Message from the Pres



Fire District Update

Hello to all! As many of you are aware, the Fire District has removed the Air Curtain Destructor from the old Ponderosa lot. Our generous lease term has expired. Pima County is still working with the Fire District to continue the right-of-way Hazard Fuel Abatement program. The Pima County Board of Supervisors has approved an additional \$320,000 to assist with the funding. This means the cutting of dead trees will go on! Instead of the operation of the Air Curtain Destructor, the firefighters will continue with burn piles. These burn pile operations will not take place until the 1st snow. Cutting operations will begin mid-September. The Fire District is in the middle of hiring 2 full-time firefighter positions and additional crew for cutting operations. The Fire District is still cutting for personal lots. Precedence will be given to those under new construction. All others will be placed on a list and completed as time and availability permits. This brings us into FireWise. The FireWise program began on Mt. Lemmon in May of 2001. Since that time, the FireWise program has accomplished the following:

- · Developed and Continues Interagency Relations with the Arizona State Land Department, Coronado National Forest, UofA Cooperative Extension, the Mt. Lemmon HOA, the Loma Sabino HOA, the Willow Canyon HOA, members of the Mt. Lemmon Community, the Pima County Sheriff's Department, and Pima County Development Services
- · Host annual homeowner educational events
- · Assists with educational programs for surrounding Communities
- · Conducted bucket brigade and chainsaw safety classes for homeowners
- · Created the Volunteer Fire Support program
- · Completed and continues to distribute FireWise brochures and educational materials
- · Developed the NeighborWise communication efforts
- · Continues to receive and complete fuels treatment grant projects, along with the Loma Sabino Pines HOA
- · Completed a Community Wildfire Protection Plan
- · Become a Nationally Recognized FireWise Community

The FireWise Committee meets once each month, except during fire season. These are public meetings and we encourage all members of the community to participate, to attend and/or get involved. The next scheduled meeting will be held on Saturday, September 24th at 10:00 a.m. The FireWise meeting will be held at the Mt. Lemmon Fire Station. Back at the Station. We have 2 staff members that will begin the Paramedic program on Tuesday, August 23rd. They will complete this program in April of 2006. After that time, we should have a Paramedic available on each shift. What a win, win! These two members have offered to split and deliver firewood during their shift. If anyone is interested in ½ chords of split and stacked firewood, it would be delivered on Fridays for \$100. All proceeds will be set forth to assist with tuition for our 2 firefighters. Summerhaven Village Center

Building plans for the construction of the Lodge at Summerhaven Village Center are now 85% complete.

The site plans for the mixed-use village center are nearing completion as well. The construction has been delayed until early spring in order to complete the financing package. Cleanup work will continue on the Lodge site to remove trees and debris.

Pima County has recently contracted with Hunter Contracting to begin work on the site improvements. Their first task will be the reconstruction of the drainage way under Sabino Canyon Parkway. A new bridge will be built to convey Sabino Creek using a concrete arch that will be faced with native stone. Construction will begin in the middle of October.

Kaneen Public Relations will coordinate with the merchants and the public to insure that access is maintained during the 3 to 4 week construction project. Depending on the weather, Hunter may provide temporary pavement and resume work in the spring.

Pima County will bid out the construction of the Mt Lemmon Community Center later this year with construction taking place in the spring. A group headed by Steve Brigham has been established to plan for the public art, furnishings and equipment for the Community Center and surrounding grounds.

Santa Catalina Mountains Partnership

At the last meeting of the Santa Catalina Mountains Partnership, the US Forest Service presented a grant opportunity to fund a project that would benefit the community. By consensus the group determined that continued tree removal of fire-damaged trees adjacent to the Catalina Highway would remove hazards as well as improve the visual quality of the approach to Summerhaven.

Future meetings of the Partnership will discuss the Mt Lemmon Community Center, the Mt Lemmon Aerial Tram, Watershed Planning, Forest Management and other issues that impact the Mt Lemmon community.

WATER DISTRICT

It is hard to believe that winter is just around the corner. Soon the leaves will turn to the yellows and reds of autumn and a chill will lie over the mountain. Yes, water freezes at thirty-two degrees and all of us need to be ready for the unexpected cold snap that gets here about the end of October. Most of the owners that have one of the historic cabins probably have a turn-on/turn-off list or procedure. Customers with newer cabins need to make a list to operate their water system and to ease the starting-up and shutting-down of their cabins. A draining procedure is necessary to prevent damage to your cabin. This operation procedure will help prevent damage of the expensive plumbing and prevent water loss. Always remember to shut off your water meter. This will prevent water running into your plumbing system when you are away. Several years ago, a customer did not shut off his meter. During a very cold spell, the water supply tube froze and broke under the kitchen sink. The leaking went undetected for two weeks. By the time we were able to find the leak and shut off the water meter, the damage was done. The water had soaked the lower portion of the walls, ruined the flooring, and caused a \$980 water bill. Sure the customer's insurance covered most of the thousands of dollars of damage but the repairs took over six-weeks. It is so much easier to shut off your water meter. Please call us if you have problems with a meter valve that is hard to turn. We will replace the valve. One of the District's requirements is for the customer to have a shutoff valve on their side of the meter. This customer valve can be operated when the district valve is inoperative. As we have discussed in past issues, there are two other requirements for the customer side of the meter. One is the pressure regulator and the other is a check valve. WHICH IS IT?

There are many little gray birds flying around our houses this time of year. Are they nuthatches or chickadees?

There are three different types of nuthatches that live on the mountain. These are the only birds that are able to go straight down the tree trunk and eat the insects that are missed by some of the other birds like the woodpecker. Their diet also includes seeds, acorns and berries. They will also come to the feeders for suet and sunflower seeds. They nest any where from 5 to 120 feet above the ground in natural cavities or old woodpecker holes.

The white-breasted nuthatch is the largest of the three types. They have a black crown and white face and underparts but can have a little rust color on their rumps. The female has a little duller marking. The nest is made of twigs; bark shreds, fur and hair. They store their food in bark crevices and the male feeds the female when she is on the nest.

The smallest nuthatch is the pygmy nuthatch. They have a gray cap that goes down to the darker line through the eye, a light tan belly and gray back. This nuthatch eats pine seeds and uses pine scales in her nest as well as the other more common material. They also eat many insects along with the same foods of other nuthatches. The pygmy nuthatch goes in flocks and roost together. They have nests groups that consist of a breeding pair and several unmated males that help with the young.

The red-breasted nuthatch has a dark cap and a white line before the black eyeline. He has a reddish breast and gray back. He also likes the sunflower seeds and suet in the winter. When she builds the nest she uses mosses and grasses along with shredded bark and rootlets. The nest has pitch smeared around the entrance hole to help discourage predators. This nuthatch is fairly common all over the country.

The most common chickadee we have is the mountain chickadee. He has a black bib under his chin. There is a faint white line where an eyebrow would be but this is not always visible as it wears off going into and out of the nest. He does not go straight down the tree but still eats many insects from the bark. His nests are similar to the nuthatches and he does "courtship" feeding of the females. It is possible that an occasional Mexican chickadee may wander over but they are mainly in the Chiricahua Range. They would have a large black bib and buff colored belly.

So now you can tell which is which, the nuthatches go head first down the trees and the chickadees have a black bib. They are all acrobats and such fun to watch.


