Back Home Again

It is so good to be home again! One forgets how much we love the mountain until you are deprived of it. The Bullock fire came and the Bullock fire went and the village remained unscathed. Some say it was a miracle – the work of angels. Some say it was courageous Firefighters. Whatever it was, the work started about a year ago to FireWise our communities, is now in full swing as never before. Our future depends on this task being completed.

Everywhere one looks there are tree boughs and black bags of pine needles. Community volunteers are helping the Fire Department to get this material into the roll-offs when an empty one can be found. You all are to be congratulated on the great efforts being made to rid the community of the 100-year accumulation of excess fuels. Once this excess accumulation is removed, maintenance will be not such a great chore. We are becoming FireWise! Hooray!

While becoming FireWise is an important goal, another important community goal is to create a perimeter around our communities where crown fires would be forced to drop to the ground and become ground fires. Quite a few years ago, there was a rough perimeter scratched around the community of Mt. Lemmon. This needs to be expanded. Work has already begun on Red Ridge, one potential area of approach for wildland fires.

Some Forest Service supervisors feel that Graham Mountain and the Catalina's will be receiving a higher priority for fuel reduction programs and we're somewhat optimistic that a fire safe perimeter could go into the planning stage.

The Forest Service has started re-seeding with helicopters on interior areas of the burn and spraying grass seed along the highway in anticipation of the Monsoons. Getting grass to grow in the burned areas is the first stage in a long process of restoring the forest and will help to

reduce erosion. In addition, straw has been spread from the road into the burned areas for seed cover and additional erosion control

We hope to have a FireWise instruction pamphlet out next month, designed for Mount Lemmon to help in achieving a FireWise community. This is a time to get to know your neighbors. Our lots are often too small to create a proper defensible space. Working together is the easiest and fastest way to solve this problem as down hill and down wind neighbors can directly affect the survivability of groups of cabin above them.

Ross, get well - we need you.


MLCEC PIE AUCTION nets \$1300

Another 4th of July has come and gone, what a fun time it was. The support for the department was incredible. T-shirt sales topped \$400.00 and John and Linda Mulay's grandchildren raised over \$102.00 in the giant lemmon. The air horns were sounded and could be heard throughout the village and ski valley. Remember when the horns are set off on other days be prepared for immediate evacuation. Some concern has been raised as not being able to hear the horns inside residences. We are trying to reach as many

people as possible before a door to door evacuation is done by PCSO, FS and MLFD personnel.

I hope everyone checked their batteries in smoke detectors on the fourth also. It is also a good time to check home fire extinguishers, making sure the gauge shows charged.

I'm glad MLFD was able to facilitate the removal of the abundance of fuel from the mountain with the roll off dumpsters. We used funds from state grants, donations and generalfunds. We have reached the point, however, that we will not be able to supply the service for the remainer of this fiscal year. Hopefully in the future we will be able to acquire funds from donations and grants to have the dumpsters return.

Enjoy the rest of the summer and if you need any assistance call the station. Remember we have reflective address numbers at the station, please make sure your residence is properly marked. Also remember for emergencies call 911 and be prepared to answer the following questions

9-1-1

Is it Fire or Medical Related?

* This tells us how many people we need and which vehicle to respond with *

What is your address?

What is your phone number?

* These two important questions let us know where to respond and/or if we need further information we can call vou back *

What is your name?

* On occasion, we arrive on scene and there is no one available to assist us *

What is the nature of your Fire? Structure and/or Brush

* The Mt. Lemmon Fire District and the Coronado National Forest work together at Fire Scenes on Mt. Lemmon when available – the Nature of your Fire lets us know if we need back-up and what Type of vehicle and Protective Wear to bring *

Where is the location of the Fire or Medical call?

* If you are calling from your home or a neighbor's home, we need the best directions to respond from your calling address *

What is wrong with the Patient? Signs and/or Symptoms

*Any information leading to the illness or history of the patient let's us know if we need ALS (Advanced Life Support - Paramedic), BLS (Basic Life Support - EMT) or a helicopter on stand by *

What is the best access to your home from Catalina Highway or Sabino Canyon Parkway?

* Some of the access roads to the homes of Mt. Lemmon are on dirt, have more than one name and/or access route – this will assist in our response time to your Emergency *

Any other assistance, questions and/or concerns, please contact the Mt. Lemmon Fire District at 520-576-1202.

Funds For Dumpsters As Dry As the 4th of July

The good news - everyone is trying to do their part in cleaning up pine needles and ladder fuels. The bad news - the grants , donations and budgeted monies for the dumpsters being used to hold pine needles and slash has run out. The cost of each dumpster being hauled up the mountain empty and back down full is \$400 plus (weight is a factor). Since this last fiscal year, more than \$7,317.59 has been spent to provide the dumpsters around the village for clean up free to you. And, the outstanding bills for the entire month of June and July have yet to be received so that dollar amount will increase substantially.

In May the MLHO Association contributed 1000 lawn bags to be distributed by the fire department to encourage weekend clean up of pine needles by cabin owners. That 1000 bags has long since run out, and the Fire Department has been providing more garbage bags free of charge to whoever came to the station wanting some. Even the people charging homeowners for yard work were coming to the station for "free" bags. These yard bags cost \$12 for 100 at Costco. As funds run dry, it may be time to shift the burden of the cost and distribution from the fire department back to the individual cabin owners, renters and businesses. The Echoes is not due out until the middle of July, and by that time it is estimated all the funds will be depleted for dumpsters. Everyone is aware of what needs to be done,

so lets all take personal responsibility for getting our own properties cleaned up. You can order a dumpster from Tucson Roll Off or any other company that provides that service and have it delivered to your lot - just be sure to let your neighbors know that it is not for public use - or it will probably be filled overnight. You can also haul your needles to the trash dump in Tucson. Or, you can make a donation to the fire department, tax deductible, for dumpsters for pine needles & slash, earmarked for community use.

One of the problems we have seen lately is that building materials and household garbage is also being dumped into and around the dumpsters. When the fire department goes to clean up the mess, some of the overfilled thin plastic bags of pine needles & dirt break open. There are nails in the old wood.

I personally stopped one couple from placing their household garbage in the full dumpster next to the "comfort" station in the village late in the day on July 7th, and they told me a local business, that shall remain nameless in this article, said they could put their household trash in that dumpster. They knew the hours of the dumpster by the waste treatment plant, too. I explained the problems that house garbage creates, and though they were insistent that the business told them it was alright, they unhappily agreed to take their smelly trash with them to Tucson.

The strongest argument for no household trash in an open dumpster is that it attracts BEARS! One bear was transported off the mountain by Game & Fish on July the 2nd. It already had an ear tag on it. Hopefully the other




overflow including building materials & household trash filled newly replaced dumpster in one afternoon. This took two fire fighters and a backhoe working several hours to put the ground clutter into the dumpsters

3 bears now being sighted around the village looking for plastic bags full of kitchen garbage instead of pine needles have moved back into the woods. Over the 4th of July holiday weekend at least 2 bears enjoyed household trash nad dog food left overnight on several porches. One was seen earlier in the week sitting inside a truck bed enjoying the kitchen garbage from a local restaurant. These bears have been spotted on Turkey Run, Sabino Canyon Parkway and Carter Cyn and all appear to be healthy looking and not malnourished.

Warning: FIRE within the HOME!

Thankfully the working smoke detector woke Jim around 3:20 a.m., Monday, July 8th, when his kitchen caught fire. He quickly woke Judy, dialed 9-1-1 and gave his name, address and report that his home was on fire. Then he and Judy and their dog made their way out of their recently remodeled, smoke-filled cabin – the turning on of lights added no visibility. Jim attempted to go back in with his large fire extinguisher, but the flames and smoke were too great; he closed the door and remained outside. Within minutes, the MLFD arrived and extinguished the fire quickly enough to keep the whole cabin from burning and preventing it from spreading beyond the cabin to nearby trees and neighbors.

Jim's understanding was that his toaster had caused the fire. He had heard that coffee makers should be unplugged when not in use but did not know that toasters should be too. Now he knows and wants others to know too: UNPLUG your toaster, coffee maker, etc. when you are not using them. He said that he had no reason to expect any problems from his toaster; it was neither old nor appearing defective in any way prior to this.

We can all learn from this story. If the Connolly's had not had a working smoke detector, they could have lost their lives along with their cabin and jeopardized their part of the mountain. Similarly, if they were not home (for example, down in Tucson) but their power was still on, not only would they probably have lost their cabin to fire but also greatly jeopardized the surrounding forested area and the safety of their neighbors. Our mountain community has many one-way in and one-way out roads. Jim pointed out that his home is situated at the bottom of one such road, Florence. A large, unconfined cabin fire potentially could have quickly spread and trapped all of the residents above him that rely on Florence as an exit route. For this reason, Jim went around to all of his neighbors once MLFD arrived and woke them, alerting them to the potential need to evacuate should the fire extend beyond his cabin. Fortunately, there was no need to evacuate. Jim states that he was very impressed with

Bullock Fire Videos now available on CD-ROM!

During the Bullock Fire, 4 different videos were taken by Steve Hensel (USFS Catalina District), Mike Stanley (Mt. the quick and timely response of the MLFD by calling 9-1-1 directly. He asked me to publicly thank them on his behalf. (Jim also asked that I share his story since the Echoes deadline for articles was on this very same day and he did not have the time to write this story himself.)

As covered in FireWise handouts, in an Emergency, Dial 9-1-1. Jim's call to 9-1-1 allowed 9-1-1 dispatch to contact the MLFD and any other authorities. This frees the MLFD to respond immediately to an emergency rather than having to place calls to other authorities before responding. So remember, in an Emergency, Dial 9-1-1.

Jim realizes that he was very lucky that his one smoke detector detected the smoke in time for his household to still have safe passage out of the cabin. The recommendation is that you have several working smoke detectors strategically placed throughout your home. The more, the better. Jim and Judy now have some significant cabin repairs ahead of them, yet they are very grateful that is all they have to deal with.

FireWise News and Updates

June 29th FireWise Meeting

The FireWise Meeting on June 29th had a great turnout and provided valuable information for all present. The Potluck before the meeting was tasty and well attended. Videos were shown although the lighting diluted some of the clarity. In response to requests, a copy of these videos is available on CD-ROM for a minimum tax-deductible donation of \$5 to the MLFD. (See "Bullock Fire Videos on CD-ROM").

FireWise materials and protocols were discussed as well as an educational FireWise pamphlet specific to Mt.

Lemmon which is currently under development. The thinning plans and reports were presented and lots of good questions were asked and answered. A request for the website link to research the owner of a property was discussed so neighbors could contact them about FireWise concerns. This link is on the FireWise section of the web site www.mountlemmonfire.com since this information is public domain.

Chief Barnella shared that "a grid" is being developed to cover the entire Summerhaven area should an emergency evacuation situation arise. When this is completed, volunteers will be able to sign up for their grid section and they will help verify evacuation within that grid in an emergency evacuation. August 15th was a projected date for when this grid would be viewable on the website

A large number of homeowners reportedly participated in a group purchasing of Flame Stop and several others requested another chance to participate. In response to this request, the next group ordering date has been set for July 31st. (See "Back By Popular Demand!")

"The Little Things" Count Too!

The "official" fire season has now arrived and the building monsoons add lightening to the equation. Removing pine needles and ladder fuels is especially important to better safeguard our homes and community. An often-overlooked precaution, however, is what floating embers or firebrands might do. The FireWise Video available for FREE checkout at the General Store and MLFD Station educates homeowners on how to protect your cabin from wildfires and the firebrands they create. As the video stresses, it can be "the little things" firebrands ignite from a Wildfire as far as 2 miles away.

Some ways to identify such "little things" is to look for cracks and crevices were pine needles or pine needle duff collect. Often they can be found in between deck boards where an underlying joist prevents them from falling through. Also, when wood or flammable material is stored underneath a deck with cracks, pine needles often accumulated there amongst the flammable material. Should embers ignite these pine needles, it then becomes kindling for the larger material. Should the flames build into a fire, then your deck and cabin are next in line.

Other sources of ignition by floating embers include seat cushions, fabric or tightly woven hammocks, exposed firewood on the deck, and of course pine needles in the cracks of stairs and decks, on window sills, in rain gutters, and on the roof.

Thanks to Don Underhill owner of the Alpine and KCMT-FM radio for all their support, and that's only part of the fun set for Sunday August 11th! The Desert Bluegrass Association (DBA) will provide music at two locations on the mountain, the Alpine Inn and Ski Valley on the same day. Why the straw? Why not our pine needles?

The straw is actually special rice straw brought in from Utah. Unlike regular straw or pine needles, it is used because of its high durability and greater ability to soak in moisture. The area first underwent seeding by aircraft and then a layer of rice straw is evenly distributed over the area. In areas with steeper slopes and greater drainage, Hydromulch is used.

What's Hydromulch?

Hydromulch is a mixture of shredded newspaper, wood fiber, grass seed, glue and die. It is mixed with water and sprayed in critical burned areas to prevent soil erosion. The green color was added to make it easier to see where it was applied. When the rains come the rubbery coating will slowly melt as it absorbs water, allowing the water to soak into the soil. All the products used in the solution are safe for the environment. (see photos on back cover)

Buster Baily and the Six by Six

As I have said, Buster during WW II was a mechanic who knew his way around the old Army "six by six," or "duce and a half," as it was called. It was the workhorse of the US Army. This talent put him in good stead at the sawmill because Tony Zimmerman used WW II Army surplus vehicles at the sawmill.

Well, there was a man who decided to make a living hauling ore down from a mine high up on the south side of Marble Peak. The Oracle Road or Control Road, as we called it then, curls around the south east side of Marble Peak a few miles above Oracle mine, which is seven miles down from Summerhaven.

This incredibly steep, switch back road is still there.

This individual used a later model six by six to haul ore. Buster admired this truck. Unfortunately, one day, with a full load of ore, he lost his brakes and went off the road at one of the switchbacks. He lived, but his back was broken so his truck driving days were over. The truck landed upside down in the bottom of a rocky draw about 500 feet above the Control Road. After the truck had lain there for over a year, Buster decided that he wanted to retrieve that truck. Dad, Buster and I went to look. Dad said there was no way that the truck was coming out of the draw even if we could somehow get it right side up and get it started — the boulders and trees were too large. Buster quietly said he could get it out in a week and would drive it up to the sawmill. He would not charge for his time unless he delivered.

Dad allowed Buster and me to take on the project. I know he was convinced we would give up after a few days. The first chore was to turn the truck upright, which we did in a day using jacks and hand winches. Then started the harder task of clearing a path. The live oaks blocking the way soon fell to our axes. Next with pick and shovel two paths were constructed down the drws for the wheels to travel. This left large boulders and rock cliffs, which seemed to me to present insurmountable obstacles. Buster did not seem overly concerned. He had a plan. We chipped rock away on one of the bolder to make room for the truck to pass. The rock cliffs were smoothed out by use of small boulders and planks from the sawmill. In some areas, there were large drops over which we built rickety bridges.

Buster turned his attention to the truck. He tinkered with it for several hours, replaced the oil (most had drained out) and installed two 12-volt batteries as the six by sixes had a 24-volt system. These trucks had automatic transmissions so the transmission fluid had to be replaced. He pulled the spark plugs and did his best to clean them. Last we put in 10 gallons of fresh gas.

Then Buster was ready to start the engine. He called me "button" and asked me to hold my hand over the carburetor in a certain fashion to suck gas into the carburetor. He engaged the starter and after a few cranks of the engine the truck backfired. Buster knew he had won. We tried several moe times and eventually the engine coughed and begin a rough idle, firing on most of its cylinders. Buster was satisfied he had enough power to drive down the draw and begin easing her forward, down the gauntlet.

The six by six had a very heavy-duty wench on front, which was used to slither the vehicle over large boulders and hold the vehicle back while sliding off steep bluffs. Amazingly, he got her out. I can still remember the planks creaking under her weight.

And, we drove her, still missing badly, all the way up to the sawmill. I have never seen Dad beam so broadly as when she passed through the front gate. It was just a matter of time before she was the principal logging truck at Mount Lemmon Sawmill

Although it is described as a "clear" sealer for exterior cabin use, Chip Delay found that it left a light milky look to his dark colored cabin when he ordered and applied the Flame Stop II on his own. To resolve this, he contacted Flame Stop and was advised that he could "wash" off the milky color with water, once the 24 hour drying time had enabled the product to "set." Being in an extreme water shortage, he brought up one of his own water tenders (his own business equipment) to wash off the milky appearance and had very good results.

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
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
