Fire! And How To Learn About It!

The US Forest Service deployed and manages the InciWeb notification system. InciWeb is an interagency all-risk incident web information management system provided by the United States Forest Service released in 2004. InciWeb was originally developed for wildland fire emergencies, but it can be also used for other emergency incidents (natural disasters, such as earthquakes, floods, hurricanes, and tornadoes).

InciWeb was developed with two primary missions:

- 1. Provide the public a single source of incident related information
- 2. Provide a standardized reporting tool for the Public Affairs community

Official announcements published on InciWeb can include evacuations, road closures, news releases, maps, photographs, and basic info and current situation about the incident.

The InciWeb System can be used by typing the following URL into your Web Browser: https://inciweb.nwcg.gov/

Once the page loads, use the filters in the upper right corner of the page to narrow down your search, to a specific fire report (e.g. "Molino Fire") or a state (e.g. Arizona).

Recent Fires on Mount Lemmon:

We have had two fires on Mount Lemmon recently. One is the Molino Fire, which started on 4 April near Mile Marker 4.5. This fire burned about 75 Acres, and had the Mount Lemmon highway closed for a few days. Newspaper reports indicate authorities believe this fire is human caused. Look for a big grizzled-looking guy in a Fore Exploder!

The second, the Pima Shovel Fire is approximately 17 acres, and started on 8 April. This fire was burning relatively high up on the mountain, and was about 1 mile west of the Mount Lemmon peak.

When Temperatures Rise, It is Time to Make Sugar Water for the Hummingbirds: Measuring with the Help of Little Hands!

This is not a new concept, but it is new for my child and that is what counts! We love seeing our Hummingbird friends and they do remind us that the sugar-water is getting low. For this activity, it usually takes just a smidge of time with your child and it is just right for the little hands to measure.

Materials:

- 1. A pot to hold at least 4 cups of water
- 2. Distilled or Spring water
- 3. 1 cup of raw sugar
- 4. A measuring cup, be it a 1/2 cup, whole cup, or 1/3 cup
- 5. Hummingbird feeder

With those little hands, count out 1 cup of sugar and pour into the pot. If you are using a 1 cup measuring cup, then counting is easy. If you are using a 1/2 cup, then you are counting to two. If you are using a 1/3 cup, then you are counting to three. This would b a great time to show your child how two 1/2 cups of sugar equal into 1 cup and how three 1/3 cups of sugar equal 1 cup too! Now count out 4 cups of water and pour it into the pot as well. If you are using a 1 cup measuring cup, then count to 4. Using a 1/2 cup will have you counting to 8 and using the 1/3 cup will have them counting to 12. Then get a spoon to stir it up before putting it on the stove.

This is also a great time to tell your kids about the rules of the house with a stove. To make sure my little one can still pour and scoop, the pot is first placed on the table and then transferred over to the stove. Turn on the stove and let the mixture boil. Once it's boiling, turn it off right away and let it cool. For us, we make this in the mid-morning and it cools completely after lunch to be able to pour into the hummingbird feeder. Now you can enjoy the hummingbird friends coming over to your yard and take notice of the sounds they make when they call each other, flight over the feeder, or the different color and sizes of the hummingbirds. Do not be surprised to see a Woodpecker enjoying the sugar-water as well. It is really fascinating to see them hang on to it to drink the water. If you encounter a lot of Bees drinking the sugar-water and this is a problem for you, the wait until it gets dark to remove the feeder, as bees always go back to the hive at night.

The most important thought to keep with you after reading this, is that you had a great time with your child that included mathematics and nature! Enjoy!

FireWise Info From Your Mount Lemmon FireWise Coordinators

Two Fires on the mountain within 1 week! Take actions listed below now, not some nebulous time in the future. Our anemometer showed a couple of gusts of over 50 MPH on Saturday, April 8th, 2017, the day the fire started. Think of how fast a fire can spread in that kind of wind. Also, a new study shows that 84% of wildfires are started by humans. Be really careful with fire on this mountain.

Action steps for around your home:

*CLEAR leaves and other vegetative debris from roofs, gutters, porches, and under decks. This helps prevent embers from igniting your home.

*REMOVE dead vegetation and other items from under your deck or porch, and within 10 feet of the house.

*SCREEN in areas below patios and decks with wire mesh to prevent debris and combustible materials from accumulating.

*REMOVE flammable materials (wood piles, propane tanks) within 30 feet of your home's foundation and outbuildings, including garages and sheds. If it can catch fire, don't let it touch your house, deck or porch.

*Wildfire can spread to the tree tops. PRUNE trees so the lowest branches are 6 to 10 feet from the ground.

*KEEP your lawn hydrated and maintained. If it is brown, cut it down to reduce fire intensity. *Dry grass and shrubs are fuel for wildfire.*

*Don't let debris and lawn cuttings linger. DISPOSE of these items quickly to reduce fuel for fire.

*INSPECT shingles or roof tiles. Replace or repair the shingles that are loose or missing to prevent ember penetration.

*COVER exterior attic vents with metal mesh no larger than 1/8 inch to prevent sparks from entering the home.

*ENCLOSE eaves and screens soffit vents using 1/8 inch mesh metal screening to prevent ember entry.

AND DON'T FORGET...

The more actions a community takes, the more fire adapted it becomes. Firewising your property benefits your downwind neighbor, not firewising your property puts your downwind neighbors at risk.



Just Call 911

Becoming friends with our local firemen, EMT's, and law enforcement officers is bound to happen when we see them so often. It has become second nature to just call them directly instead of using the 911 services. It is very important to their budgets that we utilize the 911 dispatch and not call directly to the firehouse or our sheriff's cell phones. If we don't go through the proper channels, the agency doesn't get credit for the service they have performed. We ask that if you need medical attention, CALL 911. If you are in need of law enforcement, CALL 911. If you see a fire, CALL 911. It will benefit us all in the long run!

Meadow Rue by Frank Rose

Meadow Rue grows at high elevations (above 6,000 feet) and comes in separate male and female plants. The male flowers are not difficult to see with their tassels hanging down like wind chimes. One picture shows a number of male flowers on a branch. The other gives a close-up of one of them. It takes a bit more study to notice the female plants with their much smaller flowers. The picture shows the female flower with white parts to receive the pollen.

Meadow Rue is a fairly common plant in the mountains and can grow over six feet tall. It has a long blooming season, from Spring to Fall.

If you look at the leaves and compare them to the leaves of the Columbine, you can see that the two plants are closely related, though the Columbine has one of the showiest flowers on the mountain, and the Meadow Rue one of the least.
