

Update to Bark Beetle Activity in Bear Canyon

In the upper reaches of Bear Canyon, *Ips* engraver bark beetles are causing mortality in Arizona pine and Chihuahua pine. Dead trees are visible from Catalina Highway near Chihuahua Pine, Middle Bear and Cypress picnic areas and the General Hitchcock Campground.

The Coronado National Forest is proposing the removal of about 400 bark beetle infested trees around Chihuahua Pine, Middle Bear and Cypress picnic areas and the General Hitchcock Campground to decrease the magnitude of the bark beetle infestation in these popular recreation sites and to reduce the anticipated future tree mortality.

The Forest Service is working with Arizona State Forestry crews to remove the trees. The infested logs will be disposed of in areas isolated from other pine trees. The FS is also working with Forest Health Protection, a branch of the Forest Service that manages insects and disease, to mitigate beetle damage and limit impacts to existing live trees.

The Bear Canyon recreations sites will be closed during this phase of the work, which is anticipated to be completed by March 1st. The FS will continue to monitor the area over the next year. Although the removal of infested trees will decrease the bark beetle population and mitigate future tree mortality, it is likely that lower, but still elevated, levels tree mortality will continue. The FS may need to do additional tree removals next winter in this location or in other high value locations on the District.

Keep Thinking Snow!

Welcome to February! As always, the weather is creating much talk. The snow has been slight, and we've had some rain, all of which have helped our springs to produce 20-30 gallons per minute (GPM). There's still a lot of time over winter to add to the precipitation. It is already better than last year.

We completed the projects for 2014. Both the Ray/Tucson and Tempe Avenue projects are complete and operating. Tempe is now supplied from our Miner's Ridge tank system. The Ray/Tucson project now has a 6" mainline from our Loma Linda tank, and we were able to add 6 new fire hydrants to the system. The operations crew is continuing to install customer meters and perform regular maintenance on the system. Please call if you have questions or a water quality issue.

Recently, I have noticed how often my cabin's aerators need to be cleaned. They seem to pick up mineral deposits weekly! Every cabin owner should remove and clean the aerators after an absence, as they begin use of the cabin's water system. When you shut off and drain your water in the fall, add a small amount of environmentally safe antifreeze in the toilet and drains to protect your drain pipes from freezing. Then, when you start up in the spring, one of the last things you should have on your "turn-on and shut-off" list should be to remove the faucet's aerators and clean them. This will remove tiny particles in the screen and restrictors, thus allowing smooth flow. Often customers call the office wondering about lack of water pressure. Mineral content and dirt in the aerators, flow restrictors, and deposit screens, even those in showerheads and pressure regulators at your meter box, frequently account for this situation.

The District personnel are always available to address issues of low flow on the system since this might lead to the discovery of a leak and potentially save thousands of gallons of our precious resource.


Amazing Ski Valley's Humble Beginnings

Many people do not know the Mt. Lemmon Ski Area was initially started by Lowell Thomas, the "This is Lowell Thomas with the News" radio broadcaster. Thomas is one of the first adventure journalists and the man who made Thomas Edward Lawrence of "Lawrence of Arabia" famous.

During World War II, a group of skiers including Lowell Thomas, the noted journalist and adventurer, a local forest ranger, and many Davis Monthan servicemen which included Thomas' sickly son, later a governor of Alaska, and Art Devlin, a future Olympic ski jumper and television commentator, formed the Sahuaro Ski Club.

Paul Webb, the well-known cartoonist, created a patch and membership certificates for the club's members, showing a skier wrapped around a saguaro cactus. Thomas sent honorary memberships to dozens of friends, including famous personalities around the world, making membership a tongue-in-cheek must. A ski gala was held that first year at the Arizona Inn with many of Thomas's friends in attendance. A Forest Service lease was obtained, an old Model A with its tires removed, propelled a rope tow to the top, and thus the Mt. Lemmon Ski Valley had its unlikely beginnings.

There are lots of trails to hike in the Mt. Lemmon area, but one of the best ones is the route to the Bathtub. To get to this trail you go to Soldier's Pond, which is the first of many ponds that all lead up to the biggest pond with the best view.

From Soldier's Pond you climb down on to a trail and follow that one for a while; on the way you pass by rock climbers, beautiful scenery, and cross a running stream.

In one part of the trail you are surrounded by columbines that are red and yellow. It's really a sight to see. A little past this is an area I like to call "Danger Ledge" where the right side of the trail drops off about 15 feet, like a cliff. The distance from Soldier's Pond to the climbing rocks is about 550 ft., but from there you continue another 500 ft. before you start to see pools of water. Then, if you keep walking you will see an opening in the trees at the final pool. The view is breath- taking, and you can see straight down to the bottom of the crystal clear water. If you've never been, the Bathtub is a wonderful hike.

Cheatgrass Grant Takes Center Stage!

The Mt. Lemmon community now has a signed agreement with Arizona State Forestry Division Invasive Plants Grants Program for managing cheatgrass in the Summerhaven area. The key points include the following:

- This is a Mt. Lemmon community grant from the Arizona State Forestry Division that has the support of our community leaders, our HOAs, and our community organizations, including the Mt. Lemmon Woman's Club (MLWC), Mt. Lemmon HOA (MLHOA), Loma Sabino Pines HOA (LSHOA), Mt. Lemmon Fire Department (MLFD), and The University of Arizona School of Natural Resources and the Environment (UA/SNRE).
- The **GOAL** is to remove as much cheatgrass as possible in **two years** on **all** property in Summerhaven so that from then on, it will be much easier for property owners to keep the cheatgrass at bay
- **Start**: December 8th, 2014 **End**: September 30th, 2016, meaning two years of treatment in the summers when cheatgrass is green usually from the end of April until June.
- LSHOA is the fiduciary agent, meaning it is handling the movement of dollars. However, LSHOA will not have any financial obligations for the grant.
- This is a REIMBURSABLE grant which requires us to donate time and spend money before getting reimbursed by the grant sponsor. Trees for Mt. Lemmon has donated funds for start-up expenses.
- The grant includes a MATCH involvement, so our match is in-kind labor and equipment so we will need YOUR VOLUNTEER HOURS TO MAKE THE GRANT SUCCESSFUL. We will need you to DO YOUR PART WHEN THE TIME COMES!
- The total amount of the grant is \$37,231. We have the potential to receive \$18,581 actual dollars from the grant for our expenses, but this requires us to match this amount with in-kind labor at the rate of \$20/hour.
- All property owners will be sent information in the mail asking you to sign a form giving us the ability to selectively spray the cheatgrass on your property. After two years of treatment through this grant, you will be responsible for keeping the cheatgrass out permanently.
- We will be using supervised professional spraying crews and community volunteers to spray with community grant representatives to monitor the work.
- We will also have community pulling events for areas that cannot be sprayed. We will send out information on where and when to show up.
- We will keep the community updated through the listserv and the Echoes and at the annual FireWise
 event on Memorial weekend each year. You can find more information and the grant proposal and

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
