



- 1. A Google Group has been set up to provide email updates. To join, send an e-mail to mtlemmon-hoa+subscribe@googlegroups.com.
- 2. The Mount Lemmon Homeowners' Association maintains a website at mtlemmonhoa.org. Get informed and contribute to the community.
- 3. Sign up at Nextdoor.com, using your cabin street address. If you use Nextdoor for your valley neighborhood, sign up for Mt. Lemmon under a new email address, because only one neighborhood is permitted per email address. This offers general information and important communication, especially with wildfires and road closures.
- 4. MLFDAZ.org is the web address for our Fire Department. On the home page, under the Resources tab, is Firewise. This takes you to important information and forms, including an Action List for Property Owners, a Community Communications form, cheatgrass and bark beetle identification, and more information to help keep your cabin and community safe.




The Radio Fire

On July 26, 2023, at just after 7:30 PM, the Mount Lemmon Fire District (MLFD) was dispatched to a brush fire near Radio Ridge. On-duty personnel, volunteers, and the Pima County Sheriff's Department responded to the incident and began searching for access to the blaze. The fire, later named the Radio Fire, was five dead standing snags (previously dead trees) burning less than a quarter mile northwest of the Miner's Ridge water tank. The United States Forest Service dispatch was notified while MLFD and the Pima County Sheriff's Department attempted to reach the burning stand.

Due to lightning from the monsoon storm responsible for the incident and topography beyond vehicle capabilities, MLFD began structure protection considerations. The fire's location and the rainfall on it allowed our resources to monitor the fire from a safe distance while still coordinating with the United States Forest Service by gathering information such as GPS coordinates, best access routes, and other possible needs and necessities. MLFD remained in contact with responding units and provided pertinent updates as required. The fire's visibility provided an opportunity to give a more in-depth glimpse for our community to better understand the coordinated response necessary to fight fires that test local resources.

It is with sincere gratitude that we acknowledge the United States Forest Service, the Pima County Sheriff's Department, our dedicated volunteers, and those that report these incidents to further our efforts to protect our community from the threat of wildfire.

Fire Season No More?

The recent Molino 2 and Bolt fires are testimonies to the fact that there is no longer a "fire season." Wildfires can occur anytime. With that in mind, we must continue to maintain the areas around our cabins year-round. Take a close look around before you close your cabin for the winter and make sure that all flammables are stored properly.

With that in mind, a second round of slash removal and chipping was scheduled for the weekend of Sept. 29 and 30. A big THANK YOU to Soldier's Camp cabin owner, Fred Knapp, who provided the chipper and to all the volunteers who assisted with the chipping process. The burn pile at the Mt. Lemmon Fire Station remains closed until the current pile is burned.

Now is also the time to remove pine needles that collected during our monsoon in your gutters and close to your cabin. Pine needles can still be dropped off at the Mt. Lemmon Fire Station. If the needles are in plastic bags, they must be dumped from the bags into the trailer for them to be accepted at the green waste dumpsite.

Thanks to the entire community for your diligence in reducing the risk of wildfire! PLEASE use the Lemmonites form at MLFDAZ.org, under the Firewise tab to provide your contact information, including email address so that your Firewise Neighborhood Captain can reach out to you, when necessary, with valuable information.

Do you rent out your cabin occasionally or often, or do friends use it? If so, as President of the Mt. Lemmon Homeowners Association, (MLHOA) I'm writing to share information that will help your efforts and help protect your property.

As you know, Mt Lemmon is a unique area to live and vacation. We don't have trash removal services, we have a limited water supply, and we all have to work together to help protect our mountain homes from wildfires. Occasional visitors aren't aware of these things and often we find garbage left at the end of the driveway and water valves left turned on which can result in a tragic loss of water and property damage if a leak occurs. Our Mt. Lemmon Firewise Committee, the MLHOA and the Mt. Lemmon Fire District have gathered several resources that will help you communicate with your tenants and visitors. They can all be found on MLFDAZ.org/Firewise. That's the Mt Lemmon Fire Department website and we've gathered a plethora of helpful information there on the Firewise tab. You will find a poster for overnight guests that's great for leaving on the frig., a Cabin Rental Fire Safety Guide, Renters and Guests Fire Prevention, and even a Homeowner Guest/Renter template to make it easy for you to leave your guests with instructions specific to your cabin.

I hope you'll take advantage of the resources we've gathered for you here and that it will help your guests have a pleasant and safe experience on the mountain. Also, if you have not already done so, please click the link to Mt Lemmonite Connections on the back cover and register your contact information with us. If there is ever a fire or other urgent need to communicate with you, that is how we'll find you. I hope this information is helpful and if you have any questions, please feel free to contact me. If I can't help you myself, I'll direct you to the person who can.

Corn Salad Moowolla H Japan A

This was a favorite at the Firewise Taco Bar!

Ingredients:

- 2 cups sliced cherry tomatoes.
- 3-4 ears of corn. It is best to use whole ears of sweet corn,
- if in season
- 1/4 cup minced red onion
- 1/3 cup chopped cilantro
- 1 tsp cumin
- 2 tbsp lime juice (about 1 lime)
- 1 tbsp olive oil
- 1 tsp balsamic vinegar.

Optional ingredients, which can really change the character of the salad:


Sliced avocado, feta or cotija cheese.

Instructions:

- 1. Steam the corn for 10 minutes and set aside to cool.
- 2. Slice the cherry tomatoes in half if they are small; otherwise quarter them.
- 3. Cut corn off the cob and add to mixing bowl.
- 4. Add the remaining ingredients to the corn and stir.




A Summary of the Cordilleran Flycatcher 2023 Nesting Season on Mt. Lemmon

Now that the Cordilleran Flycatcher (*Empidonax occidentalis*) 2023 breeding season has come to an end on Mt. Lemmon, it is time to reflect on what has happened to this bird over the past summer. In an earlier 2023 issue of The Echoes, I had predicted that the 2023 summer might be a good for flycatcher breeding because of the good rains during 2022 and the heavy snowpack this past winter. We have now analyzed all the information collected at our nesting locations and have found that indeed, 2023 has been a banner year for the young. The breeding season began a little late due to cooler spring conditions that existed from Guadalajara to Arizona. With the later arrival of the migrant Cordilleran Flycatcher, territories were not established until late May, and this helped to synchronize the start of breeding. During 2023, Cordilleran Flycatcher reproduction was higher in all phases of the breeding cycle than in any of the previous years we have studied this bird on Mt. Lemmon. See the bar graph below.


Breeding Success of Cordilleran Flycatchers on Mt Lemmon, AZ



There are several possible factors that have contributed to the very good 2023 Cordilleran Flycatcher nesting season on Mt. Lemmon, with the two most important being: 1) increased food resources, and 2) low egg predation. We operate three malaise insect traps along Turkey Run, just past the Guthrie intersection, and these traps collect flying insects. We found that insect levels were higher in 2023 than during any previous year that we have monitored flying insects on Mt. Lemmon. This was particularly true during late June when most young flycatcher nestlings were being fed by adults. A low flycatcher egg predation rate also contributed to the high 2023 nesting success. Stellar's Jay predation rates of Cordilleran Flycatcher eggs are usually quite high on Mt Lemmon, averaging 34.25% of all eggs laid. When analyzing our mist-net capture data, we found that during the past two years we caught many fewer Stellar's Jays than from 2019-2021. The decreased number of jays in 2022 and 2023 resulted in fewer flycatcher eggs being lost to predation. With larger clutches in 2023 this left a greater number of eggs that could hatch and eventually fledge young. In summary, the 2023 Cordilleran Flycatcher breeding season was quite successful, and the large number of fledged young should help enhance breeding of flycatchers on Mt Lemmon during 2024.




