An Attitude of Gratitude




Quilt Raffle to Benefit the MLWD

HOWEVER YOU SLICE IT, THERE IS ALWAYS SOMETHING MATHEMATICAL TO LEARN FROM WATERMELON: SHAPES AND APPLICATION





There is not enough to be said about the Watermelon. When we think of summer, the Watermelon is the iconic fruit of sunshine and a carrier of water that so many of us treasure! If you just take a moment to look at the Watermelon that you eat, it tells you a story through shapes.

Take a look at the picture above and look at the naval. That navel is the center of a beautiful multi-pointed star that tells the story of how it began. This watermelon started out as a flower, as most fruits do. So as not to forget where the Watermelon came from, there is this beautiful light green and white star on it. Also take a look at the "vein-like" features of the skin and compare this to the leaves of the plant from which it came from.

At this time, I am explaining this to my little one and telling her about the star and that this is an imprint of the flower that the Watermelon came from. Her response was, "So this came from a flower? So, I eat flowers?" Yes!

(Note: This might be a good time for you to look up the blossoms of a watermelon plant right now and compare it with the picture above of the watermelon)

Take a look at the seeds of the watermelon. The shapes of the seeds are oval, but they also look like water droplets and remind us of how much this wonderful fruit needs so much water to grow and retains it too!


Application:

FireWise News

The slash pile at the Mount Lemmon Fire Department has been burned, so we can once again have a convenient place to take our Firewise debris. Thanks to Phil Mack and the Mount Lemmon General Store for using the Nextdoor app to involve the community in the slash burning event. He created a contest with questions and photos about what we should **NOT** be including in the slash pile. The correct answers were: **plastic bags, loose pine needles, construction material and "rounds" (large logs, versus trimmed branches)**. The winners won a pound of the General Store's incredibly awesome fudge! Paper bags for pine needles are available at the Mount Lem-

mon General Store, Ace Hardware at Bear Canyon, or your local hardware store.

Even with the recent rainfall, please continue to clean around your property, creating a defensible space, as it was discovered during the recent Burro Fire that there were very few cabins or properties that were truly FireWise. It is important to "ember proof" at least 5 feet around the perimeter of all structures. If it can catch fire, don't let it touch your home deck or porch.

We are working with the Forest Service on the FireScape plan for the Marshall Gulch thinning and prescribed burn. More info (hopefully good news!) next month.

Gray's Lima Bean

This plant has beautiful flowers that stick up from the foliage. The whole plant can spread out and cover quite a large area. The leaves have a distinctive shape with three squarish lobes. The flowers can be a pale pink to a deep wine red. If you look closely you will see a twisted nose-like structure in the middle of the flower. There are at least four of these bean species in the Catalina mountains. Two are high on the mountain. Gray's Lima Bean (Phaeolus grayanus) is the most common. The other smaller, but not as abundant ad harder to spot, Pinos Altos Mountain Bean (Phaeolus parulus).

Two other species in this genius are found lower on the mountain in Molino Basin and Gordon Hirabayashi. Tepary Beab (Phaseolus acutifolius) and Spotted Wild Bean (Phaseolus maculatus). The flowers of all four are similar, but the leaves are different. Though it is called a "Lima Bean" the fruits are not normally eaten by people.






Getting Everybody Back Home Again

MLHOA

The Mount Lemmon Homeowner's Association (MLHOA) was formed in 1969 to protect the welfare of the Mount Lemmon community and to be involved in all aspects of its improvement. The concerns of the organization are not limited to private property owners. Full membership with voting rights is accorded to private owners and leased land holders upon payment of yearly dues. Being organized, having a legal fund and having active LOCAL voice participation enables the Association to accomplish most of its goals. Pima County has said the MLHOA is the strongest and most respected homeowner's organization in the entire county. Dues are \$35 per year payable in February. Renters and Friends of the Mountain may obtain membership for \$35 a year. The Annual Dinner and Meeting is held each year on the first Tuesday after taxes. To join the Mount Lemmon Homeowner's Association, send a check to Box 699, Mount Lemmon, AZ 85619.

The most visible product of the MLHOA is the ECHOES, a newsletter published ten times a year. The Association organizes social events such as potlucks, pancake breakfasts, ice cream socials and raffles, enabling owners to mingle.
