I can't believe it's time for the August issue of the Echoes. It seems like the 4th of July parade was just last week. If someone can tell me where July went, I'd be



grateful. Soon you'll be able to see and smell the changing of the seasons in the air. But getting back to the present and my August message, I was actually at a loss as to what to write about and had asked Gordon if I could say, "No message this month since the President is vacationing at Camp David (Camp Debbie sounds nice) but he said NO. So here I sit, late as usual, trying to think of something profound to say. I can tell you, on July 23rd, the village received 2.6" of rain in an hour's time. The creek overflowed one of the General Store's bridges so their parking lot was closed until the rain stopped. I was stuck in my side of Dennis Cozzetti's trailer but grateful I was on the Fudge side of the street, just in case we were stranded for awhile. I remember three floods on the mountain since 1979. The first was autumn of 83, when we lost electricity and a section of our road for awhile. Having two kids in diapers, I had to hand wash them and hang them over the wood stove to dry. I remember Ross was stuck up Carter Canyon and had sent his St. Bernard "Snowplow" down the road with a note attached to his collar asking anyone to tie a six pac around his neck and send him back home. The second flood was winter of 92 and we lost road access for a month. The third flood was July of 98 (which I was flashing back on in the trailer) when it rained 6" overnight at Palisades and took the road out in a couple sections for about three weeks. The camps were full at the time and the parents had to come up the back side to retrieve their kids. There was even talk of "food drops" which I don't believe ever happened. Anyway, to make a long story short, the rain on Friday stopped short of flooding and my plans of buying a week's worth of fudge were aborted. Even so, so much has changed since the Bullock and Aspen Fires, to the point of not knowing what to expect when heavy rains occur on the mountain. So far we have been very lucky.

I'd like to thank everyone who participated in this year's 4th of July parade. It was an exceptional turnout and having the Governor here was a real honor. The parties were numerous in cabins still standing and the one at Patty and Tom Thomas's fed up to 400 people. I'm looking forward to Labor Day weekend and the possible opening of "The Cookie Cabin". I was told my walls could be going up on my place as early as next week. To all of you going through the "rebuilding blues" please hang in there and know you are not alone.



A Reality that we all get to have fun with and enjoy. Fire District Update

Mt. Lemmon Fire District (MLFD) is continuing to manage the project of clearing and removing dead standing and down trees from public and private lands on the mountain. This is a fee for service project on private lands-please contact Deanna Barnella or Harry Findysz at 576-1201 for an estimate. MLFD is not trying to make a profit on these projects, but we are trying hard not to go broke. We are starting the first fiscal year where the impact of the property loss of the Aspen Fire is directly affecting our budget. According to the Pima County (PC) Assessor's Office, we will not see the impact of the new construction on our budget until the middle of 2006.

MLFD is currently operating the Air Curtain Destructor (ACD) Monday-Friday days, and T-W-Th nights. Besides the saw crew on staff, we now have access to three Department Of Corrections (DOC) crews, two of which have experienced sawyers among them. MLFD staff is training the third crew in the use of wildland power saws. We have a new three man skidder crew arriving 07/26/04. We have several dump trucks bringing slash to the ACD Tuesday-Friday days. We are negotiating with a Payson broker to bring logging trucks up the mountain to remove all the "sticks" to Tucson and put them on railcars to go to market. Holliday Timber has left the area until Labor Day to take care of prior commitments, but he is planning not only to return but bring a sawmill from New Mexico and set it up in Tucson on land purchased expressly for his use.

MLFD Board members and staff met with various PC department heads yesterday (07/22/04) to review the tree project. We came away with several understandings:

- 1) Anyone who has a need for immediate tree removal should contact MLFD. We are responsive to these needs. The most common successful requests relate to pending reconstruction.
- Anyone who tries to get results regarding tree removal or slash cleanup by going directly to PC will be referred immediately to MLFD
- 3) It is no longer acceptable to put trees or slash in the PC right of way or any drainages, and PC will be looking at enforcement action against those property owners it finds doing this. PC has at least one project oversight manager on the mountain every day.
- 4) MLFD is combining its list of those property owners who have signed Liability Releases and Right of Entry Forms to MLFD with Development Services Department's (DSD) recently compiled list of 134 property owners who they have identified as having tree issues. Any property owner on DSD's list that is also on MLFD's list will be exempt from further enforce-

- ment action from DSD. Liability Release forms are available at MLFD.
- 5) MLFD is working on areas rather than hop-scotching all over the place. We are currently working in Carter Canyon and Upper Loma Linda. When we finish an area, we do not plan on coming back until all other areas of concern have been addressed, which could mean at least a year. Property owners who are not with the program and find themselves left behind will have to hire private contractors to deal with their trees. See items # 3 and # 4 above.
- 6) Any property owner can hire a private contractor to work on their lot. Make certain that the contractor is properly disposing of the material coming off your lot. The ACD is available to private contractors for a nominal fee. See # 3 above.

MLFD staff is working very hard on this project. This is not what we get paid to do. Please bear with us as we help the community to rebuild. If you have any complaints or concerns, please contact Deanna or Harry at 576-1201.

Fuels Management Update

The Mt. Lemmon Fire District is actively seeking wild-land firefighting assignments for its apparatus (fire trucks) and personnel outside of our District. With the assistance of Arizona State Land Department-Fire Management Division, we have just completed a 13-day assignment on the Nuttal Complex Fire on Mt. Graham with a fire truck and three-man crew. We currently have another fire truck and three man crew in Southern California which has been there for 10 days, and we expect to stay for some time. We rotate crews out periodically while the vehicle remains. We often get reassigned from one fire to the next without leaving the area (we are on our third assignment in So Cal). MLFD always maintains sufficient resources in the Summerhaven community to protect the area.

MLFD is doing this to keep our frontline firefighters actively involved in the fire season and to bring much needed revenues into the District. MLFD is starting the beginning of the first fiscal year where we will most acutely bear the impact of the loss of tax revenues due to the destruction of the Aspen Fire. We thank you for your continued support.

Our thoughts and prayers are with fulltime firefighter Dennis Rankin and family for his father Harold Rankin's speedy recovery.— Karen Shunk

Water Co OP/District

Where is the rain? We are barely getting by on the spring flow. I hope by the time this newsletter is in your hands we have had at least some measurable rainfall. It is amazing how fast the spring flow drops off after the 4th of July when the rains are postponed. We are now down to less than 5 gallonsper-minute for the in-flow. On the weekend we were up to 25 to 30 gallons-per-minute of use or out flow. This winter we were getting over 35+ Gallons-per-minute in-flow and 10 to 15 Gallons-per-minute out flow, so all of the tanks were overflowing, but that has changed for the summer months. As you can see this is why we need a large amount of storage to compensate for the reversal in the amounts. I want to tell you to conserve but I really need you to use water. How about if I ask you to conserve a little until we get some rainfall. That would help so much and I would not need to ask for voluntary conservation of 50% of normal use. Maybe you could do the rain dance to get the monsoon season started. All joking aside, please conserve until the rains get started.

The District is almost completed. I am sure you have seen the amount of paper work necessary to do this project. You have only received a small amount of the volume. It is necessary to do all of the public notices and legal procedures. The Arizona Corporation Commission was notified in December last year that we were going on with the formation of the district but it took them until August 2004 to get the notice and meeting scheduled. We hope the ACC meeting will be the final item necessary to complete the transfer of the Co-op's assets. The Water Infrastructure Authority of Arizona (WIFA) has been very helpful in this transition. This agency is loaning our district the funds to pay off the Co-op's existing loans and provide funding for the needed installation of additional storage of over 1,000,000-gallons. This loan amount is \$1,050,000. Due to the Aspen Fire, WIFA is allowing us to go a full year with no payments for the loan. The second year we will pay just the interest of \$25,000. Then on the 3rd year we will need to pay both principal and interest of \$64,000. We feel in three years the District will be in much better financial condition to meet these terms.

WIFA awarded the Water Company an award at the AS-PEN BALL. This award was for the best partnership of water companies in the state. I want to thank Dennis Haynes for all of the organizational work to do the district formation.

FEMA is in the final process to give us the funds necessary to replace some of the loss from the Aspen Fire. Again this has been a long and drawn out process. The main issue that has delayed the funding is our request to install a 6" main line from the new Carter Canyon tank to the 6" in the village by the Living Rainbow gift shop. This will enable the water district to provide better supply to that area and create a fire supply to the Carter Tank. The FEMA funding will allow us

to replace some of the tools and equipment necessary for operation of the water system. The Mt. Lemmon Woman's Club and the Mt. Lemmon Homeowners Association has offered to help provide funding for some items not covered by either insurance or the FEMA funds. We really appreciate this gesture and want to thank both of these community minded organizations.

This is a good time to also thank the "Trees for Mt. Lemmon" for the Great Aspen Ball. This was the first Aspen Ball and it was a success beyond all expectations. The hard work by the people that organized the event really paid off. I think everyone had a wonderful time and the music provided by Scott Jeffers and The Tim O'Connor Group was the best since the Alpine burned down. I even saw Bob Zimmerman dance. All had a good time and the proceeds were nice, too. Thanks to people that provided items for the silent auction. I want to personally thank Dave Shaw for his contribution to the water company in the form of the "Aspen Wood Bowls, the Phoenix Series". Dave was shown on KUAT'S ARIZONA ILLUS-TRATED prior to the Ball with his creation of bowls turned from the Oak tree that was in front of the Alpine Pump House. Dave conveyed the true emotion felt by the Tucson community during his interview. These bowls are a work of love and a keepsake for those who were able to bring them to their homes. Dave made 20 wood bowl creations that brought in about \$2,000 for the water company. Thanks to all involved bringing additional funding to the water company.

We will distribute trees again on Saturday July 24 and July 31 from 11 A.M. to 1 P.M. at Zimmerman School. If you have attended the Tree Planting Class come and get trees on these dates. We have had 3 Tree Planting classes and will not be having anymore until early next spring due to scheduling conflicts with our instructor. Big thanks go to Bonnie Lohman, Pete Krauss and John Eisele for helping on the 17th and to Lindy and Steve Brigham who handed out trees on July 24th. Dorothy Crawford deserves a big hand for caring for the trees with a generous dose of TLC since we took them up to Mt Lemmon a couple of months ago.

John Jones organized 13 people to plant trees on Loma Sabino Common Land near Yuma and Upper Loma Linda. They got a mini class from Anastasia on tree planting and planted 27 trees. It was slow going but they learned a lot and John will have other groups organized to plant again in late July and early August in another area.

The two Water Harvesting classes we have had have been a great success. One was on July 17 on Mt Lemmon the other was in Tucson on June 29 A total of 30 people attended and are enthusiastic about what they have learned. We will offer these classes again next year. Big thanks to Linda Currin for managing the set up of the class.

There will be a planting demonstration at the time they are distributed.


