Introducing the Shrine to Mary, Undoer of Knots

In Summerhaven on North Tucson Avenue a Shrine to Mary Undoer of Knots is being built. The Shrine campus is being built on three adjacent lots and will include a Chapel on the Southern lot, a Bell Tower with a Priest Quarter and a public restroom on the northern lot, and a Veteran's Memorial Ramada on the far north side. The Shrine is an outreach of St. Melany Byzantine (Ruthenian) Catholic Church in Tucson which is part of the Western Ruthenian Eparchy of the Byzantine Catholic Church located in Phoenix, AZ.

The architecture of this Shrine interestingly reflects the 15th century roots of Byzantine Catholic Ruthenian culture. Rutherian culture exists in the massive Carpathian mountain range where through the centuries two cultural streams met: Western-Roman and Eastern-Byzantine. Here wooden churches, called "cerkvi" were built in three architectural styles: Boyko, Lemko, and Hutzel. Our Chapel is built in the Boyko style while the Bell tower is built in the Lemko style. A model of the Hutzel design built by a Ruthenian priest 40 years ago will be displayed in the chapel's narthex. The oldest churches from the Carpathian mountain range that are still in existence today were built in the 15th and 16th centuries. A characteristic feature of these wooden churches is that they consist of three parts. Starting east to west there are: the altar/sanctuary, the nave/where people participate in the Divine Liturgy and the narthex/entryway. As you look from atop Tucson Avenue at the chapel you will note that the three towers with the three crosses sit atop the three parts of the interior. The crosses you see atop are a symbol of Jesus Christ's death and resurrection and have been used since the 4th century. Four types of crosses may be found on the Ruthenian churches: double-armed Byzantine cross (as is on our Shrine), three -armed papal cross, Latin and Greek crosses.

We'll talk a bit more in the Echoes about the interior of the chapel, including the iconostasis in

the following months. We will also provide more background into the Catholic devotion toward Mary and in particular her charism as the "Undoer of Knots". In addition, the Mount Lemmon Woman's Club is sponsoring an informational meeting about the Shrine at the community center on Saturday, August 11th from 1p to 2p. Possible speakers include Dr. Frank Rankin (pastor and visionary), Chauncey Meyer (architect), Gary Griffith (general contractor) and Chuck Albanese (iconographer) who will talk a bit and answer your questions!

Many are curious as to when we will be done and ready to open. Well, our answer may sound very reminiscent of the scene in "Agony and Ecstasy" where Rex Harrison as Pope Julius scene after scene asks Michelangelo (Charlton Heston) "When will it be done?". Gary Griffith, our builder is pretty good at imitating Charlton Heston's facial expression:) ...! So stay tuned!

In all fairness to our Gary, our builder, every part of this project has been custom and in many cases, hand made just as were the original churches found in the Carpathian mountain range. We are currently at the stage of finishing the interior of the chapel (the furnishings will be complete by early next year), and during the upcoming months our work will focus on the Bell Tower/Priest Quarter. Once the Bell Tower is done, our attention will be turned onto the Ramada. We have hopes that the pavers for the Ramada will be ready for purchase in early October 2018 and will be installed early in 2019. On March 10th, our Bishop, John Pazak, visited the Shrine along with Fr. Robert Rankin, the pastor at St. Melany Byzantine Catholic Church of Tucson. Both were very enthused and see the Shrine as a blessing for the Eparchy.

Bishop John noted and with great excitement we agree: "Something Good is happening here!"

Few Flowers by Frank S. Rose

We all know how dry Arizona has been this Winter and Spring. My friend and I walked Oracle Ridge on a clear sunny day, not expecting to come across any wildflowers. After about ten minutes, seeing no plants in bloom, we noticed a member of the Euphorbia family. The flowers are yellow and quite small, with fringed edges. I particularly like the geometrical arrangement of the leaves.

Mostly I have seen this plant in Chihuahua Pine picnic area almost two thousand feet lower, growing along the edge of the stream. It was surprising to me to see it on Oracle Ridge, along a dusty trail, in a very dry season.

As for its name-it is called: Mohave Spurge, or Hairy Mohave Spurge, and my botany friends tell me it is either Euphorbia incisa, the first name by which I knew it, Euphorbia Yaquiana, a name given to me by some Phoenix botanists, or Euphorbia Schizoloba, an old name which I just found looking it up on Wikipedia. Botany can be confusing. A few days before this, Ed and I were delighted to see both Red-Fuzz Saxifrage and Valerian blooming along the road leading to the East end of the Butterfly trail. Sadly, there were not as many plants as we have seen in other years.

On Tuesday, April 24th, we held our MLHOA Annual Dinner at the Viscount Suites and Inns. We had a great turn out! FireWise coordinator Sally Crum and Fire Chief Joe Gunia presented us with a very informative video. In this video, they simulated embers and how they penetrate your home or out-building. It was very interesting to see how fixing, what could be a potential fire hazard, was as simple as replacing a wire mesh with a smaller mesh. Fire was certainly the topic of the evening and we are all taking this topic very seriously. With little to no moisture this winter and monsoons still months away, we must continue to be vigilant and keep our homes as safe as we can.

We were told that we will be on stage II fire restrictions beginning on May 1st. Beth Borozan is working on getting informational packets to be passed out to visitors at the toll booth at MP 5. Volunteers will man the booth. On stage II, no fires will be allowed on federal land. While we will all continue to remove slash and built up pine needles from our properties, the slash area was closed on Wednesday, April 25th and will remain closed until the fire restrictions are lifted. They will do one last burn for the season soon. Also, the fuel reduction of the Marshall Gulch area has begun! So, if you hear chainsaws, the crews are hard at work! Plans for starting the clean up of the Turkey Run area will begin in 2019

We had so many engaging speakers at the dinner! Each had so much information to give us, most of it very good news! A grant of \$50,000 was secured by Steve Christy and Beth Borozan that will help us find a solution to the traffic issues in Summerhaven...this is a very large grant for the proposed situation!

Please remember to come up over the weekend of May 5th and celebrate the kick off of the Community Wildfire Preparedness Day! It will be a day of hard work, but the end result will benefit the entire community. There will be chippers, folks helping bring your slash to the chipper route, friends helping friends, neighbors helping neighbors...then at the end of the day, when you feel that "good tired" from a job well done, we will all meet at the Mount Lemmon Fire Station for a Spaghetti Dinner fundraiser. FireWise-May 2018

What exciting times on the mountain! Many cabin owners are busy preparing for what promises to be a VERY ACTIVE wildfire season! Please respond to your Neighborhood Captains; they are working hard to provide you with information and resources. The MLFD burned a significant amount of slash and over 125 bags of pine needles on April 9th. Kudos to all of you who have been hard at work protecting your cabins and our precious mountain.

May is a busy month for FireWise activities-Besides spending a day or two cleaning up around your cabins, there are a number of important events:

May 5th-Community Wildfire Preparedness Day-DOC Crews and volunteers will be available to chip and broadcast slash in our effort to reduced ladder fuels. I know I am repeating myself, but PLEASE contact the MLFD at 520-576-1201 X5 between 9 and 10 am for your FREE Same Day FireWise Assessment. By the time you receive this, many of our Neighborhood Captains will have completed 2 days of training and will also be able to perform FireWise Assessments. Cabin owners have found that with just a few modifications, they can significantly increase the chances of surviving the next (remember "It's not IF, but WHEN" wildfire. Join us afterwards for a Spaghetti Dinner at the MLFD, provided by Lorri Hans; all proceeds will benefit our own MLFD.

May 26th-FireWise Block Party. This year's event looks to be another good one. There will be many exhibitors, including U of A Science Center, AZ Department of Forestry and Fire Management, U S Forest Service (hopefully a Hot Shot Crew if they aren't busy on a wildfire), SARA, Arizona Game and Fish, The Hummingbird Network and Face painting by our own Pam Haskell. There will be several raffles, including the "Cabin Rules" quilt and baskets of different kinds. Jenni Zimmerman will also have FireWise Tshirts for sale. Food will be available for a donation of \$5.00.

USFS Announces Important Information

The Coronado National Forest, Santa Catalina Ranger District, is in the final stages of completing the prescription for the Marshall Gulch Thinning project. This will serve as a guideline for how fuel loading will be reduced in the project area. Currently, we are looking at a 40-50% reduction of fuels. Crews began work on April 23rd. They will be focusing on removing under/midstory trees to open canopy gaps, promote health and reduce ladder fuels. Ladder fuels are fuels that promote surface fire to climb in the crowns of trees. Once material is on the ground it will be piled and burned at a later date when weather conditions are favorable. Work will occur adjacent to the Summerhaven boundary and eventually tie into the Pusch Ridge Wilderness boundary.

Additionally, the district has our permanent answer at the district ranger position. Charles (CJ) Woodard will be joining us on May 14th. He is joining us from the Spring Mountains National Recreation Area on the Humbolt-Toiyabe National Forest where he served as the Wildlife Biologist/Natural Resource Staff Officer. We are excited to have him join our team here on the Coronado. The forest is also planning on entering into stage II fire restrictions on May 1st. Please continue to check local news sources for more information regarding this matter.

District 4 Board of Supervisors Update

Greetings! I'm thrilled to be given this great opportunity to communicate with all of you on a regular basis through my own column in the Echoes!

I'm hoping you heard the good news that we received a \$50,000 grant from the Pima Association of Governments to go toward studying traffic congestion on Mount Lemmon and to finding solutions to remedy it. This has been a long time coming and a welcome development.

On Friday, April 13th, we took part in a town hall meeting held at the Mount Lemmon Community Center attended by more than 40 residents of our community. The subject presented by Pima County Regional Wastewater Reclamation Department was an upcoming inspection of our community's 40-year-old sewer system by PCRWR. The meeting produced larger discussions and questions around future growth of businesses, residents, tourists, and economic development. I was proud to be there with all of you and was most impressed by everyone's high level of interest in and knowledge of this very important issue ahead of us-an adequate Mount Lemmon sewer system.

Finally, our office is working on a project to staff the "toll booth" on the Catalina Highway with volunteers to educate Mount Lemmon Visitors as they come up the mountain about the three most important concerns within "Pima County's Playground." parking, trash and fire prevention.

We will keep you posted!!


