




Board of Supervisors Meeting Addresses Affordable Dwelling Insurance in Wildfire Prone Areas

On June 18, Barbara Richardson, Director of Arizona Department of Insurance and Financial Institutions (DIFI) spoke to the Pima County Board of Supervisors about the urgent need for "Affordable Dwelling Insurance in Wildfire Prone Areas." The presentation offered several highlights important to Mt. Lemmon homeowners:







- 2. If your agent is tied to a particular carrier or company, the DIFI document gives resources for locating an unaffiliated agent:
- · Arizona Independent Agent & Brokers Association https://www.iiabaz.com (preferred)
- Arizona Surplus Lines Association 602-279-6344. (According to <u>Surplus Lines Insurance: What It Is, How It Works, Uses, and Types, Surplus Lines insurance "protects against a financial risk that is too great or too uncommon for a</u>

regular insurance company to take on." It is generally much more expensive, and "There is no guaranty fund from which to obtain a claim payment if the surplus lines insurer goes bankrupt, as is the case with standard insurance policies."

3. Insurance companies are looking for communities that are serious about reducing wildfire risks/hazards (ours clearly is) and owners who are making significant mitigation efforts to "thoughtfully" protect their property, "not just doing a couple of things." These kinds of efforts could include consideration of landscaping choices, clearing debris, establishing defensible space, and using fire-resistant building materials.

USFS Updates by Amanda Adams, USFS

Greetings from the US Forest Service. As you all know, the mountain is busy with visitors and camps. With the heat, many of our amazing Coronado volunteers have moved up the mountain.

The second weekend of June brought the Candelighters: Childhood Cancer Foundation of Southern Arizona to Camp Lawton for their family camp event. The Sabino Canyon Volunteer Naturalists sent 5 naturalists to set up displays and activities for the families on Friday evening. The families enjoyed a nature hike with hidden animals and a scavenger hunt, a rocks and mineral table, and an "Ask a Naturalist" table featuring skulls, pelts, and cactus.

The Sabino Canyon Volunteer Naturalists (SCVN) are also hosting weekly Mount Lemmon Summer Hikes. They start at 9am every Friday in the summer from various trailheads on the mountain. You can find more information about July hikes offered by SCVN on page 11.

Some of our Santa Catalina Volunteer Patrol members have moved up the mountain to patrol and be of assistance on the trails. Please feel free to say hi. They love to talk with the public and answer questions. David Dean, a longtime patroller, is closing in on 5,000 volunteer hours in our district! This summer, you will find him at the parking lot of the Summit Trailhead 2 to 3 days a week handing out maps and answering questions from hikers and tourists.

We are also engaging youth in volunteer work on Mount Lemmon. Boy Scout troops and church camp groups are cleaning up litter, pulling invasives, and inventorying plant specimens.

Several Mt. Lemmon residents attended in person, while others were able to watch live on YouTube. After Ms. Richardson's presentation, I was able to respond and speak to the need for the Arizona legislature to enact legislation comparable to the Fair Access to Insurance Requirements (FAIR) Plan which is available in other states including California. According to Explanation of the FAIR Plan by the balance, this facilitates coverage of high risk properties at higher prices, The article goes on to say that owner steps to decrease risk are required. The Board of Supervisors responded positively and will follow up with the County's lobbyist to look at legislation to provide safety-net insurance.

We will seek to provide updates, as they occur.

From the Desk of Supervisor Steve Christy

While we sear on the desert floor, the high country is attracting a large number of visitors. We are concerned that some are not mindful of responsible campsite use, and specifically putting out their campfires. We are told that there will not be Stage 2 fire restrictions this season, although that's being evaluated weekly, so we worked with the Transportation Department and the Sheriff's Department to have the signage at Mile Post 0 remind visitors of the extreme fire danger.

As I write this, there are forecasts of incoming monsoon activity. We all want the rain, yet it may delay the Gen. Hitchcock Hwy. repairs (from about MP 0 to MP 3), which are scheduled to be complete by Independence Day, with no work occurring on the weekends. We have also asked Transportation to evaluate and repair the upper highway conditions. You can help us by reporting potholes, downed signs, and more via the See Click Fix app.

We spearheaded the initiative to call attention to, and solutions to, the lack of available and affordable insurance for mountain property owners. Recently, we placed on the agenda, and the Board of Supervisors voted to direct letters to the State Department of Insurance and Financial Institutions Director Barbara Richardson and Governor Hobbs asking for action to aid property owners in wildfire prone areas. Director Richardson presented during the June 18 Supervisors meeting and your HOA President Sally Crum spoke eloquently and directly about the situation. It was great to see our mountain residents who attended the meeting huddled with the director in the lobby after the agenda item. There is more work to do, and updates will follow.

I encourage all to enjoy your Independence Day holiday and delight in the greatest spectacle in the village, your annual parade. Happy Fourth of July!

A Guide to Monsoon Safety by Dan Reade, MLFD

As monsoons are quickly approaching, it is easy to get excited about cooler temperatures and much needed precipitation. While always a welcome time of year, this season presents some unique hazards.

Flash flooding, as the name indicates, occurs very quickly and often with deadly results. If you are planning to be outside during the monsoon season, it is crucial to check local forecasts for flash flood watches/warnings. If caught in flooding conditions, never attempt to drive or walk through the flood waters. These waters are fast-moving, murky, full of debris, and difficult to gauge the depth of.

Lightning is another major concern during monsoon season. Lightning strikes are a frequent occurrence during monsoons. Per the Arizona Emergency Information, if you are in a forest, seek shelter in a low area under a thick growth of small trees, while you should go to a low place such as a ravine or valley and be alert for flash floods if caught in an open area. If you feel your hair stand on end, lightning is about to strike. Do not lie flat on the ground. Squat low to the ground on the balls of your feet and place your hands over your ears and your head between your knees to make yourself the smallest target possible and minimize your contact with the ground.

Other safety concerns to be aware of are rapidly deteriorating driving conditions, dropping temperatures, falling trees, downed power lines, and rock slides. Be especially cautious in previously burned areas.

Although this list is not all-inclusive, the safety tips listed are always worth an annual review. Enjoy the monsoons with all their positive advantages, but please do so safely.





Trico Electric Cooperative has awarded a total of \$35,000 to five non-profit organizations providing critical services in southern Arizona. The grants are part of Trico's POWER Grants program and are awarded twice a year to charities throughout southern Arizona. Non-profits are selected through an application process and reviewed by a six-person committee made up of Trico employees, Members, and Board Members.

Sahuarita Food Bank & Community Resource Center and Marana
Food Bank & Community Resource Center both received grants of \$10,000.

Marana Unified School District (MUSD) received a grant of \$8,750. Mt.

Lemmon Fire Fighters Foundation received a \$1,500 grant. Youth On Their Own

(YOTO) received a \$4,750 grant.




Trico Announces Plans to Reduce Wildfire Risk on Mt. Lemmon by Sally Crum

Employees of Trico Electric Co-op introduced their plans to reduce the danger of wildfire on Mt. Lemmon during a meeting for Mt. Lemmon property owners and other interested people on Saturday, June 15, at the MLCC. Trico employee presenters included Eric Hawkins, COO and General Counsel, Andy Betancourt, Manager of Distribution Maintenance, Justin Banales, Vice President of System Operations, and Kevin McCarthy, Board Director of District 7.

After providing historical information on Trico's service to the mountain, speakers shared updates on their plans to continue to maintain their rights-of-way to reduce wildfire risk. They also provided information about their efforts to wrap power poles in fire resistant material to reduce damage in the event of fire, which will in turn keep electricity flowing and also reduce the time and cost to replace fire-damaged poles, as they had to do after the Bighorn Fire.

Thanks to Trico for graciously providing a delicious meal (from the Sawmill and the Mt. Lemmon Cookie Cabin) after a long day of meetings and presentations. The meeting was well attended, and Trico indicated their desire to have similar informational meetings on a more regular basis. A question-and-answer period followed.

Sabino Canyon Volunteer Naturalists Offer Mt. Lemmon Hikes by Cathy Yungbluth

The Sabino Canyon Volunteer Naturalists offer several outdoor activities on Mt. Lemmon during the winter, and you are welcome to join in! All hikes start at 9 am from the respective trailhead. Hikes are not "nature walks"; rough and often steep terrain can be expected. All hikes are free and guided, and they urge participants to consider their physical condition for hiking at higher elevations. They suggest bringing snacks or lunch for longer hikes and plenty of water.

No pets are allowed on hikes, and older children with hiking experience are welcome when accompanied by an adult. The following is also recommended and advisable for hikes:

- Hiking boots or sturdy shoes, hiking poles, and rain gear
- Bring and use cell phones for emergency only.
- Bad weather may change or cancel the hike. Check the website calendar on the morning of the hike for cancellations. All event status updates or cancellations will be posted by 7 a.m. the day of the event. For questions, call or text 520-488-8007.

July 5 Turkey Run, Aspen Draw from Summerhaven, milepost 25.0

5.2-mile hike starting on the paved Turkey Run Road past cabins then up the Aspen Draw Trail to the top of the ski lift. Elevation gain of 1100' makes this hike great exercise along with the beauty of nature. Guides: Tim Ralph-lead, Maureen Cunningham, Jim Behra

July 12 Palisades Trail from Bigelow Trailhead, milepost 19.8

3.5-mile hike will be a nice ramble along Organization Ridge Road to the Palisades Trail then along the trail with a detour to a beautiful spot along a creek. We might be allowed to explore the Whispering Pines Girl Scout Camp on the return trip.

Firewise means Fire Safe
