A Night to Remember: Annual Dinner Celebrates Community Spirit and Shared Purpose

On April 22, the Mt. Lemmon Homeowners' Association hosted its Annual Dinner at the DoubleTree by Hilton in Tucson—an evening filled with good food, warm conversation, and a renewed sense of community purpose. Just over 100 mountain residents and friends came together to reconnect, reflect, and celebrate the start of another season on the mountain.

The evening began with a lively cocktail hour before guests enjoyed a delicious buffet featuring BBQ chicken, beans, mac and cheese, salads, and desserts. The event was emceed by MLHOA President Sally Crum, who welcomed guests and introduced a robust program of updates and recognitions.

Before dinner was served, the group paused for a moment of silence and prayer in memory of community members who have recently passed: Duane Durham, John McLean, Linda Mulay, Ed and Donna Roll, and Dr. Charles van Riper III.

Beth Borozan, Chief of Staff for Supervisor Steve Christy, shared remarks round a theme of "We Listened," highlighting how the Supervisor's office has been advocating for Mt. Lemmon on issues like wildfire danger, insurance access, and community safety. She noted that meaningful progress is being made, including the county-wide wildfire mitigation plan inspired by the advocacy of this very community.

District Ranger Don DelMastro delivered a sobering update on the upcoming fire season. Already this spring, four fires have occurred on the mountain, including the loss of Cabin D1 and a brushfire in Willow Canyon—both caused by unattended campfires. Don emphasized the strong collaboration between agencies that prevented the Willow Canyon fire from becoming catastrophic.

Representatives from the Sheriff's Department, Sloan and Dave, echoed the message of vigilance, urging residents to call 911 even for non-emergencies, as all calls are triaged to ensure the right response.

Fire Chief Joe Gunia and Todd Canale recognized the tremendous contributions of John Perchorowicz, chair of the Fire District Board, especially in bringing the long-awaited new fire station to life. The new facility is expected to open by July 1 and will offer greatly improved conditions and resources for the fire department.

Sandi Triplett, president of the Mt. Lemmon Woman's Club, brought everyone up to speed on the club's busy summer plans. She was joined by Sally Crawford and Hazel Rugg, who announced dates for the popular Cabin Tour (June 7), Membership Luncheon (June 28), and of course, the 4th of July Parade.

Stu Shacter of the Mt. Lemmon Water Improvement District emphasized to the community to the real-time water monitoring system now in place, which promises to boost efficiency and conserve precious resources.

Sally Crum discussed ongoing Firewise efforts and encouraged residents to schedule a Firewise assessment and attend the Firewise Block Party on May 24. She also celebrated the County's official recognition of Community Wildfire Preparedness Day—a program Mt. Lemmon once led alone, but which now includes 14 Firewise communities in Pima County.

The evening concluded with a highlight: the presentation of the Summit Award. Last year's honoree, Lou Crum, fulfilled tradition by announcing this year's recipient—Dorothy Johnson, recognized for her extraordinary leadership and dedication to Firewise efforts on the mountain.

From heartfelt remembrances and important updates to shared laughter and prizes, the 2024 Annual Dinner was a resounding success and the perfect kickoff to another vibrant summer season on Mt. Lemmon.

We are pleased to report to the mountain community we are ready when the US Forest Service orders Stage 2 Fire Safety Restrictions.

It is hard to believe we began the well-received and successful partnership with the Pima County Sheriff's Auxiliary Volunteers distributing fire safety flyers to mountain visitors seven years ago. This year, we have bundled the flyers with the Pack It In, Pack It Out trash bags as a hand out, and they will be available at the Palisades and Summerhaven Visitor Centers. Be sure to thank the SAVs at Mile Post 0!

Once again, our staff has teamed up with the Pima County Assessor's office and your Mt. Lemmon Firewise Team leaders to update and compile a comprehensive listing of mountain property owners and worked with Pima County Communications to develop an informative mailer, sent to you all. Please scan the QR code on the mailer or email your Firewise Neighborhood Captain to request an assessment to prioritize preparing your property.

During the Board of Supervisors meeting on May 6, I will present Certificates of Recognition to the Firewise communities in District 4, which now include eight chapters in the Green Valley area and two in the Tanque Verde Valley. Of course, we will be honoring the gold standard, the Mt. Lemmon Firewise Team, which has been leading the effort to protect the mountain community from the danger of wildfire for 21 years.

Thank the Lord it was the weekend and there were people around who reacted quickly, including Forest Service and Mt. Lemmon Firefighters. Both incidents could have been disastrous. What don't people get about not leaving a fire unattended or drowning a campfire when packing up and leaving? I mean, really?!

I think I'm pretty much done preaching to the choir about this. Those of us who live here don't need to be told to put out campfires and, apparently, some people who visit here didn't get the message or just don't care. It's time to be proactive!

The two abandoned fires happened before the start of visitor season; the number of campers is going to swell in the coming weeks. What can we do? I am recommending all of us keep our eyes peeled for any sign of smoke and occasionally drive or walk by places near your cabin where you know people tend to camp. If you see an abandoned fire, take a picture, then put the fire out. If you can't put it out by yourself, call 911.

It's up to us to informally patrol our neighborhoods. Staffing and budget cuts at the Forest Service are going to make this kind of "citizen's effort" important for everyone's safety!

And don't get me started about how it hasn't rained!

I hope I was able to see you at the dinner and you were able to visit with neighbors and friends.

With the arrival of warmer temperatures, many of our residents and visitors will take to the trails. It is vital to remember there are many hazards that may be encountered while hiking. These dangers can result in a host of different types of injuries, some of which may be life-threatening. Getting lost, adverse weather conditions, and dangerous animals and plants are all major concerns.

To help hikers enjoy the outdoors and mitigate risk of an emergency, the National Parks Service lists ten essential health/safety items to consider when planning a hike. These considerations are navigation, sun protection, insulation, illumination, first aid supplies, a way to start a fire, a repair kit or tools, nutrition, hydration, and an emergency shelter. No list will be all inclusive, but this is a great place to start. In addition, some other good tips are to let someone know where you are going and when you expect to be back. Hike with at least one other person. Research the trail and *stay on it*. Wear proper hiking gear and get the anticipated weather forecast for your hike.

The Bighorn Fire negatively affected many of the trails on the mountain, posing unique hazards not be found in other areas. These hazards include falling trees/branches, loose soil/rocks, an increased potential for flooding/rock slides, and missing/destroyed trail signage. Never enter closed areas; they have been determined to be exceptionally unsafe!

Always plan ahead so you enjoy your hike safely!

As we enter the beginning of the season on the mountain, it is helpful for everyone to know the status of our water tanks. This is the most recent report from the District's website.

Miners Ridge tank: 25' Tall 500,000 capacity at 20,000 gallons per foot. Currently 84% full

Carter Canyon tank: 16' Tall 140,000 capacity at 8,750 gallons per foot. Currently 87.5% full

Sabino 212k tank: 25' Tall 212,000 capacity at 8,833 gallons per foot. Currently 69% full

Sabino 800k tank: 32' Tall 800,000 capacity at 25,000 gallons per foot.

Loma Linda Big tank: 32' Tall 283,000 capacity at 8,843 gallons per foot. Currently 86% full

Carter Source: 4 gpm
Sabino Source Master: 8 gpm

ICYMI*: Federal Wildland Firefighters Get Raise

The Department of the Interior announced permanent pay increases for federal wildland firefighters across the United States. As wildfires grow larger and more destructive — threatening communities, livelihoods, and infrastructure — wildland fire personnel face growing demands. Improving firefighter pay will address this challenge by enabling the department to hire and retain top employees.

The permanent pay increases were included in the Full-Year Continuing Appropriations and Extensions Act, 2025 (H.R. 1968), which Congress passed March 14 and the President signed into law.

The legislation establishes new special salary pay tables for federal wildland firefighters at all levels, including temporary and seasonal employees. This permanent increase replaces temporary pay supplements that firefighters had received over the last four years. In addition, the law creates wildland fire Incident Response Premium Pay, allowing all federal employees to earn extra pay for extended deployments to qualifying incidents.

Nearly 65,000 wildfires burned more than 8.9 million acres across the United States last year, endangering communities, critical infrastructure, and local economies.

Recent advancements in fire-resistant building materials include intumescent paints and coatings, fire-resistant glass, steel rebar, and innovative composite materials. These materials offer enhanced fire resistance and durability, while also providing options for aesthetics and affordability.

Here's a more detailed look at some of the latest advancements:

Intumescent Paints and Coatings

These paints swell when exposed to heat, creating a thick, insulating layer that protects underlying materials like steel and wood.

They are a cost-effective way to retrofit existing structures and provide additional fire protection.

Advanced formulations, including nano-clays, carbon nanotubes, and graphene, are being integrated into these coatings to improve their thermal stability and efficiency.

Fire-Resistant Glass

Specialized glass is designed to withstand high temperatures and prevent the passage of flames and smoke.

It's used in windows and doors to provide both fire protection and visibility.

The EPA provides guidelines on using fire-resistant glass and other materials to enhance building safety.

Steel and Steel Rebar

Steel is a non-combustible material, making it suitable for structural frameworks.

Steel rebar is often protected by concrete or fire-resistant coatings to prevent heat-related damage.

Advanced Composite Siding

These composites, often made with rice husks, mineral oil, and salt, offer a Class A fire rating.

They provide a more durable and cost-effective alternative to traditional materials like wood, while also offering a wider range of aesthetic options.

Their lightweight nature also simplifies installation, reducing construction costs and time.

Insulated Concrete Form (ICF)

ICF consists of concrete poured between insulating foam panels, creating a durable and fire-resistant structure.

This system enhances the fireproofing capabilities of traditional concrete and improves energy efficiency.

ICFs are also quick and easy to construct, making them a practical choice for various building types.

These are just some of the many exciting developments that are making it safer for people to build and live in the wildland-urban interface.

Arizona Seasonal Climate Outlook (May 2025 – April 2026)

Temperature Outlook:

The strongest warming trends are projected in:

- Late Spring through Summer 2025 (May–August)
- Spring 2026 (March–June)
- Neutral periods (near-average temps) may occur in late fall and early winter (Nov–Jan), especially in northern Arizona.

Precipitation Outlook:

Equal chances (i.e., no strong signal for wetter or drier than normal) are forecast for most months. However, a few exceptions stand out:

- Drier-than-normal signals for Feb–Apr 2026, especially in central and southern Arizona.
- No significant above-average precipitation outlooks appear for Arizona at any point.
- During the summer monsoon window (Jun–Sep), equal chances dominate, meaning typical rainfall is expected—but there is no strong tilt either way.

Arizona Wildland Fire Outlook (May–July 2025)

May 2025

Above Normal Fire Potential is forecast across nearly the entire state of Arizona. This elevated risk covers southern, central, and northern Arizona, including major forested areas and grasslands. The heightened threat is likely driven by expected above-normal temperatures and typical-to-dry conditions.

June 2025

- Above Normal Fire Potential continues statewide and expands into neighboring regions.
- All of Arizona remains in the red zone, indicating persistent and widespread fire risk.
- This is the peak of pre-monsoon fire season, when dry fuels and high temperatures create dangerous fire conditions.

July 2025

- Fire potential decreases significantly in Arizona.
- Most of the state returns to normal fire potential.
- The monsoon season typically begins in July, bringing increased humidity and rainfall, which helps reduce wildfire threat.

Key takeaways

- High fire danger is expected in May and June due to hot, dry conditions and delayed moisture. Conditions are most dangerous before the summer monsoon arrives.
- Fire risk improves by July, assuming a typical start to monsoon rains.

Stacey Cochran Premieres Second Summerhaven Film at Arizona International Film Festival

Local author and filmmaker, Stacey Cochran, premiered the second episode in the *Summerhaven* series on April 8, 2025, at the 33rd annual Arizona International Film Festival. The 30-minute film, *Ava and Her Mother*, headlined the Arizona Shorts evening at the festival and was shown to a sold-out crowd at the Screening Room in downtown Tucson. The film was described in the festival program as “a psychological drama exploring reconciliation, identity, and the power of love amidst grief—set where the living and the dead coexist.” It includes some of the characters from the first episode in minor parts and introduces new characters with a story of their own that centers around Summerhaven.

Ava and Her Mother stars local stage actors Chelsea Bowdren and Cynthia Meier, members of the ensemble at the Rogue Theatre, and it was filmed on Mt. Lemmon in late 2023 and early 2024. Cochran wrote the screenplay, directed the film, and served as executive producer. The production of the film was supported by Diana and John Osborne at the Mt. Lemmon Lodge and by Justin Hafner at the Mt. Lemmon Hotel, who helped with lodging for the crew during filming on the mountain.

The Mt. Lemmon community was well-represented at the premier by Stacey, Susan, and Harper Cochran and also by Deputy Agnieszka Sloan and Michael Sloan.

Excerpted From the July 1978 Echoes

Mt Lemmon Homeowners' Association member, Bob “Robot” Jaquith, was named citizen band radio operator of the month by the Citizen Band Newspaper for his stunning rescue of a fellow CB'er off the Control Road.

The nightmarish 6-hour rescue happened several months ago, when a young man, CB handle “Superwheeler,” a paraplegic, tried to drive his Ford Mustang (with hand controls) up the Control Road. Superwheeler had heard about the back road to Mt. Lemmon and thought it would be a great drive. He left Oracle on a paved road, thinking everything was going to be fine. He soon learned otherwise. The driving became increasingly difficult and he ended up high-centered on a boulder and it was getting dark. He got on his CB radio ad called for help. The call was picked up in San Manuel. A lucky thing too, the road got much worse after that; he never would have made it.

Robot responded to the call and left in his 4-wheel drive but had a very difficult time navigating the road in the dark. Another Cb'er, “Big John,” who lived on the mountain brought his 4-wheeler down to meet up with them. Amazingly, the two men were able to get the Mustang back on solid ground and Superwheeler was finally able to drive himself home. Superwheeler said it was enough excitement to last a life time. And, to top it off, it snowed that night on the mountain. Hats off to Robot and Big John.
