

Mount Lemmon Water News Summer 2016

As July moves on and our monsoons bring the necessary water to replenish the forest and start the creeks flowing, our springs need this flow to give us domestic water. We are dependent on rain and snow to keep the spring water flowing into the tanks. This year seems to be dryer than last year and with that comes added fire danger. June is one of the driest months. Our spring flow drops from about 30 gallons a minute to as low as 4 gallons a minute. We compensate for this drop by having additional storage capacity. We maintain 2,000,000 gallons of water for our use.

During the summer when spring flow is low we use this stored water for our homes and fire fighting. There have been some summers that the district asks the customers to voluntarily conserve 50% of the normal domestic water use. Our customers have always complied with this request and we have averted any other curtailment procedures. When there is a need to conserve, Mount Lemmon has always been able to help with water savings. Once the rains start it usually takes about a week for the spring's flow to increase. These rains also help lessen the extreme fire danger. Right now we are not having any problems, and there are no restrictions. If there is a situation that makes a change in the flow pattern, we will notify all of you by any means necessary. So, as always, please conserve water and be careful with fire. Have a wonderful summer and enjoy all the mountain has to offer.

Stay Hydrated

It is that time of year again, as the skiers have left the mountain and the trails begin to get busy. The flowers are blooming and the weather could not be nicer (at least up the mountain –HOT-HOT-HOT in Tucson). The last thing we think about is staying hydrated. MLFD responds to many patients that complain of not feeling well and believe it is a form of mountain sickness. In reality, many of these patients have been hiking and not drinking enough water. At an elevation of 6,000 feet, you exhale and sweat twice as much than at sea level. As the elevation rises, so does the amount of moisture lost. As we all know, higher altitude means lower air pressure. This results in a rapid evaporation of moisture from skin surfaces and from your lungs. Low humidity is another contributing factor that further accelerates moisture lost. The combination of those two factors means that you need to drink more water to maintain hydration. Signs of dehydration are lack of sweating, dizziness, shortness of breath, nausea, headache, and fatigue. Call 911 without hesitation if you are having any one of these signs.

Az Forestry Cheatgrass Grant Update for July 2016

Congratulations everyone! We have succeeded in matching our grant obligation in our battle to manage the risk of cheatgrass in our community! This invasive fire-prone weed is a formidable challenge, and many other communities around the West have not been as successful as our small mountain community. This doesn't mean our work here is done, but it does mean that we have accomplished important goals for the grant: (1) raised individual property awareness; (2) obtained all the equipment and chemicals we needed; and most importantly, your community volunteer work has had an impact on increasing community responsiveness to the risk of invasive hazards.

As many of you know, some areas look like the cheatgrass is taking over. Fortunately, most of those areas have been effectively treated by many volunteers including our very own Dennis Cozzetti who has hauled our grant-funded commercial sprayer to many challenging areas, and the Fire Department crews. The dead seed heads that you now see will soon dissipate and these areas will not need such aggressive work in subsequent years. Other areas need a renewed effort such as along the Catalina Highway. We are working with the Forest Service and Pima County to get their partnership in treating these areas more consistently. For those who may be discouraged that we have not yet eliminated cheatgrass from our mountain, remember that this is a multi-year effort with the goal to increase everyone's maintenance of individual properties so that eventually we will simply need to remove the occasional plant that may arise. The more consistent everyone is in monitoring and treating, the easier each year will become.

As we enter the warmer months, the cheatgrass season is nearing its end. There will probably be some limited new growth, so keep looking and report any new patches. Remember that purple cheatgrass must be gently pulled and bagged to limit seed spread. It cannot be sprayed. The large areas of straw colored cheatgrass are safe to leave alone now and will eventually disintegrate. However, if you are concerned that an area may endanger your property as a fuel source while it still stands, then pull or weed whack it.

Thank you all for your continued good work with volunteering, reporting, and spraying. I will have a final report for the season next month, and I will put the final report on the grant on the website.

Mount Lemmon Bear Sightings

With the recent string of black bear sightings on Mount Lemmon and Mount Bigelow, the Santa Catalina Ranger District and our partners at Arizona Game and Fish Department want to remind the residents to work with your neighbors to implement basic precautions to reduce the risk of potential encounters. Arizona Game and Fish offers the following tips to minimize conflicts with bears:

- *Store garbage and recyclable items such as aluminum cans inside a secure building or in bear-proof containers.
- *Hang bird feeders at least 10 feet above ground and away from buildings, including porches, and use a tray to catch spills. Discontinue feeding if a bear is in the area.
 - *Do not feed wildlife.
 - *Feed pets inside or remove uneaten pet food between feedings.
 - *Clean barbecues and store in a secure place.
 - *Do not leave food inside vehicles, and remove food smells with a neutralizing spray.

All bear sightings and encounters in and around Summerhaven and other developed areas on the mountain should be reported to the local Arizona Game and Fish Department office at 520-628-5376 (8am-5pm, Monday-Friday, excluding holidays). After hours and weekends, a radio dispatcher is available at 623-236-7201.


Summer Church Services Agenda

FireWise on Mount Lemmon, Arizona

We had some really hot temperatures (for Summerhaven, anyway) during June. Vegetation, especially the grass, is now thoroughly dried out, tinder dry and ready to explode if we get a lightening strike in the right place and have some wind. Many of you have done a commendable job of doing what you can to FireWise your property. Thank you from everybody downwind and/or uphill from you. To protect your property and your neighbors' property, here are a few suggestions for vegetation maintenance.

REMOVE

Rake up leaves, pine needles, dried grasses, and litter, but leave a layer of old decomposing plant matter (duff) if you can. Place these items in a large trash bag to be taken to the burn area near the fire station.

REDUCE

Prune or trim trees and shrubs annually as needed.

REPLACE

Add non-flammable hardscape elements such as boulders, pathways, and other features.

RELOCATE

Firewood, fuel tanks, and combustible debris (wood scraps, grass clippings, leaf and compost piles, etc.) to at least 30 feet from structures.

Helipad area near the fire station is still a drop off location for your cleaned-up vegetation. If you need transportation for your bagged vegetation, give me (Glen Schager) a call at 520-465-6906. Thank you for every bit you do to help reduce the spread of fire.

People are leaving kitchen chairs, wood pallets, plastic bags, and cinder blocks on the pile. The Environmental Protection Agency authorizes the MLFD to burn slash and natural vegetation only. I can't take the risk of EPA fines and sanctions. This is unfortunate for the residents that are using this luxury for its intended purpose and will lose this service due to the few who are misusing it.



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

Just Call 911

Becoming friends with our local firemen, EMT's, and law enforcement officers is bound to happen when we see them so often. It has become second nature to just call them directly instead of using the 911 services. It is very important to their budgets that we utilize the 911 dispatch and not call directly to the firehouse or our sheriff's cell phones. If we don't go through the proper channels, the agency doesn't get credit for the service they have performed.

If you need medical attention, CALL 911.

If you are in need of law enforcement, CALL 911.


MLHOA

The concerns of the organization are not limited to private property owners. Full membership with voting rights is accorded to private owners and leased land holders upon payment of yearly dues. Being organized, having a legal fund and having active LOCAL voice participation enables the Association to accomplish most of its goals. 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

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
