Cleanup work will start in the beginning of July on the Ponderosa Lodge, Alpine Lodge and Mt Lemmon Inn sites on the west side of Sabino Canyon Park Rd. Trees will be removed along with concrete and other fire debris. The air curtain destructor which has served the community well will be removed by the Mt Lemmon Fire Dept from the Ponderosa site. Plans are under way to graft the shoots from the apple tree onto root stock in the fall.

Building plans have been drawn up for submission to Pima County for the new Mt.Lemmon Water District valve house which will be built on the north side of Turkey Run Rd, replacing the "Purple Lemmon building."

The plans for the new Lodge are nearly complete. Over the summer months, financing will be arranged and marketing packages will be prepared for the sale of lodge suites. The 25 lodge rooms are designed as 1, 2 or 3 bedroom suites. The 18 two bedroom suites contain a lock out bedroom which can be rented separately from the living room/ bedroom suite. 2500 sq ft of retail space is available and can be divided into 4 separate storefronts. A leasing opportunity for a restaurant with over 4500 sq ft interior space and 2000 sq ft of deck space is also available. Contact Bob at Mt Lemmon Realty for more information.

Current plans are for construction on the Lodge and Community Center to begin in earnest after Labor Day to avoid disruption to the village and the spotted owl mating season.

#### Sunday Newspaper Now Available

Lemmon Cookie Cabin and Pizza place, the Sunday Arizona Daily Star will be available at the General Store. Vic has offered to transport the newspapers up the mountain on Sunday mornings. There are no reserved papers or pre-payment plans, since we are buying direct from Tucson Newspapers, Inc. we can over order every week and return for credit any unsold newspapers. Papers should be available for sale at 10:00 AM when we open for business. See you Sunday morning.

#### Santa Catalina Mountains Partnership

As a result of the 2 day Stakeholder's meeting on April 1 and 2, about 30 individuals representing organizations and governmental entities have met to discuss natural resource management for the Mt Lemmon area. The group has selected a moderator, John S. Jones and an assistant moderator, Sarah Davis to facilitate the meetings.

The group approved the following statement: The mission of the Santa Catalina Mountains Partnership is to restore healthy forests and sustainable communities through collaborative management: Promoting Stewardship, Practicing Partnership, Joint Planning, Project Implementation, Public Education and Community Involvement. The group agreed to seek non-profit status in order to obtain grants and gifts to implement projects.

Working committees have been formed to address communications and public education, water resources management, the community fire plan, forest products and the Forest Service Management Plan.

#### Hot Water

Are you in the planning stages of rebuilding your cabin? Even if you are past the point of planning, short of having the plumbing complete, think about instant hot water at your tap, every tap in your cabin. How much cold water do you let run down the drain while you wait for that hot shower? How about that feeling you get when you go to wash your hands in the middle of winter? The wasted water really adds up. Water is the most precious commodity on this mountain and most of the time the least available. All it takes is a little electricity, the most easily replenished utility on the mountain (and least costly).

If your plumber installs a return line to your water heater from the faucet and a small electric pump installed at the water heater you can have hot water within 2 seconds of opening the hot water faucet. The pump comes with a built in timer. You might not care if you have instant hot water at 2 in the morning so you can have it turn off automatically. The timer can be set to pump water through the hot water line from 7 AM to 10 PM daily or whenever you normally get up and go to bed. If you are an occasional cabin user you could just put the pump on an On/Off switch and turn it on when you come up to use your cabin. Talk to your builder or plumber. A little cash now could be well worth it in the long run, not to mention the luxury of instant hot water!

#### Cheatgrass Identified on Mt. Lemmon, Eradication Project Implemented

Cheatgrass (Bromus tectorum) was first identified on Mt. Lemmon in 1976, in the vicinity of Lemmon Creek. The plant is native to Eurasia and the Mediterranean. It is thought to have been introduced to the Intermountain West, where it is the dominant species on more than 100 million acres, in impure seed in the 1800s. The grass is now widely distributed throughout the 48 contiguous United States. It is extremely invasive, competing with native plants for soil moisture, and it produces a high volume of seeds. Well adapted to fire, it often dominates plant communities following fires. Once established, cheatgrass-dominated vegetation types greatly increase the potential for and recurrence of wildfires.

Cheatgrass has recently been identified along the Catalina Highway, and at several recreation sites. The weekend of June 11 and 12, seventeen volunteers and Forest Service personnel spent 125 hours removing 48 large garbage bags of the plants. It is hoped that the remainder will be eradicated this weekend (June 18 and 19). A volunteer-powered removal project will take place at various locations along the roadway. This plant is a major threat, and the timing is crucial. The plants are about to go to seed. The seed is spread by vehicles and equipment, as well as by animal fur, clothing, shoes, and wind. If these plants produce seed along the roadway they have the potential to spread the entire length of the highway. and down into the Tucson Basin, where cheatgrass already occurs in places. It will also spread away from the road into and throughout the forest. If seed is dispersed in watersheds, it may spread down canyons into drainages like Bear and Sabino Creeks. It's imperative we remove it before that happens.



Additionally, the Forest Service is working with Summerhaven residents to eradicate the pest where it occurs in the community. A volunteer project in the village is being organized for the weekend of June 25 and 26. (See related information in this newsletter.) Teamwork here will benefit all involved. Establishment of cheatgrass would be detrimental to lands under both private and public ownership.

#### Fire District Update

I hope everyone is enjoying the wonderful weather we have been having on Mt. Lemmon. MLFD has been busy with continuing to clean dead standing and down trees throughout the village. The Air Curtain Destructor has returned to the center of the village to clean up the site it sits on to prepare for commercial construction to begin in the near future. MLFD was awarded added funds to continue clearing the right-of-way for Pima County; we will begin in the Ajo corridor in the next couple months.

Many questions have been directed to MLFD about slash being left near cabins in Fern Ridge and Soldiers Camp. The logging contract is underway and the material not being salvaged by the loggers is being cut and scattered. This operation of "lop and scatter" is under the guidance of the Forest Service and any concerns or questions should be directed toward Bill Hart, Fuels Management Officer, (520) 749-7717 or wrhart@fs.fed.us.

Looking around Summerhaven is breathtaking with the size of homes replacing the loss from the Aspen Fire. To keep up with the growth and provide the highest level of service to our residents and visitors the board of directors of MLFD has approved the purchase of two new all-wheel drive water tenders. These much-needed pieces of apparatus will hold 2000 gallons of water each and be capable of pumping 650 gallons of water per minute. The fuel loads of larger cabins and remote locations increased the need to have more capable water transportation to compliment the water district as they are installing new hydrants and updating the water storage tanks. The delivery should be in time to show them at the 4th of July parade. Special funding was established with First Bankers at a great interest rate and deferred payments until 2007.

#### IF YOU FEED THE BIRDS

Now that the new cabins are going up, our thoughts turn to the other life that lives on our mountain. First I will say we should never feed wild animals. However, having said that, many of us will be feeding the birds for the joy of seeing them up close, so bring your binoculars and have fun, but here are a few things to consider.

Animals do not need us to feed them. They are able to take care of themselves without our help. You do not need to worry if you go away for several weeks, the birds will be just fine without your help. They will be right back at your feeder when you start feeding them again.

Remember the humming bird food mixture is one cup of sugar to four cups of water and boil for about six minutes. Do not add color as they can find the food from the color of the feeder. This mixture will keep in the refrigerator for about a week. If there are bears in the neighborhood take in your feeders at night. Try to suspend your feeders so it is not so easy for the squirrels to get to them. The hummingbirds are very territorial so if you can put up several feeders you will have more birds.

As far as birdseed for the others, all of them love sunflower seed and other mixtures are welcome to. Again, try to hang the feeders, and not ground feed as this can attract all kinds of unwelcome visitors. The tassel-eared squirrel likes peanuts, as do the chipmunks and Jays. All the birds appreciate water and the best way is a birdbath or a flowerpot saucer on top of an overturned flowerpot. Some people put out melon rinds for the squirrels and woodpeckers, but remember if they are left out overnight the skunks and raccoons also enjoy these treats. You don't get to choose which wild animals come to your feeders.

Have a quiet summer and enjoy the other creatures that share our mountain.
