

# 4th of July Parade Returns to Summerhaven

The Mt. Lemmon 4th of July Parade is back, and this year, it's live on the streets of Summerhaven for the first time in three years.

The parade will begin at noon on Monday, July 4, at the Mt. Lemmon Realty driveway and proceed south on Sabino Canyon Parkway to the Mt. Lemmon Water District offices.

Spectators are asked to stay on the sides of the road, and adults are urged to attend to small children for everyone's safety.

Bring your flags, bottled water and sunscreen, and get ready to celebrate our nation's birthday with other Mt. Lemmonites and mountain visitors.

Bottled water and public restrooms are at the Mt. Lemmon Community Center, located at Sabino Canyon Parkway and Turkey Run.

Parade participants are asked to check in as early as 11 a.m. and absolutely no later than 11:45 a.m. at Loma Linda Extension/General Hitchcock Highway across from Ski Valley Road.

# The Great Pumpkin Is Here, Even Though It's Not Halloween

As we "parade" into July, the weather remains hot, dry and conducive to significant wildfire activity.

Even with the monsoon fast approaching, MLFD remains vigilantly prepared for the potential of wildfire impacting our community.

One of the ways we do so is by having available water for operations either by ground or air. This means having a portable tank set up ahead of time in case of a wildfire emergency.

No, it is not Halloween yet, but there is a pumpkin perched atop Mt. Lemmon.

A pumpkin is a term used for a portable tank holding a static (non-pressurized) water supply for firefighting operations and application. If you happen to stop by the fire station, you will notice the pumpkin at our helicopter landing zone. The

# The Great Pumpkin Is Here

sizes. MLFD has multiple pumpkins ranging from 1,800 to 6,000 gallons, the latter of which is the one visible at the fire station helipad.

Due to its size and location, this particular pumpkin is designated for aerial operations. This means that if a firefighting helicopter were assigned to a fire close to town, it could retrieve water with the means of a hanging bucket and fly over top of the fire while strategically dumping water to cool and slow the spread of the fire or protect structures and infrastructure from the advancing inferno.

Pumpkins can also be set up in areas without pressurized fire hydrants for firefighting or structure protection. Water tenders will shuttle water to these pumpkins, and an auxiliary pump will pressurize a fire hose to push water to where it is deemed necessary.

Some of you may be familiar with sprinklers

being placed on your property to cool the building before a flame front arrives. This is accomplished with the use of pumpkins.

Pumpkins, and portable water tanks by any other name, are vital pieces of equipment when facing wildfire in rural areas with minimal water supply or while attempting firefighting in terrain that makes firefighting too difficult, unsafe, or inaccessible.

Be mindful if you see pumpkins in your area as firefighting equipment will most likely be moving through that area. Additionally, while they are not swimming pools, treat them as such from a safety standpoint if children are around. They are opentop and very difficult to get out of.

Finally, if you are interested to know what one looks like, ours will be operational until after fire restrictions are lifted due to significant monsoonal moisture across the forest.

So feel free to stop by!

# Woman's Club Activities



# School Time Capsule: Happy Remembrances on the Mountain

Several Zimmerman School students from the 1980s gathered and hovered around the school's apple tree one day last month in search of a hidden, buried treasure. A time capsule was buried in 1981 in a metal coffee can filled with several items close to the students' hearts. Art DeFilippo, the teacher at that time, later became Arizona Teacher of the Year and is still revered by these students. Some sweat and shovels of dirt opened several holes with no evidence of anything buried. Soon though, the clink of metal brought up a mostly disintegrated can with a few items mixed in the dirt. There were several tears of joy and looks of astonishment as pieces came out of the dirt tomb.



While we're enjoying the cooler temperatures, it is a good time to complete caulking, painting,


replacing damaged screens and wood and removing unnecessary items from around our cabins.

# Recap of June 18 MLHOA Board Meeting

MLHOA President Sally Crum announced for Santa Catalina District Ranger C.J. Woodard of the U.S. Forest Service that planting of 43,000 ponderosa pine seedlings started on June 7 and will end on July 6. The planting areas will be Inspiration Rock, Marshall Gulch and Ski Valley.

Beth Borozan of Pima County Supervisor Steve Christy's office reported that Granite Construction is repairing and upgrading Sabino Creek road crossings this summer. Target date for completion is July 4.

Other business:

Movies: We plan for movies to start now on the first Friday in July if the Community Center is not otherwise rented. Bunko will be held in the Community Center on the third Friday of each month starting in July.

The Pancake Picnic: It is scheduled for Labor Day Sunday and flu vaccinations will be available along with food and fun.

Water: Tucson Avenue work is in process hampered by loss of Nate's co-employee Mike. Guthrie Road is next scheduled for work to stop the underlying water pipes from freezing. Far future plans include a large new \$3 million water storage tank on Upper Loma Linda.

Willow Canyon: The homeowners raised \$4,000 to bring in fill, and the Forest Service provided a backhoe to work it onto the very challenging roads.

Soldier's Camp: Michael Singervalt was reelected President of the Homeowner's Association.

MLFD: Chief Joe Gunia reported that the exclusion of Willow Canyon from the proposed new boundaries is under review due to the loss of tax dollars to which it leads. In the meantime, however, the subscription service will go into effect. So, if you want fire assistance for your cabin in Willow Canyon, subscribe now.



# Author Wynne Brown, Who Wrote of Sara Plummer Lemmon



# How to Stay Up to Date on Mt. Lemmon Happenings

There are four online resources available to keep Mount Lemmon residents up to date between Echoes editions:

- 1. A Google Group has been set up to provide email updates. To join, send an email to mtlemmon-hoa+subscribe@googlegroups.com.
- The Mount Lemmon Homeowner's Association maintains a website at https:// mtlemmonhoa.org/ Check it out, get informed, and contribute.
- 3. A neighborhood group has been set up on Nextdoor.com. Sign up using your cabin street address to be connected to the Mount Lemmon group. If you already use Nextdoor for your valley neighborhood, you need to

- sign up for Mt. Lemmon under a different email address, since only one neighborhood is permitted per email address at this time. This venue is important for general information, worthwhile educational benefits and timely communication, especially during critical concerns such as fire danger and road closures.
- 4. MLFDAZ.org is the web-address for our Fire Department. On their home page, under the Resources tab is *Firewise*. This tab takes you to the compilation of the important Firewise information and forms. This includes an Action List for Property Owners, a Community Communications form, cheatgrass and bark beetle identification, and even more information to help keep your cabin and community safe.
