Low or Weak Faucet Flow

Have you cleaned your faucet Aerator? If you haven't or don't know what an aerator is, don't worry, I'm here to help you. My name is Reuben Herrera and I work for the Mount Lemmon Water District. Most of you already know me, but to those who don't, I say "Hello".

Let's start with what an aerator is and why they are installed in faucets. Aerators are designed to catch debris, to save water and to keep water from splashing all over you. Aerators are built with a screen to catch all the debris and as water flows, it mixes with air to make a nice even flow when you turn your faucet on. Over time, the screen will get clogged with debris and mineral deposits. With that obstruction, your water faucet can't flow right and it's time to maintain your aerator or replace it. So, let's get started.

- Step 1: Locate your Aerator or Aerators, yes you will have more than one. The aerator is a device attached to the tip of your faucet. If you can't find your aerator it could be hidden and you need to locate you faucet owner's manual or find it online.
- Step 2: Grab yourself some pliers and masking tape. Masking tape will prevent scratches and damage to the housing of the aerator. Wrap the masking tape around the jaws or the grooves of joint pliers or around the housing of the aerator.
- Step 3: Tip! Put a rag over the drain so you don't lose any small pieces. Grip the outside of the aerator with the pliers and turn the aerator clockwise to loosen it. Remember to be gentle. Too much pressure can damage the aerator housing.
- Step 4: Disassemble the aerator and push the internal parts out. There will be a washer, aerator (also known as the screen) and the aerator housing.
- Step 5: Time to clean, if you can't remove the internal parts, place the whole thing in a bowl with white vinegar. Soak for 30 mins. Then try to disassemble.
- Step 6: Once soaked, remove your aerator, disassemble and scrub gently with a toothbrush or any small brush that you may have. This is also a good time to evaluate the screen to check if you need to replace it. Look for damages, a bent screen, or if it's just not cleanable, replace it.
- Step 7: Once you are done with cleaning or replacing your aerator, let's reassemble it in the same way as the disassemble. Screw counter clockwise by hand, no reason to over tighten, snug is good enough.

Now that you have a clean or new aerator, see how your flow is. It should be a lot better if that was your problem. If not, you may have other issues and you should contact your plumber. But first, contact us so we can have a look-see on the water supply side. There may be issues with the Water District side.

The Soldier's Camp Monthly Bugle!

The Soldier's Camp Recreational Residence area has had a great winter, with a very impressive (relative) snowpack for the winter of 2017. Several heavy (approx. 6 to 12") accumulations of snow, regularly spaced approximately a month apart each seems to hold good news for the Soldier's Camp water system and for the summer/fall flora and fauna.

Sabino Creek, running through our valley at Bear Wallow is really flowing, as of March 1st; the stream flow is covering the entire Bear Wallow valley floor above the Mount Lemmon highway. Water flow over the Soldier's Pond dam is impressive. While we expect the flow to decrease significantly as the snow melts, current conditions will saturate the valley bottom, which is the source of the GSCA Summer water supply.

This year's winter storms were not without their price. Significant numbers of relatively large trees came down. The majority fell without incident, but some did have effects on the community. The worst were the trees that came down across the Mount Lemmon highway immediately west of the Sunset Trailhead, and a very large tree that came down across the road/power line on Lower Soldier's Camp Road 8B. The latter incident damaged both power and phone lines. Trico repaired the issue nearly immediately, but as of 2 weeks after the incident-the phone lines to the affected cabins remain unrepaired.

High winds in the area have the natural result of bringing down all of the weak limbs from our tall pines. As you return to the area, you will note a significant amount of downed limbs, ranging in size from the small to significant. We would like to recommend that this "dead to down" material be either hauled to the Mount Lemmon Fire Station burn pad (Oracle Control Road, just below the fire station) or neatly piled in your area with other deadwood. Our goal is to get the Forest Service to perform another controlled burn (weather conditions permitting) of the remaining unburned piles in the area. Contributing to the efficiency of the effort, by consolidating the piles, is greatly appreciated by the organization, and supports our effort for a "FireWise" Community.

Speaking of FireWise—There is an opening in our Soldier's Camp organization for a representative in support of the overall Mount Lemmon FireWise Activities. If you are interested, please contact one of the GSCA board members, and we will connect you with the FireWise organization.

Have a great winter and we look forward to seeing you up on the mountain in the Spring! Remember to plan to attend the Mount Lemmon 4th of July Parade! Start thinking about your floats early!

7 Ways Residents Can Reduce the Risk that their Homes & Property Will Become Fuel for a Wildfire

#1

Clear

Clear off pine needles, dead leaves & anything that can burn from your rooflines, gutters, decks, porches, patios & along fence lines. Falling embers will have nothing to burn.

#3

Screen & Seal

Wind-borne embers can get into homes easily through vents & other openings and burn the home from the inside out. Walk around your house to see what openings you can screen or temporarily seal up.

#5

Trim

Trim back any shrubs or tree branches that come closer than 5 feet to the house and attachments, and any overhanging branches.

#7

Cinse

If ordered to evacuate, make sure all windows & doors are closed tightly, and seal up any pet doors. Many homes are destroyed by embers entering these openings and burning the house from the inside out.

#2

Store Away

Store away furniture cushions, rattan mats, potted plants & other decorations from decks, porches & patios. These items catch embers and help ignite your home if you leave them outside.

#4

Rake

Embers landing in mulch that touches your house, deck or fence is a big fire hazard. Rake out any landscaping mulch to at least five feet away.

#6

Remove

Walk around your house and remove anything within 30 feet that could burn, such as woodpiles, spare lumber, vehicles and boats – anything that can act as a large fuel source.

Preparing for the Winged Visitors Coming Back from the Winter Pouring, Measuring, Classifying, and Counting

The weather is getting warmer and the birds are coming back from homes during the Winter time and they are hungry! So why not prepare something for them and turn it into a mathematics lesson?

You can either make your own bird feeder and bird seed mix or purchase them from the store. Get some measuring cups, a ruler/measuring tape, and go outside to have some fun!

First, take a look at the bird seed mix. What shapes do you see? Do you see some circles and ovals? Do you see some triangles, spheres, or curvilinear triangles? What colors do you see? How many different types of seeds do you see? Could you sort them out if I gave you a cup of that bird seed? How would you sort them?

Next, have your child look at the measuring cup and estimate how many cups of bird seed it will take to fill up the feeder. Remember what your estimate is and now begin to count how many cups of birdseed it takes to fill up the feeder.

Then, how many inches, or rulers tall, or building bricks tall, or hands tall is the bird feeder? Where are we putting the feeder and how long of a string do we need to hang it?

Once you have your feeder up, let the fun begin by observing what birds come to use it. It might take a day, or two before the birds come, but it will be a great experience to see how many birds a day visit the feeder. What colors do the birds have? How big are the birds? How many different birds come visit the feeder?

This whole lesson may take 5 to 15 minutes from start to finish and it's worth it. Something very simple and so many mathematical ideas to explore! Have fun with this and your child(ren)!

Something to think about:

This activity can be adapted for any age of child and learning stage for the child. You know your child (ren) better than I do. You may want to not ask so many questions, maybe use three. If you have older children, they can make charts to categorize and keep track of the kinds of birds they see. You can also name the types of seeds and birds as well.

Whether or not the weather is right at the moment, the birds will still be hungry and you are inviting the birds to come visit you! The kids and you can even practice different bird calls and whistles by listening to them as well! Get yourself and your child(ren) outside and explore the Mathematics around you and have fun!



The Mount Lemmon Homeowner's Association (MLHOA) was formed in 1969 to protect the welfare of the Mount Lemmon community and to be involved in all aspects of its improvement. The concerns of the organization are not limited to private property owners. Full membership with voting rights is accorded to private owners and leased land holders upon payment of yearly dues. When a fire call goes out for your average size home in Tucson, the initial response includes: a Battalion Chief, EMS Captain, 3 Fire Engines, 1 Ladder Truck and an ambulance equaling 20 personnel. Some of the jobs these individuals are tasked with include; pulling a hose to extinguish fire, managing the engine pump, cutting off utilities to the home, performing ventilation maneuvers, searching for injured persons and pets, managing outside exposures, connecting to water source and so on.

On Mount Lemmon, the initial response includes 2 people on an Engine. Add to that the possibility of snow, steep terrain covered with rocks and trees and the probability that a structure is heavily involved with fire by the time it is observed by another individual, and you have an extremely difficult job at hand. Lucky for us we have some of the best help that money can't buy, the residents and volunteers of Mount Lemmon.

This past winter we found ourselves faced with all of those challenges when a house caught fire on a steep, unmaintained road shortly after a major storm dumped several feet of snow on our little village.
