

#### **Batteries Not Included**

Living in Arizona, and specifically Mount Lemmon, can present some difficulties. Excessive heat, persistent drought, water rationing, heavy monsoons, snow/ice and wildfires are just some of the natural challenges we face. In addition, we must be concerned with human factors like heavy traffic, dangerous drivers, parking issues, trash accumulation and careless discarding of flammable items. All of these challenges affect all of our residents. One reprieve we receive for our trouble is the nonexistence of daylight savings time. Not resetting clocks or oversleeping seems like one thing Arizona got correct.

That is if you are looking at it through the lens of a citizen. Firefighters are presented with another concern due to lack of daylight savings time. Nationwide, firefighters have utilized this time as a public service reminder to change your smoke detector and carbon monoxide detector batteries. Granted, many new detectors come equipped with 10-year batteries installed, but this is certainly not true regarding older models.

With daylight savings time set up to expire at 0200 hours on November 4, 2018, the Mount Lemmon Fire District would like to take this time to encourage you to change your batteries if you have older model detectors. It is even recommended to change the battery backups in hardwired models at least once annually, according to the United States Fire Administration. It is also recommended that any smoke detector be completely replaced after 10 years of service.

Remember, most fires occur in the winter months; now is the perfect time to increase your safety margin. A couple of Fire Department updates:

- \* We want to thank EVERYONE who participated or showed their support at the pancake breakfast. It is wonderful to see the community support for our Fire District.
- \* We were awarded the AFG grant for \$122K. This money will provide personal protection gear and self-contained breathing apparatus to our firefighters (which are currently very outdated). It cannot be stressed enough the hard work that was put into obtaining this grant, and an addendum will thank those individuals.
  - \* Finally, firefighter (and future paramedic) Sean Matias has something he would like to say...

I would like to personally thank all of the community members and organizations who have generously donated to my continued education in becoming your next Mount Lemmon Fire District paramedic. Thank you in advance for your continued support.

#### Santa Catalina Ranger District Information on Historical Structure by Chuck Huber

After the original write-up in a recent Echoes regarding the structure at the Palisades Ranger Station, I took the liberty of contacting the Coronado National Forest to encourage them to consider taking action on this potentially historic structure. Here is the response I received via the Forest Service email portal:

"Chuck,

Thank you for your interest in the Palisades Barn/Corral. I forwarded your email onto Chris Schrager, the Forest's Historic Preservation Specialist. Please see his response below.

(Response from the <u>santacatalinaRD@fs.fed.us</u> email address)

Thanks for writing to my colleagues on the Santa Catalina Ranger District about the two-room log building at the Palisades Administrative Site (for reference, I've always heard it referred to as the Saw Shop). As the Forest's Historic Preservation Specialist, I think I can best respond to your concerns. I had been made aware that the left-hand door was off its hinges at some point, but thought that it had been stood up and temporarily attached to its frame; clearly from the photos, that's no longer the case. I can certainly get up the mountain and do another temporary fix.

The greater problem on that structure has to do with the rotted sill logs-the ones at the base of each wall that rest on the masonry/concrete foundation. Exposure to continued cycles of damp and dry have left them badly deteriorated; this is also true of some of the lower planks of the horizontal siding. While rehanging the remaining door (and covering the other opening) are relatively easy fixes, the more serious repairs involve several steps, due to the building's eligibility for National Register listing and the mandates under which we operate when proposing undertakings on Federal lands and properties.

While I know that the Palisades Saw Shop is significant to the local community, there are literally dozens of sites in SE Arizona on lands managed by the Coronado National Forest and the Tucson Field Office of the BLM (for whom I work in the same capacity). It's not for lack of caring that situations arise; just an ever-expanding need coupled with scant resources to address all of the problems, everywhere they arise.

I will try to get up Mount Lemmon in the next few weeks to do the simple repairs on the doorways; for the more extensive undertaking I will need to initiate the Proposed Undertaking process as well as locate the materials, equipment, support and funding. Hopefully, I'll be able to do those repairs in the coming federal fiscal year. In the meantime, please feel free to contact me with your thoughts and concerns; and thanks for your interest in preserving our unique and significant heritage resources.

I appreciate Chris' response and can understand the situation.

I have volunteered to provide material (plywood, paint and/or stain) and bring it to the site to support the stabilization of this structure. I thought the readers of the Mount Lemmon Echoes might be interested in additional information regarding this historic structure.



#### A Powerful Red Rose

Here is a plant in the Rose family that is of special interest. It stands several feet tall and has velvety red flowers that open toward the middle of the day. I have seen it in two places in Marshall Gulch. Coming down the road after you pass the gate and the rocky slope, look for it on the right. There are a number of plants there. If you take the sunset trail out of Marshall Gulch, look for it on the long slope up to the views of the valley. Its name is Thurber's cinquefoil, (*Potentilla Thurberi*) from Dr. George Thurber (1821-1890), who is thought of as the most accomplished American horticulturist of his day.

There are two other Potentillas in the range. Both lie very flat on the ground and have yellow flowers. By this time of year they have finished blooming. Clubleaf cinquefoil (Potentilla subviscosa) usually has 5 leaves in a bunch (In French cinquefoil=5 leaves). This is the more abundant one. Whiteflower cinquefoil (Potentilla albiflora), usually has 3 leaves in a bunch. The flowers are not actually white. Potentilla means powerful, a reference to its use as a medicine.
