Mount Lemmon Water District News

We drained the big tank on the east side of the village. This is the first draining since the fire and the condition was a nice surprise. There was minimal sediment and the floor and walls looked much better than we expected. This 283,000 gallon tank was installed in 1990. Our maintenance should allow it to remain in service for another 25 years or more. Since this tank is off line, we are supplying all of the system from our 500,000 gallon Miners Ridge tank. Some of you might notice a little boost in pressure as Miners Ridge is higher than any other tank on the system. Our gravity fed system has only one pump to get water from our 1,000,000 gallons of supply in Upper Sabino Canyon to the Miners Ridge tank. Our Sabino system can only pump 45 gallons per minute, limiting our ability to move stored water to our highest tank. We waited until after the Labor Day weekend to take this large storage tank out of service to limit any incontinences. Please call us if you have any questions at 576-1538. It was a true learning adventure for me. I am very pleased to leave you with a professional, dedicated and very credible fire department caring for you, your families, and the visitors of this remarkable community.

Together, we have come a long way over the past six years. The Fire District is now financially stable and operating in the black (although not by much). The Fire District is debt free and maintains a good credit rating. The MLFD fire station is now a safe place for the MLFD fire crews to work and has been updated to a fire station that we can all be proud of. The firefighters have a full state-of-the-art workout facility to maintain the required fitness/health levels. Two of your firefighters are certified "Peer Fitness Tainers".

With the help of the community, we have updated all of our emergency safety equipment and apparatus. We were able to implement a new computer-aided dispatch system and installed mobile data terminals in MLFD response vehicles. MLFD is now dispatched by the Tucson Fire Department. We have a professional billing service in place to allow us to recover some of our costs for services from non-residents. MLFD has updated our ISO rating from a class 5 fire department to a class 3 fire department. This is a remarkable feat when you realize that Tucson Fire Department is rated a class 2 fire department. ISO ratings go from class 1-10, with 1 being the very best. MLFD is a participating agency in AZ Statewide mutual aid. We are enjoying great working partnerships with the U.S. Forest Service as well as the Pima County Sheriff's Department.

It has been an amazing ride. Forty years in a career that I truly love. It is one of the few professions where we make a difference in this crazy world. What more can you ask for?

I have made some very close friends during my service to you. Thank you all. Please be gentle with your new Fire Chief!

Stars in the Forest, Not Just in the Sky: Geometric Stars in Planet Life by Christina Grossman



On Mount Lemmon, this is the first time I have seen a Scarlet Gilia for myself. It is so beautiful and unlike any flower that I have seen on the mountain. After having the gift of encountering this, it encouraged me to share with the rest of you and your kids that Stars do exist in our world, not just in the sky.

For the little ones, stars just may be the easiest shape to learn because they look so special. So why not begin with teaching them about things that are shaped like stars and point them out in the plant life and in food!

Up on Mount Lemmon, you have the beautiful Scarlet Gilia. From a distance, the Scarlet Gilia does look like a little trumpet. Look closely and you see a five-pointed star. The Cow Parsnips that bloom earlier in the summer look like spheres from far away, but look closer and you see little individual blossoms that are five-pointed stars too! As these bloom until October, Richardson's geraniums on the mountain are these beautiful dark lavender blossoms that are also five-pointed stars. So. go take a walk with the kids, or even for yourself and go find these beautiful stars during the days.

For other plants, it depends where you live. If you live in cooler areas, you may be able to look at the Lilies of the area and notice that their blooms are six-pointed stars. Take the Hollyhock. Look from within the bloom and you will see this beautiful green five-pointed star in the center. In the desert, look for the Aloe Vera plants and look from above to see the star.

In food, we have stars that form on the top of tomato plants (five-pointed stars), onion blossoms (six-pointed stars), and on the pomegranate fruit (six-pointed stars). If you cut an apple horizontally, you get to see a star there as well (a five-pointed star)! So get the kids in the kitchen and explore which fruits and veggies that have stars in them, or cut them into stars. Then go take a walk to locate them in flowers and plants.

Something to think about:

Learning about Geometry at such an early stage in life gives them the opportunity to see it everywhere else. Once a child, or any person of any age is able to see the Geometry, it becomes more tangible when it is time to learn more about it in the classroom. Geometry then becomes more relevant and more important for them to learn.

Have a wonderful time searching for the stars!

FireWise on Mount Lemmon, Arizona

The autumn colors are gorgeous. Seems to be getting better each year. Since the fire, the Aspens have spread like weeds and have gotten tall, the new pines, while not as prolific, are doing well and also getting quite large. It would be a shame to have to start over again after another fire.

Most of the areas of the community that did not loose their trees are being kept well FireWised, but sadly, the areas that burned have had an overgrowth of grasses and shrubs. These grasses and shrubs are now drying out and if ignited, will burn like gasoline when fanned by wind. A wind driven grass fire is frightening to see, travels fast, is very hot, and very difficult to put out. April, May, and June can be very dry and very windy. So, between now and then, try to do your best to get your property cleared of these grasses and shrubs. Use a weed eater on the grass, clippers on the shrubs, and transport material cut to the burn area near the fire station. If placed in plastic bags, empty the bags at the burn area. Don't drop off the bags. If you need help cutting or transporting, let me know (Glen Schager-520-465-6906). I can transport any time. We hope to have some Boy Scout type help in the spring to assist with the cutting if there is enough need. Let me know.

Santa Catalina Ranger District News

The Coronado National Forest (CNF) seeks public input on restructuring the Developed Recreation Program to become financially self-sufficient and sustainable. The CNF operates and maintains 204 developed recreation sites across the forest, including many on Mount Lemmon. Developed sites provide amenities such as picnic tables, restroom facilities, trash receptacles, designated parking, visitor security and interpretive signs, exhibits or kiosks.

Most land on the forest are not considered developed areas and are available for use free-of-charge. However, fees are charged at some developed sires to be used for operations and maintenance costs.

The estimated costs of maintaining the developed sites are \$3.8 million per year, which does not include additional services provided for visitors such as maintaining trails, managing remote camping areas, and fire-fighting operations. The revenue to operate and maintain the Developed Recreational Program totals approximately \$3.1 million annually. Approximately 50% of that funding comes from tax dollars allocated by Congress. The remaining 50% comes from the collection of fees.

To reduce costs, CNF has streamlined the workforce, closed sites, removed facilities, and installed lower-maintenance facilities. The actions have not sufficiently narrowed the cost-revenue gap. Despite efforts to become more efficient, the CNF Developed Recreation Program remains financially unsustainable. CNF invites input on methods to bring expenditures and revenues into balance now and into the future. Potential strategies include eliminating some developed recreation sites, transferring management of some developed recreation sites to partners or concessionaires, increasing the number of fee sites, or a combination of components, Over the next 12 months, forest personnel will engage with the public, tribes, stakeholders, and partners to identify potential strategies for closing the gag between recreation cost and revenue. AZ Forestry Cheatgrass Update for November 2016

The work on the Arizona Forestry Division Cheatgrass Grant has been completed. Thank you to everyone who contributed to this effort. Here are the numbers:

Total grant amount-\$37,231. (Reimbursable amount \$18,581-Match required \$18, 650). Total amount spent and reimbursed-\$18,536.17. The match we provided was worth-\$27,176. The match was made through community volunteer efforts, cash donations from the Patio Garden Club, and the use of a Mount Lemmon Fire District vehicle. You all put in 1,258 hours of volunteer labor over the last two seasons. That is really impressive! We used some of the funds to buy a 50 gallon skid sprayer, a trailer to transport the sprayer and ten backpack sprayers. The nest of the funds were used to buy chemicals, bags, and the services of the Department of Corrections crew to pull the cheatgrass and off-duty firefighters to spray. At the end of the grant period (2 years) we now have the equipment necessary to continue the work. The goal was to knock down the biggest patches of cheatgrass to a manageable size and to get property owners engaged in maintaining their properties. We also have chemicals left over from the last season and the \$7,000 seed money from Trees for Mount Lemmon.

Again, I would like to thank everyone who helped and a special shout out to Dennis Cozzetti, who volunteered over 20 hours of his own time and 120 hours of his employee's time. THANK YOU DENNIS!!! Thanks to Pam Haskell and the Patio Garden Club for donating \$750 for the trailer and backpack sprayers. And the Mount Lemmon Fire Department has also been exceedingly helpful in organizing the off-duty fire-fighters and volunteering the use of one of their vehicles. Thank you Randy Ogden, Joe Gunia, and Peter Norton! The Loma Sabino Pines Homeowners Association, with the help of Linda Currin, who served as fiduciary agent for the grant and continues to serve as the accountant for the cheatgrass funds. Thank you Linda!

So next season we will again be keeping you informed of the appearance of cheatgrass and what you can do about it. Make sure you are on the listsery to get updates and information on cheatgrass plus all other important mountain information. (The sign-up form is on the home page of http://www.mtlemmonhoa.org)


We Say Good-Bye to Gary Slocum

Mount Lemmon Marigold- (Tagetes Lemmonii)

The Mount Lemmon Marigold (Tagetes Lemmonii) was named for John Gill Lemmon and his wife Sara Plummer Lemmon, botanists, who first identified, catalogued and pressed native plants on the mountain. The Lemmons honeymooned in the Santa Catalina Mountains and eventually scaled the tallest peak, at 9159 feet, which was named in her honor. She was the first documented Anglo woman on the mountain.

The Mount Lemmon Marigold typically blooms from August to November but sometimes blooms in the spring as well. The habitat is in the canyons, slopes, and along stream beds in riparian shrub, oak woodland, oak pine woodland, and pine forest. The flower is about 1-2 inches across and the plant can grow to be about 2-3 feet in diameter or larger. The plant gives off a pleasant and distinctive fragrance (although some don't like it) that comes from essential oils in the leaves, which are used medicinally. Tagetes Lemmonii is native to Southern Arizona and is also called the tangerine scented marigold as the leaves of the plant have a strong scent of mint and lemon. Some steep the leaves for a medicinal tea. It grows between 4,000 ft and 8,000 ft and was discovered in the late 1800's by the Lemmons. It is also know as Lemon Marigold and Copper Canyon Daisy. It is drought tolerant and does best in full sun. White tail deer don't eat Mountain Marigold but the bees and butterflies love the flower's nectar. This marigold is the main daisy-like plant along Catalina Highway in the fall. It is a deciduous perennial herb, subshrub, and shrub.

Shown in this article are photos of the Mount Lemmon Marigold in full bloom at Tom and Patsy Riley's cabin. At Robin Kirk's cabin it has many buds but is not blooming yet. We got our plants at Civano Nursery which carries native Mount Lemmon plants.

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
