Our **DONE IN A DAY** project for May was Camp Bravo. Camp Bravo provides shelter and food for about 40 homeless male and female veterans living in "Mash-Like" tents. There is no electricity and very limited running water. There is no federal or state support for these men and women who have served our country. The goal of Camp Bravo is to eventually help the homeless veterans find housing. Woman's Club members donated money and grocery gift cards to buy critically needed water. Other donations included canned and dried food, gift cards for gas, toiletry items, toilet paper, sanitary supplies for the women and dishwashing soap.

During the weekend of April 27-29, eleven (11) members of the Woman's Club attended the GFWC (General Federation of Woman's Clubs) Arizona Annual State Convention at the Hilton Hotel on Broadway here in Tucson. The conventions included a Salute to the USO, hilarious entertainment, a business meeting, workshops and great food. In addition, a Conservation Challenge was extended to all Woman's Clubs in the United States to create a complete outfit using reusable tote bags, not plastic grocery bags. Eight clubs in Arizona accepted this challenge (we did not). The entries are pictured below with the winner. The winner will now go to the GFWC National Convention in St. Louis, Missouri the weekend of June 23-26. She will compete against the other 50 state winners.

MLFD News June 2018

As you all may know by now, Stage 2 Fire Restrictions Order was signed by Forest Supervisor Kerwin Dewberry on May 1st for the Coronado National Forest.

So, if in your travels you notice any activity covered below, please call 911 with a detailed description of WHO, WHAT, WHEN and WHERE. If possible, please stay in the area to assist first-responders in locating the violation. Only remain in the area IF it is safe

to do so, and do not approach or antagonize potential violators. Approaching the immediate area should be done by fire personnel or law enforcement only.

The following are prohibited:

- * Building, maintaining, attending or using a fire, campfire, charcoal, coal or wood stove fire, including within a developed recreation site, or improved site, with exception of petroleum fueled stove, lantern or heating device.
 - * Using an explosive
 - * Smoking, except within an enclosed vehicle or building. (Smoking prohibited in all Federal buildings)
 - * Operating or using any equipment powered by an internal combustion engine, except motor vehicles.
 - * Welding, or operating acetylene or other torch with an open flame.
- * Discharging a firearm, air rifle or gas gun, except while engaged in a lawful hunt pursuant to state, federal or tribal law and regulations.
- * Possessing, operating motor vehicles off National Forest System roads, including but not limited to cars, trucks, SUV'S, motorcycles and ATV'S, except for when parking in an area devoid of vegetation within 10 feet of the roadway, and except for parking overnight in Forest Service developed campground and trailheads.

Finally, Mount Lemmon Fire Support volunteers have been diligently checking campsites and day use areas to find any unattended campfires and/or BBQ's. Our volunteers commit themselves to this process every year, and they have had great success in making these potential threats extinguished. We owe them a debt of gratitude.

USFS Update on New District Ranger and Marshall Gulch Project

The Santa Catalina Ranger District has received our permanent answer at the District Ranger Position. Charles "CJ" Woodward joined us on May 14th. He is excited to hit the ground running on this fast-paced district. We are currently under Stage II fire restrictions and will continue to be until monsoon season is upon us. With Stage II restrictions, thinning operations are still possible most days. Once we move into consecutive extreme fire weather days, or a planned level of 5 we cannot continue to operate. Once weather conditions allow we will continue thinning efforts on the Marshall Gulch Project.

Currently we are making great progress using the Tucson and Florence Department of Corrections Crews. Our partnership with the Arizona Department of Fire and Forest Management allows for crews to operate for us. We currently have around 30-40 acres of the timbered component treated. There are around 150 acres of timbered vegetation all together, and around 100 acres of shrub lands. Once the timbered portion has been finished, crews will move in the shrub land area between Sykes Knob and Fern Ridge. Additionally, Prineville hotshots contributed to the efforts as they began construction of the fuel break on Radio Ridge. Once the limitations of the Mexican Spotted Owl have been lifted, crews will finalize the fuel break on Radio Ridge.

Our first **Community Wildfire Preparedness Day** on May 5th was a HUGE success, thanks to the high participation rate. As many of you have seen, there was a large amount of thinning and hazardous fuels removed. The spaghetti dinner that followed at the MLFD, sponsored and prepared by Lorri Hans was well attended as well. Over \$1,000.00 was raised to support our fire fighters. The DOC chipper crew was delayed due to a fire, but when they arrived, they quickly worked through al the slash piles. THANK YOU to all the volunteers who helped provide and serve lunch for the crew.

By the time you receive this, our **Annual Block Party** will be a thing of the past. Thank you to all the businesses and community members for their support, and I hope that attendees learned a little more about our community and our partners and Firewise. This event is a critical part of our Firewise certification.

Are you prepared for evacuation? Hopefully it won't be required, but after the Burro Fire last year, we all know we need to be ready on very short notice. The MLFD is part of the **Ready, Set, Go!** program. This program's three tenets encourage you to get **READY** by preparing now for what threatens your community, be **SET** by maintaining awareness of significant danger and to **GO**, evacuate immediately when the danger is current ad life-threatening. More information is available on Pima County Emergency Management's website, where you can also sign up for emergency alerts.

Chief Joe Gunia and I recently attended the Arizona Wildland Urban Interface Conference in Pinetop to learn about what steps we can take to protect our homes from wildfires, while living in and near the forest where fire is inevitable. While there I learned about a grant opportunity for Hazardous Fuels Reduction. We have applied for a grant that will provide 90% of the funding for thinning/Firewising on private property in the Turkey Run area. This is **critical** to the safety and survival of our community in many ways, primarily for the important watershed. Because the Forest Service has plans and funding to do thinning on their properties around the Turkey Run area, this is a perfect opportunity to clean up the private properties around the Coronado National Forest. If you have property in the area (Cap Rock, Grosbeak, Guthrie, Tanager, Turkey Run) PLEASE contact me, Chief Gunia, or the members of the Mount Lemmon Business Economic Association for more information. The notice of the grant award will be made later in the summer or early fall.

Cheatgrass Season June 2018

As you are all aware, cheatgrass season is upon us and is probably peaking as I write this. This season is particularly dry and windy. All the more reason for you all to be seeing to your property. Cheatgrass under these conditions can be the straw that broke the camel's back if anyone is careless with matches or cigarettes or anything resembling a flame. This is a big Firewise issue so make sure your property is Firewised! Remember that you can always pull it. However, if the seeds are at the point of falling off, it probably doesn't make sense to pull it unless you are pulling directly into a bag. If the plants are completely green, you can pull and just leave them on the ground because the seeds will not ripen at that point. You can only spray when it is green.


MLHOA

The picture shown to the right is of the original Ranger's residence at the Palisades Ranger Station. It can be viewed from the Catalina Highway— the structure is located to the west of the main Palisades Visitors Center. The cabin is believed to be the original Ranger Residence for the Mount Lemmon area. Unfortunately, the Forest Service has allowed it to fall into disrepair. A Holly-Like Plant Bravely Blooming

When it is this dry we don't expect to see many wildflowers in bloom. Ed and I were surprised and delighted to find a large patch of Wilcox Barberry (Berberis wilcoxi) in a little camping area just off the Mt. Bigelow road. The plants look like holly bushes because of their leaves. This is a perennial plant that spreads underground. It did not make it into my Wildflower book because I had seen so little of it in the Catalina Mountains. There are a few plants at the Palisades Ranger station, and a patch by the Cypress picnic area in Bear Canyon. It was new to see it this high in the mountain. Another friend saw it on the Palisades trail near Mud Spring. It blooms in April and has a sweet scent. And it has its own family-The Barberry family (Berberidaceae). It likes to grow in damp woody areas. This is an evergreen plant whose individual leaves turn a beautiful red when they are ready to fall.
