# Updates from the Mt. Lemmon Homeowners' Association Annual Dinner by Susan Miller-Cochran

The annual Mt. Lemmon Homeowners' Association dinner took place on April 23, 2024 at the Doubletree Reid Park in Tucson. Local superhero Lou Crum was announced as the 2024 Summit Award winner by last year's winner, Jenni Zimmerman. The Summit Award is given annually to a community member who has provided a remarkable amount of service and made a difference to the mountain.

Community members also received updates on a range of plans for the mountain and upcoming events. Here are a few highlights:

- Marshall Gulch Project: Don DelMastro from the USFS explained that the parking loop project will begin on August 1, and it will restore natural water flow to the Marshall Gulch area. It will also add additional parking and picnic areas.
- Traffic Safety: Pima County Sheriff's Deputy Dave Conto reminded everyone to "never be in a hurry up on the mountain," especially as summer visitors create more traffic.
- The Mt. Lemmon Fire District shared plans for the remodeling of the fire station.
- The Mt. Lemmon Water District urged cabin owners to turn off water when leaving your cabin for more than 24 hours. They also shared that Christina Grossman helped the MLWD receive a nearly half million dollar grant to update the water meter system.



# Firewise Hazards to Address When You Open Your Cabin by Dorothy Johnson



# It's the 2024 April-May Mt Lemmon Firewise Spring Clean! by Dorothy Johnson

It's time to get your cabin ready for summer, and that includes some important spring cleaning! When you open your cabin for the summer season, you can expect some typical first encounters with fire hazards. Use the photos on page 2 as a guide to identify what you need to clear around your cabin.

Mission:

- 1. Clear anything flammable from the first 5 feet around structures and 10 feet around fuel. See photo on page 2 for examples of what to clear.
- 2. Clear cheatgrass from the first 10 feet around structures and fuel.
- 3. Remove slash and locusts from within a 10-foot perimeter of desired tall trees. (Delay trimming or thinning pines until cold weather returns, so we don't attract active bark beetles with pine sap.) *To keep locusts from returning, spray Roundup on the locust leaves when new sprouts emerge.*

With the produced green waste:

- Empty bags of pine needles into the trailer at MLFD.
- Seal cheatgrass in a plastic bag and put it in the trash.
- Put locust saplings/branches, vines, bushes, roots and small branches on a green recycle pile. \*
   (There is no burn pile this year.)
- Put other tree branches <5" and limbed saplings that are not locusts on a chipper pile. \*</p>

\* Where are these piles?

- Slash piles will be on the chipper route. To see the route and to email your neighborhood Captain for specific location of both types of piles see mlfdaz.org/Firewise/SLASH PILES--.
- Work with your Firewise Captain and Chief Gunia (jgunia@mlfdaz.org) to determine the location for any green recycle pile. Note: Chief Gunia will transport the green recycle but owners must pay the dump fee (about \$30).

Here are online resources to keep Mt. Lemmon residents informed between editions of *The Echoes*:

- 1. A Google Group has been set up to provide email updates. To join, send an e-mail to mtlemmon-hoa+subscribe@googlegroups.com.
- 2. The Mount Lemmon Homeowners' Association maintains a website at **mtlemmonhoa.org**. Get informed and contribute to the community.
- 3. Sign up at **Nextdoor.com**, using your cabin street address. If you use Nextdoor for your valley neighborhood, sign up for Mt. Lemmon under a new email address, because only one neighborhood is permitted per email address. This offers general information and important communication, especially with wildfires and road closures.
- 4. MLFDAZ.org is the web address for our Fire Department's website. Its Firewise tab takes you to the Mt. Lemmon Firewise Community website, the doorway to important information and forms to get connected (Connections, Neighborhoods and Request Assessment), plan your firewising (an invaluable 13-minute video and Firewising Your Mt. Lemmon Cabin), access support, understand bark beetle and cheatgrass, and provide information to your overnight guests.

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Response to "Preserving Climbing Safety and the Environment Are not at Odds on Mount Lemmon" (by Steven Davis and Erin Whittig, published in the April 2024 Mt. Lemmon Echoes, Vol. 51, No. 3)

I have to agree with the authors of the article regarding another "stretch" by the National Forest Service (NFS). I do a lot of hiking in the Mount Lemmon areas, and have found Mount Lemmon climbers to be very conscientious and respectful partners on the mountain. The climbing areas are always spotless – never a scrap of trash. The climbing areas are off of the beaten track, and even though they are popular with the climbers, they are well away from the main crowds of visitors.

The NFS cannot / does not even maintain the more heavily used areas on the mountain – for example, the Sunset Trailhead "unofficial" sledding area. There are no trash cans at the Sunset Trailhead, and in the spring, trash is strewn all along the parking lot and the hill. It is known that this area gets heavy winter usage from visitors, but the NFS is resistant to even the most rudimentary improvements (a trash and recycle can setup).

I would much rather have the NFS focus on supporting and maintaining heavily trafficked visitor areas than to kick off a new unfunded, uncoordinated mandate regarding rock climbing areas. Rock climbers have shown themselves to be a benefit to the area. Some of our more casual visitors are somewhat less so.

#### What's That Noise? by Dan Leade, Mt. Lemmon Fire District

As the warmer months arrive, those of us that reside in the desert southwest often are reminded that rattlesnakes are emerging from their hibernation. While not unexpected at lower elevations, did you know that rattlesnakes are living within our mountain communities? Of the 17 types of rattlesnakes in Arizona, the Arizona Black rattlesnake is the most common that MLFD encounters. Existing at elevations from around 3000 to over 9000 feet, there is plenty of opportunity to come across one of these reptiles. We have even found them right outside our station!

Per the CDC "7,000-8,000 people are bitten by venomous snakes in the U.S." with Arizona having the most per capita rattlesnake bites nationwide. The Arizona Poison and Drug Information Center suggests precautions to take to avoid being bitten by a rattlesnake as well as what to do if you are. To avoid a bite, leave wild animals alone. Over half of bites are considered provoked. Be aware of peak movement times. Rattlesnakes are most active in warmer months. They are active at night during the hottest months (consider installing outdoor lighting) but may be more active during the day when it is cooler. Be careful where you put your hands and feet. Finally, dead snakes can bite, so never handle a venomous reptile.

If you are bitten, don't use ice, tourniquets or suction devices as these can increase tissue damage. Don't give alcohol or medication, and don't wait to see if you get symptoms. Don't try to catch the snake as treatment will be delayed and the snake could bite again. You should try to relax, move as little as possible, remove tight clothing, shoes or jewelry from the bitten limb, and seek immediate medical attention or call 911.

# From the Desk of Supervisor Steve Christy

Each year, our team works to identify innovative ways to help our communities throughout District 4. Implemented initiatives for the mountain community have included the successful Stage 2 Fire Safety Restrictions program - be sure to thank the SAVs! - and the Pack It In, Pack It Out trash bags available at the Palisades and Summerhaven Visitor Centers.

Last year, the US Forest Service did not order Stage 2 Fire Restrictions – a first in several years. Given this year's abundant precipitation, resulting brush growth, and valley temperatures

hitting 90+, we are confident fire safety restrictions are right around the corner. This makes taking Firewise preparedness measures critically important for year round and seasonal mountain residents, as well as owners of vacant land.

Our staff teamed up with your Mt. Lemmon Firewise Team leaders to update and compile a comprehensive listing of mountain property owners and worked with Pima County Communications to develop an informative mailer, sent to you all. Please scan the QR code on the mailer or email your Firewise Neighborhood Captain to request an assessment to help prioritize preparing your property.

To further call attention to the importance of getting ready for a potentially active fire season, **Pima**County declared May 4 as Community Wildfire Preparedness Day. On April 16, I presented proclamations to Mt. Lemmon Firewise Team Leader Stephen Brigham and Mt. Lemmon Fire District Chief Joe Gunia, as well as Firewise leaders from Green Valley, where four neighborhoods joined Firewise last year.

The Mt. Lemmon Firewise Team has been protecting the mountain community for 20 years now, and is the gold standard for the new Green Valley and Catalina Foothills Firewise Teams to emulate.







# Coronado National Forest Featured on Tucson Buses

Starting April 4, 2024, residents and visitors to Tucson, Arizona will see something new on the back of the city buses. Four newly back-wrapped buses, two in English and two in Spanish, will be on the city streets. The buses showcase two different views, one of Sabino Canyon Recreation Area and the other of the Windy Point on the General Hitchcock Highway, commonly referred to as Mount Lemmon Highway. Both locations are within the Santa Catalina Ranger District and within a day's commuting distance from anywhere in Tucson. This is the newest way of helping to invite visitors to the Coronado National Forest.

"We look forward to helping share the beautiful scenery and uniqueness of the sky islands within the Coronado National Forest while also fostering a lifelong love of the area," shared Forest Supervisor Kerwin S. Dewberry. "We are committed to supporting diversity, equity, and inclusion. This is the first of a series of steps we are taking to make sure everyone knows they are welcome in the Coronado National Forest."







## Preparing for Fire Season by Amanda Adams, USFS


Greetings from the US Forest Service! Spring has arrived in southern Arizona and so has the heat. As the temperatures rise, visitors will ascend the mountain to escape the heat. On the mountain, the snow is melting and we are heading into fire season.

Snow melt means that higher elevation roads, gates, and campgrounds are opening. Rose Canyon, Showers Point, Whitetail, and Spencer Canyon Campgrounds are all currently open and will remain open through mid-October. General Hitchcock Campground is also open and will be open through December 15th. Molino Basin and Gordon Hirabayashi Campgrounds will close May 1st. All gated roads are currently open for the summer season.

As we head into fire season there are some things you can preemptively do to help protect your property in the event of a wildfire. These tips come from Megan Smedley of the Santa Catalina Ranger District and our friends at the Cibola National Forest and Grasslands in New Mexico, and they align with the tips and support you receive from your Firewise community volunteers and neighborhood captains:

- Maintain a defensible space of at least 100 feet around structures by creating horizontal and vertical space in vegetation. This involves removing some trees or brush to increase the horizontal spacing as well as removing lower branches to increase the vertical spacing from the ground.
- Remove debris from your property by cleaning up dead vegetation around fence lines, under porches, off your roof, and against your structures.
- Create a fuel-free safety zone within 5 feet of your home's perimeter where you remove fine fuels like pine needles and dead leaves, keep plants irrigated and pruned, and do not store combustible materials such as firewood, gas, lawn mowers, and cardboard.
- Above all, do not ignite on red flag days.

Being Firewise can make a significant difference in protecting homes and communities from the destructive force of wildfires. Start early, stay informed, and take action to safeguard your community! We look forward to seeing you out and about on the mountain this summer.



#### Tanque Verde Falls Project Begins by Starr Farrell, USFS

A temporary use closure will be in effect within the construction area until June 15th. 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
