"BLUE-STAKE"

Did you know that if you are planning to dig for any reason, you must contact Arizona 811 so underground utilities are located and marked in advance? This service is also called "BLUE-STAKE". Contacting Arizona 811 is easy and free. Whether you own or rent your home, Arizona law requires you to notify Arizona 811 at least 2 full working days before you start any project, such as planting a tree, installing a fence or other projects that require any type of excavation. Even shallow-depth projects impact telecommunication, electric and gas lines or other underground facilities-and puts you and others at risk for serious injury. Please remember to call the 811 system if you plan to do any digging projects. If you need additional help understanding the Blue-Stake system, please call the Water District at 520-576-1538.

The monsoon season is here and dropped about 4" of rain in the first week and then, nothing. That is what seems to happen when the monsoon comes early. We love and need the rain, but we need regular rainfall to saturate the ground. It takes time, about 2 weeks for the sources in Sabino to show increased flow after the rains start to fall. When we don't get rain for a couple of weeks, then we still need a week or tow after new rain storms to see any evidence at our spring sources.

This time of year, more customers and visitors are on the mountain using water, but our supply has not increased to meet the demand. Water conservation is always a good thing, but is also a necessary way of life on the mountain. That is why it is so important that we have storage tanks to help get us through the dry seasons.

Please remember to keep your watering systems in good working condition and don't leave them on when you are not around. This is one of the most common issues this time of year. People turn on the system for the first time and don't realize that the system leaks or is completely broken. The local rainfall is posted at the Mount Lemmon Post Office is anyone is interested.

So...Let's Talk Money By Randy Ogden, MLFD Chief

The MLFD is your "boutique" full service provider of fire and emergency medical services to the Mount Lemmon community. If you need help above mile post 10.5, we are your only provider for emergency medical services and fire protection. We do work closely with the Pima County Sheriffs and the USFS. Most of the time it is 60-90 minutes before we can get back up assistance for fighting fires or providing emergency medical prehospital care.



Ok...so, where is the money coming from? Secondary property taxes: (*Dropped this year by 4.6%*) to \$481,195.00. Fire District assistance tax: (*Dropped by \$4,744.00*) to \$96,239.00. Subscriptions services: \$2,500.00. EMS rescue service fees (*from non-residents*): \$3,500.00.

This year (July 1st starts the fiscal year) we have an approved budget of \$594,894.00. NOTE: this is down from last year's \$615,960.00

Where does it go? The average MLFD employee (including; firefighter, paramedic, captain) wage is \$40,000.00 a year. The average annual salary for a beginning firefighter in the Tucson area is \$41,290.00 plus benefits. A senior Tucson area firefighter can expect a salary of \$58,970.00 plus benefits per year. MLFD 2017 salaries and wages total \$394,303.00.

MLFD total payroll expenses for 2017 will be \$109,000.00. Medical insurance and worker compensation continue to dramatically rise. Operational costs: \$70,100.00.

The bad news: Financial resources continue to decline and costs continue to rise.

The good news: We are currently maintaining the best possible service fire and EMS protection possible to you, our community. We are currently debt free! We are finishing the 2016 fiscal year with a whopping \$535.00 in the black. However, we have absolutely very little "just in case things break" money.

I am exploring every possible avenue to find additional funding to allow MLFD to continue our current service delivery model. We may need to make some hard decisions in 2018, unless the financial options change. The MLFD Fire Board is not entertaining any tax increases.

Keeping in mind the lack of funds, supporting the fundraisers for the MLFD is crucial for acquiring items not allowed on or through our budget. The next fundraiser we have scheduled will be on August 12th at the MLFD.. Local residents Lorri Hans and Debbie Weatherly will be hosting a spaghetti dinner beginning at 5pm. Lew Widger will be entertaining us with his music as well. The best part of the evening, aside from a great meal for only \$10 is there will be a raffle at the end of the night and Lorri and Debbie will be giving away another Dust N Dine. With each meal purchased, everyone will get 1 raffle ticket that will be put in the hat. If you'd like to buy more tickets to increase your odds at winning the raffle item, they will be available until 7pm. Winner does not need to be present to win. Hope everyone can make it. Dinner will include, spaghetti with marinara sauce, meat balls, garlic bread, and Cesar salad. There will be an assortment of desserts donated by many locals. Beverages are being donated by the General Store. Bottled water, Pepsi, and Diet Pepsi will be available. Please bring your beverage choice if you don't care for any of these.

Forest Service Seeks Proposals

Forest Service seeks proposals to operate four developed recreation sites on Mount Lemmon. The Coronado National Forest is currently soliciting proposals from concessionaire partners to operate and maintain Rose Canyon Campground, Whitetail Recreation Area, Spencer Canyon Campground, and Showers Point Campground. The forest is seeking a bidder who can continue to provide high-quality public service in operating and maintaining these government-owned recreation facilities.

The Forest Service will issue the successful bidder a special use permit under the Granger-Thye Act for up to 5 years, with an option to extend the term for up to an additional 5 years. Under a Granget-Thye permit, fees to the government may be offset through reinvestment in the property.

Az Forestry Cheatgrass Grant Update for August 2016

Well, we made it through another cheatgrass season. This was our second and last season for the cheatgrass grant and we have succeeded beyond expectations. We sprayed or pulled all reported cheatgrass and we made our match and then some! Thanks to everyone who helped. We had spotters, pullers, and sprayers. The Fire Department provided their truck and rounded up off duty fire fighters to spray. Dennis, as usual outdid himself with his spraying and contributing his workers time to the effort. We made our match and then some! I will have the final numbers when I complete the report to the Arizona State Forestry Division.

The cheatgrass you see now is dead. If you do see green cheatgrass, please report it since that will be something new and different that we will need to plan for next year. The tallish grass with a slightly drooping seed head (but much larger seeds) is not cheatgrass.

Even though the grant is done, we have the infrastructure and funding in place to continue for a couple more years to truly get ahead of the curve on this threat. Because we treated almost all known cheatgrass in the area, we should see a decrease in cheatgrass infestations next year. And we will again have the sprayers and chemicals available for property owners.

Have a relaxing summer knowing you did your part!



There's Math in Them There Mountains!

Summer brings grandkids, our own kids, nieces and nephews up to the mountain. This is the greatest time for kids to explore and enjoy the mountain life. Even we can be kids at heart and enjoy what the mountain has to offer! But what's that you say? There is math on these mountains? Of course!

As a mother and a mathematics teacher, I take every opportunity to teach my children about math, even on Mount Lemmon. Here are a few ideas of how to look at the natural landscape of our beloved sanctuary for the little ones:

Shape Watching on a Nature Walk

- 1. Small Pine trees are growing all over and some are the right height for young children to see the top of them. Have them look at the top, looking down, and ask them what they see. Do they see baby pine cones growing? They are called cones for a reason because cones are shapes. Also, look at the way the needles are growing, they form a spiral.
- 2. While looking at the Pines, look down below because the Ferns are growing. Did you know that they grow from unraveling from a spiral? When the leaves stretch out, they are little triangles too!
- 3. There are many tree stumps around, so take a closer look. What shape do you see? We see circles, tree rings. Together they are concentric circles, like a bull's-eye. What if you dropped a rock in the stream, would that make "tree rings" or concentric circles in the water too?

Counting on Nature to Teach us Numbers

- 1. Let us look at the Richard's Geraniums (Geranium richardsonii) and Cranesbills (Geranium caespitosum) that will be growing soon. Count the number of stamen of the flower and count the number of petals on the flower. Is one double of the other? Is one half of the other? Or are they the same?
- 2. When the Common Sunflowers (Helianthus annuus) start growing, count the number of petals they have. Do you get an odd or even number of petals? How many? What about the flowers on the Common Mullein (Verbascum Thapsus), count the number of petals on one little flower. Do you get an odd or even number of petals? How many?

These are simple things to open the mind of the child, and the child-like hearted ones we all are, to seeing the mathematics out of Nature. Even if this takes five minutes to the whole entire day, everyone went outside, explored mathematics, and learned and used new vocabulary. 
MLHOA







Fendler Globemallow

There are a number of flowers in the mallow family, and many of them are called "globe mallows" because of the spherical shape. This month's plant is Fendler Globemallow (Sphaeralcea fendleri) which grows higher in the mountain than the other globe mallows. Its color varies from a very pale to a very deep pink or even lavender whereas the other globe mallows are mostly orange.. It has a long blooming season, from May into November. It is a fairly tall plant, sometimes growing along the roadside and can be seen as low as Molino Basin and as high as Windy Point.
