Our COMMUNITY GOAL is to have all private properties firewised before possible Forest Service Fire Restrictions go into effect.

Begin to Firewise your property now

Get free Firewise assessment, then:

- 1. Do Firewise tasks yourself.
- 2. Hire a service provider.
- 3. Reserve Boy Scouts for pine needle cleanup.

Reserve Boy Scouts to rake & bag your pine needles on 5/4 or 5/5 (possibly 5/11 & 5/12 also) in exchange for \$ donation. You provide large paper bags. Only 4 properties a day can be scheduled, so reserve asap: Contact S. Crum: (520) 576-1008, sbc602@gmail.com.

Saturday-Sunday, May 4-5: Wildfire Preparedness Days

Firewising continues:

- Take slash* to MLFD burn pile OR place it along chipper route.
- 2. Take bagged pine needles to MLFD burn pile.

Place slash (6" diam. max) along chipper route (see locations below) for Monday's chipper crew **and** alert your neighborhood Fire Captain **before 6 p.m. Sunday** that you have slash to be chipped and where.

Monday, May 6: Chipper Day (Rescheduled from May 4)

Free chipper will mulch slash at these locations.

A MLFD reminder: It's time to change the batteries in your smoke/carbon monoxide detector

- If you have an older model detector (most don't have long-life batteries), switch out the old batteries with fresh ones.
- The United States Fire Administration recommends that you also change the battery backups in hard-wired models at least once annually.
- If your smoke and/or carbon monoxide detector has been in service for 10 years, replace the entire unit with a new one.

They are the Berries by Frank Rose

Two shrubs in the Currant Family (*Grossulariaceae*) grow high in the Catalina Mountains and bloom in April and May. I have seen the yellow-flowered **Golden Currant** (*Ribes aureum*) on the long stretch of road from the hairpin turn at Mile Post 22 to the Sunset Trail parking area. The **Orange Gooseberry** (*Ribes pinetorum*) shrub, with red flowers fading to white, grows more in the Marshall Gulch and Turkey Run areas. The spike-covered fruit of both shrubs is edible.







AVIAN ABODES

Ground and tree nesters weave a home by Henry Johnson


Last month we looked at mountain birds that nest in cavities such as a hollow in an oak or pine, an old woodpecker hole, a birdhouse or even a hole in your cabin! This month let's look at ground and tree nesters.

Red-faced Warbler

Red-faced Warblers winter in Mexico and Central America and breed in northern Mexico, Arizona and New Mexico. They favor open pine-oak forests at elevations between 6,400 and 9,000 feet, breeding in small groves of deciduous trees such as oak, maple or aspen that grow among conifers. The nest is an open cup built by the female on the ground, hidden at the base of a shrub, rock or tree trunk on a slope or steep bank. The banks of Sabino Creek in Marshall Gulch are ideal, with favorable slopes and dense foliage providing a good source of food. The adjacent photograph here shows a male with insects, in low brush along Sabino Creek, close to a ground nest in June 2017. Hatchlings are fed by both parents, so Dad might be on his way to the nest with lunch.

Yellow-eyed Juncos

Yellow-eyed Juncos live in mountain forests in Mexico and just across the border into southeastern Arizona and western New Mexico. They are an uncommon sight for most U.S. birders but one of our more common Summerhaven residents. They can be seen foraging for insects in leaf litter, with a characteristic forward hop and a one- or two-foot backward scratch. Their bright yellow eyes make them easy to spot. The nest is usually on the ground, sometimes in a shrub or low tree but rarely more than a few feet high. The nest is a shallow cup of grass lined with fine grass and sometimes animal hair, built in a slight depression or hidden at the base of a shrub or under a log or rock. Males sing to defend the nesting territory and might be aggressive in territorial defense, fighting off intruders.

Steller's Jay

Named after German naturalist Georg Steller, Steller's Jays live year-round in mountain forests of the west, from Central America and Mexico north into Arizona and New Mexico, up the Rockies and into Canada as far as Alaska, where Stellar first identified them in 1741. Steller's Jays are regular residents of Mt. Lemmon, where they forage for just about everything—insects, seeds, berries, small animals, unguarded picnic items and feeder fare, including peanuts. They nest in trees, commonly pines and firs. The nest is a ragged cup of twigs, weeds, moss and dry leaves, held together with mud and lined with grass and pine needles. Adults are quiet and secretive while nesting, but become noisy and aggressive if the nest is threatened. Clutch size is three to six eggs, most commonly four. Incubation is by the female, but both parents will feed the young. THIS CABIN—NEW & OLD

New technology can eliminate some second-home headaches

If your cabin is your second home—a weekend or summer retreat—there are several tech devices available now that can improve your peace of mind and the security and convenience of your cabin.

Security Doorbells

A digital doorbell can add security and peace of mind. There are several products on the market now that allow you to see who is at your door or on your deck from your smartphone whether you are in the other room, on the trail or out of town. Most require a simple app download and an easy installation of the device at your door. Two popular devices are Ring, starting at \$99.00, and Nest Hello, from \$229.99.

Locks

A remote access smart lock allows you to lock or unlock the cabin from anywhere via your smartphone. This might be handy if you have a housekeeper, contractor, family members or renters that need access—some devices allow up to 30 programmable access codes for different individuals. Installation could be more complex for the casual do-it-yourselfer, and so you might want to have a

A word of caution about nesting birds

If you spot a nest, avoid disturbing the nest or the activities of the parents. Be careful about sharing the location with others as a large throng of lookie-loo's can disrupt the nesting family. Some of our avian neighbors, such as the Red-faced Warbler, are threatened by loss of forest habitat, and we want Mt. Lemmon to be a friendly place for them to raise a family. Heating/AC Controls

With a Wi-Fi enabled thermostat, you can turn on your furnace or A/C before you head up to Summerhaven so you arrive to a comfortably heated or cooled cabin. Check out the Nest Thermostat E smart Wi-Fi programmable thermostat, from \$169.00, or the Ecobee3 lite, which is compatible with Alexa and starts at \$139.00.

Television Viewing

Another convenient and cost-saving strategy is to use a streaming device for your TV or movie viewing. You can cut the cable at both homes by using a single streaming account. Many of the media streaming devices (sometimes called hubs) allow you to set up your TV with any online or local streaming service. The most popular media streaming devices are Kindle Fire TV, Apple TV, Android TV, Google Chromecast and Roku. Prices range from \$35.00 for Google Chromecast, which works with your PC, to \$199.00 for Apple TV.

FOREST SERVICE

District provides fire season outlook and FireScape update

Ben Plumb, the Acting Fire Management Officer of the District, Coronado National Forest, has provided the following outlook, which was produced by the Southwest Coordination Center Predictive Services:

- Fine Fuels Condition—Last year's rains and this past wet winter have increased the fine fuels loading (grasses), which are normal to above normal and continuous, especially southern/southeastern AZ into eastern/southeastern plains.
- Spring and early Summer Weather Pattern—Expect a variable weather pattern with strong potential to transition into a dynamic and active mid-late spring.
- Monsoon—Tough to predict specifics overall, but there
 are some concerns about both a later-than-normal
 onset and less robust burst.
- Dry conditions to take place May/June, focused on lowmid elevations grash/brush fuel types.
- Coming in to June, expect above-normal Significant Wildland Fire Potential.

Also, Charles Clark, Deputy District Ranger, Coronado National Forest, reports: "Regarding FireScape, we were hoping to get some work done thinning near Summerhaven this February, but we had too much snow to proceed with our plans. We are now planning to thin in that area in September and October."
