MLWD Announces Stage 3 Water Restrictions

We are entering into Stage 3 of the Curtailment Plan where all customers are required to curtail 50% of their normal usage.

Mt. Lemmon Water District is asking all the customers and visitors to the mountain to reduce 50% of their use of water wherever and whenever possible. The source flow rate has dramatically decreased over the last weeks due to lack of rain, which makes it increasingly difficult to keep the tanks full and water flowing. The Curtailment Plan is available by email and is on the website. Request a copy at mtlemmonwateroffice@gmail.com Our website, mtlemmonwater.org, will keep everyone informed as curtailment conditions change.

Some ideas are to conserve water by not using outdoor or construction water. Use paper plates and cups, do laundry in Tucson and flush toilets only when necessary. Change shower heads, faucets, and toilets to low flow.

Please repair water leaks and remember to shut off your water at the meter whenever you are away for 24 hours or longer. Be sure to have extra drinking water on hand and store 5 gallons in the event of an outage. For more conservation ideas see the restrictions in the Curtailment Plan. The extended drought has not only caused low flow but has increased the FIRE DANGER. PLEASE be careful with fire! We have all pulled together in past years when we weren't blessed with rain and still have had enjoyable times on the mountain.

MLHOA Membership Dues

The value of your Mt. Lemmon Homeowner's Association (MLHOA) membership lies in the ways it connects you to the community and supports local events. Membership entitles you to a year's subscription (10 issues) to the *Mt Lemmon Echoes* and supports activities such as Bunko, 1st Friday Movie Night, the Chili Cook-Off, the Pancake Breakfast, and the Ice Cream Social, many of which are fundraisers for the MLFD and other worthy causes. Behind the scenes, the MLHOA is also working to find solutions to some of the major issues on the mountain such as parking and trash collection.

But as much as we like to think of Mt. Lemmon as a place to get away from the stresses of everyday life, prices continue to rise--even on the mountain. For years, the MLHOA kept the annual membership fee at \$35.00, but because of increasing costs, \$35.00 no longer covers the cost of printing and mailing the *Echoes*.

Because of this, the MLHOA has decided to raise its annual membership fee beginning in 2024. Membership dues are payable in February, and they will be \$40.00 if you pay by or at the 2024 Annual Dinner. After the Annual Dinner, the fee will go up to \$45.00. If the annual fee is not paid by the end of May 2024, the *Echoes* will no longer be delivered to you until the fee is paid.

If you look at the mailing label on your *Echoes*, you will see that your subscription begins and ends in February. This is regardless of when you actually pay your membership. Our goal is to get as many paid memberships as possible in February to create a more accurate budget and eliminate unnecessary waste.

We were delighted to receive three awards at the conference on behalf of MLWC: 50 years of service in our community, Civic Engagement and Outreach, and Advocates for Children.

Thank you to all the women who donated to our Done in a Day project for October. We collected new, unwrapped toys for the Christmas party for More Than A Bed, a non-profit organization that supports foster children. We will collect items at our November meeting to support Santa Rosa Care Center for their Christmas Party for underprivileged men and women. We are requesting donations of gently used clothing (sizes large and extra-large). They would also like items for goodie bags such as pretzels, cookies, granola bars, fruit snacks, cheese crackers, chocolate candies, and hot chocolate mix.

Terry Wilson updated the membership on the progress with our signature program, Domestic Violence Awareness and Prevention. We are hoping to have information available in several locations on Mt Lemmon by 2024.

Winter is right around the corner, and similarly to last year, the National Weather Service is predicting a warmer, wetter winter; El Niño. Any mountain road can be perilous, but the addition of snow, ice, and inexperienced drivers can certainly increase the risk.

Thankfully, the American Automobile Association (AAA) has put together some tips for driving in adverse weather. First and foremost, stay home if you do not need to be out in unfavorable conditions. But if you must, remember to drive, accelerate, and decelerate slowly. Know your brakes, but do not stop completely unless absolutely necessary, especially when traversing uphill to preserve momentum. Also, do not attempt to power uphill because your tires may spin and lose traction. Ensure tires are properly inflated and in good condition before leaving, the 4x4 is operational and chains/snow tires functional.

It is best practice to be prepared for emergencies in advance. AAA recommends that "if visibility is severely limited due to a whiteout that you should pull off the road to a safe place and remain there until conditions improve, avoiding the shoulder unless it is an absolute emergency."

AAA explains that "Limited visibility means other vehicles can't see yours on the shoulder." This is a very important recommendation since we have lots of blind curves and heavy equipment. Learn where pullouts are and prepare to use them if an emergency occurs.

Understanding basic preparation is paramount for survival if you get stuck in the snow for an extended period of time. AAA states, "keep a bundle of coldweather gear in your car, like food, water, warm clothing, flashlights, glass scrapers, blankets, medications, and more." Consider a shovel to keep your exhaust pipe free from becoming packed with snow (carbon monoxide poisoning) and make sure to start your trip with at least half a tank of fuel. https://exchange.aaa.com/safety/driving-advice/winterdriving-tips/#.X2KirvZKi01



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Susan's Turkey Chorizo Chili

First place winner at the 2023 Chili Cook-Off

Ingredients:

1 lb. 97% fat-free ground turkey

1 lb. reduced fat turkey sausage (I used a chorizo turkey sausage)

16 oz. chili beans

28 oz. crushed tomatoes

16 oz. tomato sauce

10 oz. Rotel tomatoes

1 Tbsp. onion flakes

1 clove garlic, minced

2 Tbsp. chili powder

1 Tbsp. smoked paprika

2 tsp. ground cumin

1 tsp. onion powder

1 tsp. oregano

1 tsp. salt

½ tsp. garlic powder

1/4 tsp. cayenne pepper (or crushed red peppers)

1/4 tsp. ground black pepper


Instructions:

1. Brown turkey and turkey sausage in skillet with garlic. Break meat up to be finely ground.

2. Put browned meat in slow cooker with remaining ingredients on low for 8 hours.

Fire Season CONTINUES AND DESIGNATION


At the October 21st MLHOA Board Meeting, Don DelMastro, Ranger for the Coronado National Forest, told us that our forest is in the same dry condition that it was in June, due to the lack of monsoon rains.

As many of you are closing your cabins, shutting off your water and locking up for the winter, please remember to remove ALL flammables from near your cabins. Put all furniture cushions, brooms, etc. inside the cabin and remove all firewood from within 30', and clean up any accumulated pine needles from gutters and around the base of the cabin.

Pine needles can still be dropped off at the Mt. Lemmon Fire Station. If the needles are in plastic bags, they must be dumped from the bags into the trailer for them to be accepted at the green waste dumpsite.

We are completing our 2023 Firewise Community recertification. When I review all the work that we did as a community, both in time and money spent, as well as the amount of hazardous fuels removed, I am once again amazed at what we can accomplish when we work together. THANK YOU!!

Have a safe and healthy winter, and if you run into Dorothy Johnson or any of our Neighborhood Captains, please take a minute to thank them for all their hard work. And think about volunteering next year for this fun, yet critical work!



Thinning

Thinning in the Catalinas started in September of this year. Crews have already thinned some in Willow Canyon and around Mt. Lemmon, and they have started around Lower Soldier Camp. Thinning will proceed to Upper Soldier, then Ski Valley, and finally back to Willow Canyon.

The intent of the thinning is hazardous fuels reduction. Tree density in some areas on the top of the Catalinas is too high, increasing the risk for a fast moving wildfire. The thinning is deigned with a "prescription," which outlines for the thinning the crews what to cut and what not to cut.

Primarily, we are creating space between the canopies of the trees and removing smaller trees that could help transfer a ground fire into a canopy fire taller trees. Creating gaps between canopies slows the fire and forces it back to the ground where it cannot jump from one tree canopy to the next. While doing that, we still want to retain natural clumps of trees, particularly oaks, and preserve all of the large healthy trees that are still thriving in the area.

So what does this look like when the crews are thinning? They will be removing the lower limbs of conifer trees and removing smaller conifers within denser pockets. Small oaks will be cut or thinned, with some patches being left untouched to retain biodiversity and wildlife habitat. All of the material being cut will be piled, and the piles burned as soon as 1 year later, provided the piles have had enough time to cure.

We will inevitably have another large fire in the Santa Catalinas. Our hope is that when we do, and firefighters are on the mountain protecting infrastructure, homes, telescopes, and businesses, that they have the highest probability of success. We appreciate everyone's understanding and support as we work to get our forest back to a healthier and more fire-resilient condition.
