# MT. LEMMON COMMUNITY CENTER (MLCC) NEWS:

By the time this article is read the Community Center has been dedicated.

Pima County is building the center and is asking the community of Mt. Lemmon to manage it. The building is so beautiful and the credit goes to our Pima County Supervisor Ray Carroll, the persistent encouragement of Mt. Lemmon citizens, a team of dedicated volunteers and the generous funding of Pima County taxpayers.

Now is the time for the community to step forward to make this truly the center of community spirit. Some organizations and individuals have already done so much. The Trees for Mt. Lemmon and the Mt. Lemmon Woman's club organizations have committed \$5,000 each to furnish the Community Center with tables and chairs. Trees for Mt. Lemmon have done a great job on the landscaping and are now nurturing the new plantings. The Mt. Lemmon Homeowner's Association is funding the legal and accounting services needed to form the 501C3 management organization. The beautiful flag pole was donated by Olga and Fred Pace.

There are still several opportunities to volunteer and donate to our center. Some immediate needs are critical to a successful center. Cash is always a great option to material donations. All checks should be made out to Mt. Lemmon Community Center, INC.

The Pima County Parks and Recreation and the Mt. Lemmon Community Center are actively forming an alliance to put a management agreement together. This agreement is temporary until a 501C3 organization can be completed. This could take up to 1 year. In one month we have approved bylaws for the organization, secured a tax ID, opened a checking account, opened a Mt. Lemmon mail box, created committees and begun the long and tedious 501C3 formation.

## ONE BOWL BREAD RECIPE BY CARRIE REITZ

2 cups warm water
2 ½ tsp. Salt
4 cup powdered skim milk
6 tbsp. Liquid shortening
1 pkg. Active dry yeast
6 cups sifted enriched flour
3 tbsp. Sugar

- 1. Stir sugar, salt, dried milk and liquid shortening into 1 cup very warm water.
- 2. Sprinkle yeast over 1 cup very warm water in large bowl.
  - 3. Add milk mixture to dissolved yeast.
  - 4. Stir in half of flour mixture. Beat or mix until smooth.
- 5. Add remaining half of flour gradually. (More or less half)
- 6. Stir until irregular ball is formed and it comes away from the bowl.
- 7. Knead on floured board 10 to 12 minutes, until slight bubbles can be seen on the surface of the ball of dough.
- 8. Put in slightly greased bowl, cover and let rise in warm place until dough has doubled in size.
- 9. Punch down and cut dough into portions (depending on size of the bread pan) and place in slightly greased bread pans.
- 10. Let loaves double in size in a warm place, (covered with a cloth)
- 11. Bake at 350 degrees for approx. 40 minutes. Turn out of pans immediately and rub top of loaves with margarine or butter while still warm.
  - 12. Let cool on a rack. ENJOY

Being organized, having a legal fund and having active LOCAL voice participation enables the Association to accomplish most of its goals. Pima County has said the MLHO is the strongest and most respected homeowners' organization in the entire county. The Annual Dinner and Meeting is held each year on the first Tuesday after taxes.

# Turkey Run Wildflower Walk

Six intrepid flower enthusiasts joined Susan Fleming on Sunday, June 24, to see what was growing on Turkey Run. John and Linda Mulay, Carol Niehoff, Mary Ellen Barnes, Jeanne Mayer, and Mike Johnson started with a list of 56 plants that had been compiled over several years and at different times during the growing season. Scarlet monkeyflower, mountain parsley, cow parsnip, and sweet yellow clover were present in abundance, and the cliff bushes were in full bloom. Other plants that had flowered earlier could be identified by fruits that were beginning to form. These included baneberry, false Solomon seal, and gooseberry. Some plants, such as the bog orchid, were just forming buds. Other plants had one or two flowers open. These were either just finishing or just starting their blooming cycle.

Finding both the spotted and striped coral root was a real treat. At only five or six inches tall they can easily be mistaken for dried twigs. It isn't until you get down on your hands and knees, preferably with the assistance of a hand lens, that the exquisite little orchids can be fully appreciated. On the other end of the spectrum, deer's ears sends up a flower spike that can be over six feet tall, but the one to two inch wide green flowers can easily be overlooked.

In all we were able to identify 48 plants, two of which were not on the original list. A non-native apple tree and a native blue porch pentstemon were found near the water tanks.

#### CHEATGRASS:

We would like to thank everyone that helped with the eradication effort this year. This is a long term project. We will be asking for volunteers each spring when this grass comes up. The answer is "many hands." The more people involved the better job we can do to remove this invasive grass.

After the Bullock fire, residents were diligent about removing pine needles from their property to cut down the fire hazard. Cheatgrass is a fire hazard that burns much hotter than pine needles and other grasses. The concern is that it will get into the creek and spread down the mountain. If a fire occurs anywhere along that path, it could burn straight up the hill toward Summerhaven. We can prevent this by removing it on all private property and also forest service areas. It is especially prevalent along the roadway.

For more information about cheatgrass go to www.unce.unr.edu. When you get to that page in the upper right corner is a search option, put in cheatgrass, all one word, and it will give you several articles. One article says that cheatgrass can send flames 8 feet in the air and travel 4.5 miles in one hour. We all need to educate ourselves to protect our mountain community.

Next year when we put out the call for "pulling parties" please come. Everyone needs to know what it looks like and how to remove it correctly from their own property.

### CATALINA MOUNTAINS. THE HIGH COUNTRY

This series is reproduced with the permission of the author. The complete guide is available at the RAINBOW GIFT SHOP... it is accompanied by a great map. I also suggest that a compass or GPS might be valuable tools on the more difficult hikes for those of you who have DDS as I do. (Direction Deficit Syndrome). I will first give you a little of the guides preface so you can get a sense of how this guide came to be, then I will start with one of the easy hikes described in the guide—Carrie Reitz

The collaborators of this guide, laugh, drink, and plot under the guidance of a long time local hiking loony tune and ne'er do well: Rumson Framboise. The collaborators take NO responsibility for your or your life. Lack of experience, inappropriate preparation, poor judgment, rotten weather, bad luck, or whatever—your trip is all yours and yours alone. If you aren't too sure, turn back. Or better yet, don't go at all!

One general guideline: if you really do get lost, disoriented, or can't figure out where you are or how to get back in this high country—then walk UPHILL... Many books suggest sit where you are and wait to be rescued. This only works if someone not in your group is going to come look for you and actually find you before it gets dark and cold. Walking downhill and off this mountain is a long and difficult project for the best outdoorsman. It will take one or two days if you make it all. Walking UPHILL for an hour or so will almost certainly get you to a location or road from which you can figure out your problem.

Summerhaven to the Ski Valley—1 ½ mile

Turkey Run Road heads west from the village by the new Community Center along Sabino Creek. Adequate village parking is in the plans so you can leave your vehicle there and really enjoy this lovely walk up the valley beside the creek. There are scattered private cabins along the way the no legal or safe place for public parking. Shortly after the pavement stops, the road is gated. Past the last water tank and some concrete foundations on the right (north), a parallel trail diverges left from the road track with the path lateraling along the south side of the valley. Actually this trail is a water line route. Water works and a couple old cabin sites may be noted along the way. The trail and 4WD track merge again later and continue meandering up this delightful streamside setting. There is a trail junction at the bottom of the ski run area. The right branch turns north across the creek and slides up the highway embankment to pop up on Ski Run Road behind the guard rail directly across the highway from the Iron Door restaurant. There is no trail sign or other visible identification here. The left or south branch from the trail junction is the Aspen Draw Trail (1.6 miles) to the top of the ski lift. This is a well constructed and well graded trail. Lovely old growth. This trail is wonderful any time of year, cool and green in the summer; gorgeous in autumn colors.

# Mt. Lemmon Service Area Watershed Study and Wastewater Management Plan Public Meeting

Pima County's Wastewater Management Department is finalizing a project, in partnership with the Pima County Department of Environmental Quality and the U.S. Forest Service, to develop the Mt. Lemmon Service Area Watershed Study and Wastewater Management Plan. The project team is seeking community comment on the study's findings and recommendations.


The initial effort collected data, developed management strategies, and sought community input through a public workshop, held feb. 10, 2007. Forty-two members of the public attended the workshop and helped to prioritize public-interest factors and develop management options regarding wastewater system issues and activities on Mt. Lemmon. The study identified the conditions and circumstances existing in and around the Mt. Lemmon community, and the significant issues and challenges involved in planning wastewater systems for the future.

The Mt. Lemmon Service Area Watershed Study and Wastewater Management Plan includes the nature and sequences of all capital projects recommended for the Mt. Lemmon wastewater conveyance, treatment and discharge systems.
