### Soldier Camp-Experience in the Aspen Fire (June-July, 2003)

Soldiers Camp and the majority of the Summerhaven area had a near miss in the 2002 Bullock Fire. In June/July of 2003, Soldiers Camp was not so lucky.

The Aspen Fire, an 85,000 acre blaze, hit the Fern Ridge area of Mount Lemmon hard. Eleven of the 63 cabins in the Soldiers Camp area were destroyed. These were cabins that had been in families for many years prior to the event. The majority of the cabins were rebuilt, but only a significant lobbying effort immediately after the event persuaded the Forest Service to allow the rebuilding.

In Soldiers Camp, the fire took more than just the cabins—it devastated the tall pines that were the hallmark of the cabin experience. Gail Paulin learned the truth all too well. She had seen pictures of her burned cabin on Fern Ridge-but the reality was stunning. Gail had retired from teaching in 2003. She had planned to spend time on the mountain. "I had a cabin in the forest," says Gail. "Now I have a cabin in a meadow."

In the Aspen Fire of 2003, Fern Ridge was transformed, even to this day. A drive into the area will reveal a completely new ecosystem still adapting to the fire's effects. In Soldiers Camp, and other recreational residence tracts, another fire could be even more devastating. Forest Service regulations continue to tighten, and obtaining permission to rebuild is certainly not guaranteed.

Prevention and Preparedness is key to the managing of the ever-present risk of fire through our community. Implementation of FireWise principles throughout our community gives us our best chance to weather the next storm.

One will be contacting you soon with information and ideas to assist you in your FireWise efforts. Watch Nextdoor and listserv for a list of names.

Although many of you responded to the call to sign up for Nextdoor, MLHOA and listserv last month, do so **NOW** if you haven't! These are means of communicating critical information to you. March was the time to contact the Mount Lemmon Fire Department at 576-1201 X5 to arrange for your free FireWise Home Assessment, but, again **it's not too late**. Give them a call **today**.

**APRIL-VOLUNTEER**— Respond to your Neighborhood FireWise Captain and work together to protect and FireWise your property. Reduce fuel loads and remove flammables from around your cabin and lot. YES, even if your property is vacant, excess fuels will contribute to the spread of wildfire and put others at risk.

MAY— Do spend a day or weekend FireWising. Following is a list of providers who have indicated they are available to help with FireWise efforts if you are unable to do so yourself. If you are aware of other suppliers, please let us know so that we can share the information. Again, you don't need to open your cabin for the season if you're not ready, just spend a day or weekend FireWising your area. NOTE; Please call the supplier for quotes, etc. You might also consider having a "Hold Harmless Agreement" in place for the work to be performed.

### FireWise for Fire Potential...Not Just Fire Season

On March 7th, the Mount Lemmon Fire District responded to a brush fire at the entrance to Marshall's Gulch. While we occasionally see fires at this time, and even earlier, the ignition source should be noted. Many of our fire starts are human caused-campfires, smoking or cooking—but this fire was more unpredictable, this fire was caused by a downed power line.

Why is this so important? Simply stated, we cannot assume that properties are safe because they are believed to be immune to outside activity. What this fire should be teaching all residents is that fire, in general, is unexpected and can occur at any time and in any place. The Burro Fire placed a large emphasis on Fire-Wise. Many properties needed more attention than they were receiving, and many good people dedicated their time to that cause. I would suggest that now is the time to FireWise your own property.

The Burro Fire, although eye opening, was quite a distance away from your properties. A downed power-line, lightning strike or human activity could certainly shorten the distance...will you be ready?

### Veggie Noodle less "Lasagna"

This is a zucchini, as the noodles dish. Using a Y shaped, hand-held peeler, sliced zucchini and squash layers. Simple seasoning, highlights the ingredients flavors. This is a very flexible dish and can easily be adjusted to your taste. Be creative and have fun!

### INGREDIANTS;

6-7 zucchinis, as you make each layer, Y shaped peeler for ease, sliced into thin slices. Don't peel 2 yellow squash, Y shaped peeler, sliced into thin slices

1 head broccoli divided into small pieces, discard stems.

5-6 large tomatoes or 12 medium, sliced thin, how many is up to you.

1 yellow and 1 orange bell pepper sliced into thin rings

9-12 large pieces of sliced low fat Alpine Lacy Swiss cheese, these need to be enough to cover as layers.

Add any vegetable you like, mushrooms, onions, green beans and carrots are ok but be mindful of the sweetness of carrots and the crispness of beans

You can add more layers of cheese, in this dish cheese has been kept to a minimum.

Lots of fresh oregano, if possible.

Granulated garlic to taste or chopped small or minced garlic cloves in layers to taste

8-10 TBSP of tomato sauce with basil or any other.

Small amount of olive oil.

### **DIRECTIONS**;

3 Qt baking dish or a medium lasagna pan. If larger just multiply the ingredients. It's all in the number of layers you wish to have.

Clean and strain vegetables .In the bottom of pan, spray a little olive oil. Slice the zucchini into thin slices and spread over one another to make the first layer.

Spread broccoli on top as next layer. Place tomatoes on top, handful of oregano and a little garlic. Layer of yellow squash slices, 2 TBSP sauce. Alternate the squashes as you like. I usually only use 1 layer of yellow. Layer of cheese, 2 TBSP sauce, layer of cauliflower, layer of tomatoes, oregano and a little garlic. Layer of zucchini, 2 TBSP sauce, oregano and a little garlic. Layer of tomatoes, layer of zucchini, layer of pepper rings, oregano, layer of cheese, 2 TBSP sauce. Place 2-3 pepper slices on top for garnish.

Preheat oven to 350. Cover with foil and cook for 45 minutes. Remove foil and cook until cheese is nicely melted and a little brownish, about 10 minutes. Let cool for 15 minutes to allow the dish to set before serving.

TIPS: There is a lot of liquid in these vegetables. There is no need to put very much sauce, unless you wish to. Add Italian seasoning, salt and pepper to taste Bon Appetit!

# It's all in the Cards: Working with Numerical Operations in One Game!

With being up in the cabin, we would like to do things together that are fun and interactive. Sometimes they are activities that are both inside, or outside, depending on the weather. Here is a card game that can either teach, or refresh our memories on computation. Whether you have kids, grandkids, nephews and nieces, or just want a fun game, this card game is for you!

### Have you ever played the card game "War"? Well, it is much like that.

### **Instructions:**

- \* You need 1 deck of cards <a href="https://www.eduplace.com/math/hmcam/tools/ltools/3/3hmmca-cr-lt-39.pdf">https://www.eduplace.com/math/hmcam/tools/ltools/3/3hmmca-cr-lt-39.pdf</a>
- \* Or number cards
- \* Take out the Joker cards if you have a deck of playing cards and do not use the 0 card in the number cards (you can if you wish)
- \* Ace cards count as 1. King, Queen and Jack cards count as 10 (you may want to take these out at first as it my be confusing).
  - \* Each player (2 players at most) get 7 cards each.
  - \* Count to three and each player puts out 1 card on the table, face up.
  - \* The first player who can subtract the cards (larger value-lesser value) gets the pair
  - \* The player with the most pairs, wins.
- \* Remember to make it fun at first! You might want to include some crackers or popcorn to use as tools to figure out the subtraction too!

### Something to Think About:

At the moment, my son understands the concept of subtraction and counts with his fingers from time to time. Counting with fingers is a strategy that helps the child with subtraction. I tend to look up in the air to one corner to think about the subtraction because I am visualizing it in my head and that is a strategy. Because he understands the concept of subtraction, addition, and multiplication first, the card game is great as a supplement for learning and thinking.

There are a number of ways to think about subtraction whether you build a model, draw a picture, verbally explain your thinking, act it out or write an equation on it to compute. Sometimes we need blocks, fingers, or pictures to help us think about certain operations like subtraction, addition, and so forth.

Always remember that we can do this game as adults to help strengthen our memory as well. Doing this card game is never a reflection on our intelligence, or lack thereof. Regardless of where we are at in life with mathematics, from time to time, we need a bit of a mental warm up. If stretching and warming up your muscles before exercising is recommended, then so should doing some mental exercises for math! Enjoy and have fun!
