The Fire District continues to work on the Hazard Fuel Abatement project for Pima County Department of Transportation. Some slash piles have been burned when conditions are safe. It is anticipated the project will continue into June 2007. MLFD is working with the Forest Service to continue fuel reduction around Willow Canyon and Rose Canyon Lake.

MLFD still has two fire hydrants available for adoption. To acquire one of these cute, highly sought after water delivery devices please contact DeAnna at the fire station. The donation amount per fire hydrant is \$2500.00. Once installed a plaque will be attached conveying donator information. There will be more hydrants available in the future, but donation cost will increase.

Plant Distributions:

As in past years, Trees for Mt. Lemmon will have plants available this summer to coincide with the monsoon planting season, probably mid-July.

The selection is subject to change since our nursery guru in Flagstaff, Brad Blake, is just starting to germinate the seeds, but as of now we are planning to have:

Trees: Ponderosa, Douglas Fir, White Fir

Understory: Willow, Dogwood Ground Cover: Strawberry, Lima Bean

Wildflowers: Primrose, Penstemmon, Columbine

Grasses: Arizona Fescue

We are thinking of providing seed again this year similar to the seed mix put together previously of wildflowers and grasses. If people are interested, please contact Trees for Mt. Lemmon (info@treesformountlemmon.org) or one of the board members.

Since we are no longer funding our plant propagation with grants, we are asking people who take plants and seeds for a small donation to cover costs.

Cheatgrass Eradication:

Awaiting us under the snow is the next crop of cheatgrass. Last season we documented most of the areas where it was growing, in preparation of doing extensive eradication this spring. Cheatgrass is a highly flammable grass that has been found on the mountain in the last couple of years and is of concern because it would significantly compromise our ability to keep fires under control in Summerhaven. In Utah, cheatgrass has extended the fire season. It creates an extensive seedbed that can survive fire and repopulate quickly before native plants can become re-established. Because of its short life cycle, cheatgrass becomes dry fuel for fires by early summer, making many areas easy targets for hotter, faster-moving fires that burn with greater intensity.

Trees for Mt. Lemmon will have workshops on identification and eradication of cheatgrass for property owners again this spring both on the mountain and in town. Look for demonstrations at the annual FireWise event to be held April 28, 2007, at the fire station. To get the annuancements on these workshops and other timely information, make sure you are signed up on the message board. You can access it through the Trees for Mt. If you think you see cheatgrass on your property, please contact Trees for Mt. Lemmon. We will help you identify and eradicate it. We will have volunteer crews pulling cheatgrass in common areas and on homeowner's property if you request it.

Since cheatgrass has just started to grow in our area and has not become established extensively in Summerhaven, we still have time to completely eradicate it!

Forest Service Exploring Options for Sabino Canyon Heidi Schewel

More than six months have passed since the geologic event which occurred in Sabino Canyon. Heavy rains on July 31st brought water, rock and sediment down the hillsides and into the canyon. Rattlesnake Creek cut through the roadway into Upper Sabino. Further upstream, the road was buried beneath tons of large boulders in several locations, rendering it impassable to vehicular traffic. Due to safety concerns, the roadway was closed to the public. Since then, the washouts have been basically repaired, and the roadway cleared to a passable condition. Currently the shuttle operated by Sabino Canyon Tours, Inc. is traveling to Shuttle Stop #4. Pedestrians and cyclists may journey to Shuttle Stop #9. All trails are open with the exception of the Phoneline Trail, the Sabino Historic Trail, and the Sabino Canyon Trail from Shuttle Stop #9 to the junction of the East Fork and West Fork trails.

So, what's in store for the future? The majority of those who responded to our requests for comments regarding the canyon indicated they would like to see the road returned to the pre-flood state. Our overall goal is to get as many people safely into Sabino Canyon as far as possible, as soon as possible. For the short term, the Forest Service has applied for a grant from Emergency Relief for Federally Owned Roads (ERFO) to further repair the road and create barriers and runoff areas in anticipation of future debris flows and flooding events. A decision on that request is expected any day. Work would begin soon thereafter. It is possible that repairs including shuttle access will be funded to Shuttle Stop #4, Shuttle Stop #6 or Shuttle Stop #8.

For the longer term, we are applying for a grant from Alternative Transportation for Parks and Public Lands (ATPPL) to fund a study of transportation needs in Sabino. Over the next year or so, the study would examine needs for access into the canyon, purposes of transportation, types of equipment, etc. Upon completion of the study, consideration will be given to recommendations regarding the transportation system in the Sabino Canyon, and changes may be made.

We are exploring our funding options to repair the road between Shuttle Stops #8 and #9, and to repair the Phoneline and Sabino Canyon trails. Our immediate desire is to improve access to Shuttle Stop #9, to create a trail to an overlook site just above it, and to provide interpretive signage describing the recent debris flow activity and what we might expect in the future. Trail repairs will require more time, due to the extent and location of the damage. If funding cannot be secured, we may look to the community, working with the Friends of Sabino Canyon, for assistance. Once that is in place, we are ready to begin reconstruction.

We are moving forward with making repairs and improving conditions in Sabino Canyon. It will take two to three years for everything to be fully operational. But we need to keep in mind, what we are "fixing" was damaged by natural processes. Many areas in Upper Sabino are now unstable. There are no guarantees that work which is done will remain unchanged by nature. We've been hearing a lot of a phrase lately, "geology happens!" And it usually happens so slowly we don't even notice it. We should remember, we were in "the right place at the right time" to experience a major geologic event, something many people will never do. We can consider that a privilege and a learning opportunity. After all, there's no going back.
