
Mount Lemmon Homeowners

Symmetry, the Bilateral Kind: Looking into Nature to Find the Balance by Christina Grossman



As we approach Autumn, things will be slowing down for us on the mountain and in the desert. This is a very important time to still be able to go outside into Nature and find the balance. Take pictures, enjoy the time outside and when it starts to cool down, notice what the plants are showing you in terms of symmetry, especially the bilateral kind.

Yes, there are different types of symmetry, but what we are all familiar with is the type that we know when we can "cut" something in half, or see the same image reflected on the other side, or even think of it as a mirror image. However young or young-at-heart we are, this is something that we can all enjoy learning about!

Go for a walk soon and figure out what is symmetrical. This would be also a great time to put together a math nature journal too! Take this mushroom above, where would you place the mirror to reflect the same image? The place that you have the mirror is called the line of symmetry. How many lines of symmetry could this mushroom have? One? Two? More? Go with those questions when you go for a walk outside. Don't have a mirror? Take a pencil or straight stick with you. Place the stick where you would a mirror and eyeball it. Where's the line of symmetry?

If you are not able to go outside right now and explore, print out the pictures from the website, or place them up on the screen. Get out a mirror and see where the mirror can be placed so that the same image can be seen. Play with it! In some cases, it might not be exactly symmetrical, but close enough.

Something to think about:

Have a conversation with your child, or with someone else about what it means in Nature to be symmetric. What does a symmetric plant tell the pollinators: the bees, the hummingbirds and the butterflies? Is it still alright for something to not be symmetrical? Yes! There are many beautiful examples of what is not symmetrical, or what we call symmetrical. Everything in the Mathematical world has a place and importance, so asymmetrical is also wonderful and tells us a great many stories too! Hmmm, I think I see a future post here!

Learning about Mathematics is not about getting to the finish line first, it is actually getting there and having an understanding and an appreciation for it. The more we can connect with how our world is tied to Mathematics, the more we can see the patterns unfolding and even the importance of balance. Also remember that a good rule when we go out to explore is that the only thing we take are pictures, drawings, notes and memories. It is best to leave the plant in the natural habitat.

Improved Cell Phone Service is Coming, Hopefully!

In March of this year, it came to my attention that Summerhaven would suffer reduced cell phone service by May 1st, when we lost T-Mobile, Sprint and most of Verizon. Since then, AT&T and T-Mobile have restored their systems, but Verizon and Sprint coverages have remained very poor. I was asked to intervene on behalf of Commnet Wireless and later became directly involved with the Verizon issue. During the last 2+ years Verizon has been unable to secure a site lease on Radio Ridge. Because we desperately need coverage for community safety reasons, I approached Verizon to see if there was some other site for a cell tower for our community, especially on USFS land, which unfortunately was not going to happen.

A resolution to this issue is one of Verizon's highest priorities in Arizona. Currently, Verizon is negotiating for a site on private land in the Summerhaven area, but as of this writing, nothing has been signed. The currently proposed site is in the LSHOA Water district area which has two water tanks and communications systems. The LSHOA Board has approved the continuation of getting more detail for the proposal so that the board can determine whether this proposal makes sense for LSHOA, the Summerhaven community, and the Fire Station. If the proposal goes further, there would be a Pima County Zoning approval process which would include a public participation process. Verizon is proposing a "Stealth" site, which means the tower will look like a 70+ foot Ponderosa pine tree amongst other 70+ ft. Ponderosa pines. The perimeter fencing will be comparable to a nearby cabin's railing, and the site will blend in with the surrounding area. The site is planned to potentially add another carrier. Verizon must eventually seek Pima County approval for a conditional use permit.

The Mount Lemmon Fire District (MLFD) desperately needs Verizon for safety reasons because their vehicles have Verizon data terminals for the transmission of medical information to Tucson hospitals. In addition, MLFD uses Verizon to contact volunteers for fire-fighting, traffic control, medical issues, etc. Also, MLFD has no cell coverage inside the station. According to the Federal Communications Commission (FCC), 70 percent of 911 calls are made by cell phones. Statistics also show that the cell phone is becoming the default home phone because land line service has steadily declined. The USFS reminds hikers to have plenty of water and a charged cell phone before they hit the trails. Cell sites are needed for communicating emergencies and for modern conveniences.

Health concerns are among the issues discussed when living near a cell tower. These concerns are somewhat refuted in the following studies: American Cancer Society and Federal Communications Commission (FCC) study.

Hopefully we may soon have a solution to this difficult and ongoing problem. At some point our community will need individuals to vocally support this proposal. Please become educated and consider the importance of this issue. More information will be provided in the near future.

Forest and Campground News

During the monthly Mount Lemmon Homeowners Association meeting on September 16, 2017, Christopher Griggs, USFS, caught us up on the status on many topics concerning plans for Marshall Gulch and other important issues to residents and cabin owners.

Beginning on November 1, 2017, winter fuel permits will begin to be sold for gathering wood on Forestry land that will be staged by the Forest Service. This wood will be cut into rounds but not split and is to be used only for heating homes on Mount Lemmon. Christopher said he is busy getting locations approved that have downed trees that can be used for winter fuel. Once Christopher gets approval for the areas, his teams will get stacks of rounds set up for those with permits to remove. This procedure will also help FireWise these areas as we will be removing much of the low lying wood that could possibly fuel a wildfire, thus making our surrounding forest areas safer and FireWised.

The upper campgrounds (Spencer, Rose Lake, White Tail) are scheduled to close near or around October 1, 2017 and campers will be directed to the lower campgrounds for the winter season. Molino Basin will remain open through the winter months and General Hitchcock will be open as long as the weather permits.

So, if you're interested in buying a wood permit this year, remember they can be purchased starting November 1st. The money made from these permits add revenue to the Forestry budget that helps get future projects funded as well as providing affordable winter fuel for residents and guests on the mountain during the colder season.



Arizona Tickclover, Arizona Ticktrefoil, Desmodium Arizonicum A Member of The Bean Family



There are at least 8 different species of Tickclover (desmodium) in the Catalina Mountains, but only one that is found above 8,000' and that is the Arizona Tickclover (Desmodium Arizonicum). It is a fairly tall plant, up to about three feet high, with beautiful rose-colored flowers. Note the white butterfly on the top left side of the plant. The rounded seeds are connected in sequence and stick to your clothing (I like to say they "Tick to your cloves"). It blooms from July into September and may be found in Marshall gulch, Box Camp trail, Oracle Ridge and other places.

There are other tick clovers lower down the mountain, at Windy Point, in Gordon Hirabayashi and Molino Basin. One way of telling the different Tickclovers apart is the shape of the leaves. The smallest, Desmodium roseii, has tiny flowers.
