, which means we may again see bears, also skunks and foxes trying to find water even at our cabins. I think I'll wait until after the rains to feed the birds and put out the hummer food. No matter how sorry we feel for them, it is not in the animals interest to try to Fool "mother nature".

The 2002 Summit Award was presented to Steve Hensel at this year's annual homeowners' dinner on April 16th. The Summit Award is presented to an individual who has given many years of service to the Mt. Lemmon community.

Steve moved to the Catalinas over 23 years ago as a Forest Service employee. During that time he has fought well over 100 wild fires in this range alone. Several years ago Steve became involved with special use permits. He focused on both the needs of the camps and the health of the forest. Through his

direction the scout and church camps were able to upgrade their sites while lowering their annual fees through service hours. Steve's extra time and effort have contributed greatly in allowing these camps to become a positive part of the forest. Steve has also worked closely with **Ski Valley** giving them better relations with the Forest Service and a much deserved push in expanding their operation.

As the person in charge of the Forest Service water system for the Catalinas Steve has spent several years upgrading the system which has improved the consistancy and quality of water delivered to the campgrounds dramatically. He has also assisted the water coop numerous times.

In 1993, Steve, with the assistance of the **Sheriff's Department**, apprehended a U of A fraternity that had been cutting trees illegally every December for at least 15 years. Had it not been for his persistence this would probably still be going on today. Away from his job Steve has made the extra effort to help the homeowners with their questions and concerns regarding their property and the forest that

surrounds it. He has also contributed to the Fire Wise program. He has personally been involved in over 20 Eagle Scout projects. All of these have benefitted the Catalinas from cleaning up old structures, to repairing wild life springs, to building new trails.

Steve meant it when he expressed that he was humbled to receive the award - just as I was the previous year. It has been quite a journey these past several years for us. These mountains have become a part of who we are and who our children are. We thank the residents for welcoming us into their hearts and giving us the opportunity to discover what we are capable of achieving.





Product that PROTECTS AGAINST FIRE And PRESERVES WOOD for 10

YEARS! (Info provided Judy Epstein per several requests from homeowners)

Five years ago, we moved into our cabin and dutifully "preserved" it according to the guidance of the previous owners... every other year we thoroughly applied a linseed oil mixture to the exterior wood of our cabin to preserve it. Since then I've learned that linseed oil can be highly flammable and NOT desirable for fire prevention. Thanks to the expertise from the Los Alamos Fire Dept., I learned instead about a fire retardant they highly recommend that also acts as a preservative for wood. This product is called Flame Stop II (www.flamestop.com 1-877-397-7867). Demonstrating its effectiveness in a 90 second video test was played at the Annual Homeowner Meeting. I'm told that the product penetrates the wood and becomes part of cellular structure of the wood. Polymers then close the pores of the wood, making it a wood preservative as well as a fire retardant. The life expectancy in our weather conditions is estimated to be a minimum of 10 years, including preserving the wood. Application can be by brush, garden sprayer, or paint sprayer by the homeowner following the recommended coverage area. It dries clear and is not expected to change the color of the wood. A quote for 1 gallon by itself starts at \$49, it drops to \$34.70/gallon for 4 gallons, and \$32/gallon for 8 gallons. A quote for the exterior of a cabin 40 feet by 35 feet was 12 gallons (slightly more than needed) for \$384 plus shipping. For those who paint their cabins, a similar product, Flame Stop III can be added to exterior latex paint, 1 pint/gallon, however I did not research costs or other details.

Another product mentioned by Los Alamos Fire Dept. is Fire-Shield, 1-800-523-6732. I however did not get through to them to get more information in time for this article.

Mold in My Home By Bob Zimmerman

This is the second article regarding mold. Last the month the issues of detection and health affects of mold were discussed as it appeared in an article published by the Arizona Department of Health. This second segment, also taken from the same article, discuses what to do if you have mold. The Arizona Department of Health feels that in most cases, the homeowner can clean up the mold. As you read this article,

you can get a better sense of deciding if you can tackle the job or professionals are needed. If you did not save last months issue of Echo's and would like a copy of the mold article, please give me a call at 576-1333. There has been some editing to reduce space.

IV. GENERAL CLEAN UP PROCEDURES: 1. Identify and correct the moisture source area. 2. Clean, disinfect, and dry the moldy area. 3. Bag and dispose any material that has moldy residues, such as rags, paper, leaves, or debris. What can I save? What should I toss?

Substances that are porous and can trap molds, such as paper, rags, carpet, wallboard, and rotten wood should be decontaminated and thrown out. Harder materials such as glass, plastic, or metal can be kept after they are cleaned and disinfected. Ultimately, it is critical to remove the source of moisture first, before beginning remedial action, since mold growth can return quickly on re-wetting.

Removal of Moldy Materials After fixing the moisture source and removing excess moisture, the cleanup can begin: 1. Wear gloves when handling moldy materials. 2. Remove porous materials (examples: ceiling tiles, sheetrock, carpeting, wood products). 3. Carpeting can be a difficult problem. Drying does not remove the dead spores. If there is heavy mold, disposal of the carpet should be considered 4. Bag and discard the moldy substances. 5. Allow the area to dry 2 or 3 days. 6. If flooded, remove all sheetrock to at least 12 inches above the high water mark. Visually inspect the wall interior and remove any other intrusive molds. (This step may have to be carried out by a licensed contractor). CAUTION: spores are easily released when moldy material is dried out.

Soap Cleanup: Before disinfecting contaminated areas, clean the areas to remove as much of the mold (and food it is growing on) as possible. 1. Wear gloves when doing this cleanup. 2. Use non-ammonia soap or detergent, or a commercial cleaner, in hot water, and scrub the entire area affected by the mold. 3. Use a stiff brush or cleaning pad on block walls or uneven surfaces. 4. Rinse clean with water. A wet/dry vacuum is handy for this.

Disinfect Surfaces: Wear gloves when using disinfectants. 2. After thorough cleaning and rinsing, disinfect the area with a solution of 10% household bleach (e.g., 11/2 cup bleach per gallon of water). Using bleach straight from the bottle will not be more effective. 3. Never mix bleach with Ammonia or other cleaners - the fumes are toxic. 4. For spraying exterior large areas, a garden hose and nozzle can be used. 5. When disinfecting a large structure, make sure the entire surface is wetted (floors, joists, and posts). 6. Avoid excessive amounts of runoff or standing bleach. 7. Let disinfecting areas dry naturally overnight this extended time is important to kill all the mold. CAUTION: Bleach fumes can irritate the eyes, nose, and throat, and damage clothing and shoes. Make sure the working area is ventilated well.

Can cleaning up mold be hazardous to my health? Yes. Exposure to mold can occur during the cleaning stage. Mold counts are typically 10 to 1000 times higher than background levels during the cleaning of mold damaged materials. Take steps to protect your health during cleanup:

1. Seal off the moldy material from the other areas. 2. When handling or cleaning moldy materials, consider using a mask or respirator to protect you from breathing airborne spores. 3. Respirators can be purchased from hardware stores; select one for particle removal (sometimes referred to as a N95 or TC-21C particulate respirator). Respirators are not as effective removing bleach fumes, so minimize your exposure when using bleach or other disinfectants. 4. Wear protective clothing that is easily cleaned or discarded. 5. Wear eye protection. 6. Use rubber gloves, 7. Try cleaning a small test patch of mold first. If you feel that this adversely affected your health, you should consider paying a licensed contractor or professional to carry out the work Ask family members or bystanders to leave areas when being cleaned. 8. Work over short time spans and rest in a fresh air location, 9. Air your house out well during and after the work CAUTION: Never use a gasoline engine indoors (e.g. pressure washer, generator) — you could expose yourself and your family to carbon monoxide.

Can Air Duct Systems become contaminated with Mold? Yes. Air duct systems can become contaminated with mold. Duct systems can be constructed of bare sheet metal, sheet metal with exterior fibrous glass insulation, sheet metal with an internal fibrous glass liner, or made entirely of fibrous glass. If your home's air duct system has had water damage, first identify the type of air duct construction that you have. Bare sheet metal systems, or sheet metal with exterior fibrous glass insulation, can be cleaned and disinfected. If your system has sheet metal with an internal fibrous glass liner, or are made entirely of fibrous glass, the ductwork normally will need to be removed and discarded. Ductwork in difficult locations may have to be abandoned. If you have other questions, contact an air duct cleaning professional, or licensed contractor.

After I've cleaned everything as thoroughly as possible, can I still have mold odors? Yes. It is possible that odors may persist. Continue to dry out the area and search for any hidden areas of mold. If the area continues to smell musty, you may have to re-clean the area again (follow the cleaning steps given in this sheet). Continue to dry and ventilate the area. Don't replace flooring or begin rebuilding until the area has dried completely.

How can further damage to my home be prevented? Check regularly for the following: 1. Moisture condensation on windows. 2. Cracking of plasterboard drywall tape loosening. 3. Wood warping. 4. Musty odor. If you see any of the above, seek out and take steps to eliminate the source of water penetration as quickly as possible.

Can Ozone air cleaners help re move indoor mold, or reduce odor or pollution levels? Some air cleaners are designed to produce ozone. Ozone is a strong oxidizing agent

used as a disinfectant in water and sometimes to eliminate odors. However, ozone is a known lung irritant. Symptoms associated with exposure include cough, chest pain, and eye, nose, and throat irritation. Ozone generators have been shown to generate indoor levels above the safe limit. Furthermore, it has been demonstrated that ozone is not effective in controlling molds and fungi, even at high concentrations far above safe health levels. Also, ozone may damage materials in the home. For these reasons, the Arizona Department of Health Services strongly recommends that you do not use an ozone air cleaner in any occupied residential space.

The Mt. Lemmon Homeowners' Association (MLHO) was formed in 1969 to protect the welfare of the Mt. Lemmon community and to be involved in all aspects of its improvement. The concerns of the organization are not limited to private property owners. membership, with voting rights, is accorded to private owners and leased land holders upon payment of yearly dues. Creating a volunteer fire department and preventing condemnation of private and leased land were the priority issues for which the MLHO was originally established. A list of accomplishments includes: establishing the volunteer fire department, helping to purchase its needed equipment, involving the County in development, planning and zoning, expediting highway maintenance and snow removal, fund raising for the Water Co-op, working to improve the environment, assisting in settlement of reserve boundaries, paying for water tank chlorinators, buying fire hydrants, renting a private water tank to "quick fill" fire tankers, establishing the Mountain Watch program, numbering houses for emergency services, helping reduce the 1989 unorganized school property tax and supporting, politically, the now completed land exchange. Two of the most essential accomplishments were assisting to prevent permittees on Mt. Lemmon from suffering the same fate as those in Madera Canyon and hiring an attorney to save the domestic water supply from termination by the Sierra Club. Currently the MLHOs are working with the fire department and water cooperative to add fire hydrants to the distribution line from Miner's Ridge to the Loma Sabino tank.

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
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
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
