Emergency Cooperation Key to Success of Bigelow Prescribed Fire

On November 14, 2016 the Santa Catalina Ranger District of the Coronado National Forest conducted a 200 acre prescribed burn on Mount Bigelow. Treating the landscape with prescribed fires is essential to maintaining healthy Sky Island ecosystems. Benefits of this prescribed burn include encouraging the reestablishment of native Ponderosa Pine, reducing brush and vegetation on the forest floor and improving wildlife habitat.

Treatments like this one also play an important role in reducing the buildup of vegetation to more natural levels, which helps reduce the risk from unplanned wildfires. Should a wildfire occur in this area, giving fire-fighters a greater chance of limiting its spread and increasing safety for both firefighters and the public. This prescribed burn will also help protect infrastructure in the area including the Palisades Visitor Center, Mount Bigelow Communications site, University of Arizona Steward Observatory Catalina Station, organization camps, and the nearby communities of Summerhaven and Willow Canyon Summerhomes.

Resources from Mount Lemmon Fire Department, Golder Ranch Fire Department, Arizona Department of Forestry and Fire Management, Pima County Sheriff's Department, Saguaro National Park, and the Coronado National Forest worked cooperatively to safely facilitate the prescribed fire.

"I'd like to thank our cooperators for their support," said Fire Management Officer John Thornburg. "The partnerships and relationships that we build today are a key step in reducing the risk and exposure of the public and fire responders in the future." he added.

Carbon Monoxide, The Silent Killer

Carbon Monoxide, or CO poisoning is the most common type of fatal indoor air poisoning in countries where cooking and heating is still dominated by fires. More than 500 Americans die each year from unintentional carbon monoxide poisoning.

Symptoms of mildly acute CO poisoning include lightheadedness, nausea, headaches, fatigue and flu-like symptoms. Acute CO poisoning leads to sleep and the failure of the central nervous system and heart-leading eventually to death during sleep. If we detect ANY CO indoors, we consider it an immediate action.

CO bonds to hemoglobin (Hb), and instead of carrying oxygen (O2) the hemoglobin is then occupied with CO-creating carboxyhemoglobin (HbCO). CO poisoning is actually the result of the head and heart not receiving sufficient oxygen...or asphyxiation.

CO is colorless, tasteless, and odorless. Because it cannot be noticed without a detector or meter, CO has earned the dubious name of the "silent killer". CO is slightly lighter than air. However, studies have shown no significant difference in measurements based on what height CO detectors are mounted. Different manufacturers recommend different locations, and you should always follow the manufacturers' recommendation.

The National Fire Protection Association says CO detectors "shall be centrally located outside of each separate sleeping area in the immediate vicinity of the bedrooms." Additionally, each CO detector "shall be located on the wall, ceiling or other location as specified in the installation instructions…"

Gas sensors in CO alarms have a limited lifespan, generally less than 6 years. The test button on the common CO alarm only tests the battery, not the CO gas sensor. It is recommended that CO gas sensors be periodically tested and calibrated by exposing them to a known amount of CO. Because CO alarms have come down so much in price, it's generally cheaper to replace the alarms than have them calibrated.



Concentricity: Triangles, Circles, and Even More Shapes in Our Food, Life, and in Nature by Christina Grossman



Concentricity is something that others would say is too early to teach little ones about. I strongly disagree. Basically, Concentricity happens when there is a common center shared among other circles or spheres. What I have found are some other examples that go outside of the rule of circles.

When Concentricity happens out in nature, it is so easy to just point that moment out to our children, regardless of age. With my kids, we have found examples with triangles and ovals as well. This happens outside our home, inside our home, and in our food.

Concentric Circles:

Tree rings are about the most common examples that all of us can identify with as they are concentric circles. The sliced candy-striped beets, when sliced, are beautiful concentric circles and are delicious to eat!

Concentric Triangles:

The Pine tree photo that you see above is a wonderful example of concentric triangles. This is located by the Ranger's Cabin at Palisades. So go out to the forest and see what the trees can teach you! Let us not forget the strawberries are also concentric triangles when you slice them from the bottom to the top!

Concentric Ovals and More:

Kiwi is just as delicious and a great tool to show Concentricity. Sliced Agate can be debated on whether this shape is an oval, or an ellipse, or a five-sided figure. Either way, I see the Concentricity here too.

Something to Think About:

How about squares? When do concentric squares happen? How about other shapes? Where do you see them? Think about it and start exploring! That is the beauty about Mathematics, as it is out there and there are so many opportunities for more than one answer because that is just how it is. Just because a definition of Concentricity only includes circles, or spheres, does not mean that there is no likelihood of an exception for that definition. When we are able to discover and see the exceptions when they happen, that is where the heart and beauty of Mathematics exists. These interesting surprises are the most important to point out to the children! And to YOU! Learning about Geometry, especially Concentricity, at such an early stage in life gives them the opportunity to see it everywhere. Once a child, or any person of any age, is able to see the Geometry, it becomes more tangible when it is time to learn more in the classroom. It then becomes more relevant and more important to them to learn because Mathematics is even more interesting than rules and procedures. It is about exploring and experiencing what happens outside your door.

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

Just Call 911

Becoming friends with our local firemen, EMT's, and law enforcement officers is bound to happen when we see them so often. It has become second nature to just call them directly instead of using the 911 services. It is very important to their budgets that we utilize the 911 dispatch and not call directly to the firehouse or our sheriff's cell phones. If we don't go through the proper channels, the agency doesn't get credit for the service they have performed. We ask that if you need medical attention, CALL 911. If you are in need of law enforcement, CALL 911. If you see a fire, CALL 911. It will benefit us all in the long run!

MLHOA

The Mount Lemmon Homeowner's Association (MLHOA) was formed in 1969 to protect the welfare of the Mount Lemmon community and to be involved in all aspects of its improvement. The concerns of the organization are not limited to private property owners. Full membership with voting rights is accorded to private owners and leased land holders upon payment of yearly dues. Being organized, having a legal fund and having active **LOCAL** voice participation enables the Association to accomplish most of its goals. Pima County has said the MLHOA is the strongest and most respected homeowner's organization in the entire county. Dues are \$35 per year payable in February. Renters and Friends of the Mountain may obtain membership for \$35 a year. The Annual Dinner and Meeting is held each year on the first Tuesday after taxes. To join the Mount Lemmon Homeowner's Association, send a check to Box 699, Mount Lemmon, AZ 85619.

The most visible product of the MLHOA is the **ECHOES**, a newsletter published ten times a year. The Association organizes social events such as potlucks, pancake breakfasts, ice cream socials and raffles, enabling owners to mingle. 
Early Blooms


As I write, it is the first week in January and already the Manzanita shrubs have flower buds. There are two main Manzanitas in the Catalina mountains, (and a third that is less often seen). If you go to Gordon Hirabayashi or Molino Basin, you will soon find flowers on the Pointleaf Manzanita. The botanical name is: Arctostaphylos pungens. (Greek arkto meaning bear, staphule meaning a bunch of grapes and pungens, meaning spiny or with sharp points, referring to the fact that many of the leaves end in a point.) A little higher up the mountain and later in the Spring, you might see the other species blooming, (Arctostaphylos pringlei-named after Cyrus Pringle, 1838-1911). Its leaves are rounded. I took these pictures on January 3, 2017 showing some branches with flower buds, and buds close up.

Both have flowers shaped like little bottles, which can be white, pale, or deep pink. The fruits are edible.

Closely related is the Madrone (Arbutus arizonica). This tree grows higher in the mountains and also has little bottle-like flowers which are mostly white.
